Director Of California's Fish And Game Says He Has Problems Too, Deer Problems

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—The head of California's Fish and Game Department wants the state's landowners to know that he has problems too.

In a recent talk to the state Farm Bureau Federation, Director William E. Warne put it this way:

"We have found that the people closest to the land generally appreciate and understand the problems of fish and game management and the solutions of those problems.

"We have stood side by side with you in striving for intelligent deer management and improved range conditions. We all know that there is a long way yet to go."

Warne makes the surprising statement that "in general, man's activities—logging, burning and agriculture—benefit deer." But he says the converse isn't necessarily true—"With the increasing numbers of these animals . . . there has been an increase in crop depredation and range damage."

The F&G official wanted the farmers to understand that the major problem of his agency is "fully utilizing the harvest potential of each year's crop of deer, consistent with conservation interests."

"There is the attendant problem of the need for control of range damage and resulting reduced capacity of ranges to support deer and livestock," he said.

He explained that California has a unique deer picture. In comparison with other western states, California has the most deer hunters, the greatest deer herd, the largest deer range, the greatest number of deer per square mile and close to the average for the western states in the number of deer per deer tag buyer.

"Despite this, California hunters shoot the lowest percentage of the herd and have the lowest hunter success ratio," he added. "This is largely because all the other western states shoot numbers of antlerless deer, while we do not."

Warne went on to make his pitch for more either-sex deer hunting.

"If we do not realize the harvest potential of our deer herds, we can expect an even lower success ratio and a greater incidence of range and crop damage," he said.

Warne said that as nearly as can be determined there are more than a million deer in the state and there are about 60,000 bucks and 5,000 does reported taken each year.

"A much larger kill including both sexes would be safe and under efficient management a sustained harvest of the increased number would be possible."

(Warne has served notice that he will try during his administration to get more widespread either-sex deer hunts. He feels that these are necessary for good game management.)

Last week the Fish and Game Department made public its estimated total deer kill for 1959's two seasons, totaling more than 71,000 for the second highest kill in history. Most officials at the department interpreted this as proof that the 1956 either-sex kill did no harm.)

Warne, as could be expected considering his audience, went into the hunter-landowner relationship with what he apparently felt was proof that cooperation of the landowner helps everyone.

He pointed out that in 1958 the department signed an agreement with Kern County Land Company to open about 120,000 acres of the San Emidio Ranch to controlled public hunting. That parcel of land had been closed to the public since before 1900.

"In recent years, prior to the controlled hunts, the Kern County Land Company had an ever-increasing problem with trespassing hunters," he said. "Cut fences, injured livestock, wildfires and other destruction along with littering became serious problems."

"Such damage has been almost entirely stopped under the cooperative hunt program," Warne said. And he pointed out that in the 1958 San Emidio hunt 852 permittees bagged 67 bucks and this year 1,130 permittees took 114 bucks.

Summarizing, Warne said that conservation of fish and game is the responsibility of every citizen in as much as these resources belong to all the people.

"With California's constantly increasing population and urbanization every effort must be exerted to make sure that this great state does not become a 'wildlife desert,'" he said. "We are presently abundantly blessed. Let us keep this our situation."
