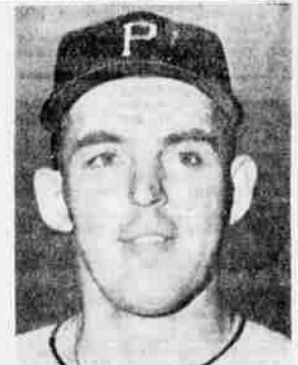

Warning to the Baltimore Colts and other interested parties: The

New York Giants are tough—but avoid their fans at all cost. The Giants clinched the National Football League's Eastern Division title Sunday for the second straight year when they clobbered the Browns, 48-7. The Giants almost blew the Browns out of Yankee Stadium and their fans completed the job.

Hundreds swarmed on the field with less than two minutes to go, sending Coach Paul Brown and his Browns scurrying to the locker room for protection. While Coach Jim Lee Howell's Giants wondered if the officials might forfeit the game to Cleveland, the fans tore down one set of goal posts and were working on the other when special police details restored order 20 minutes later.

Four Major Teams Complete Big Swaps

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Baseball people spoke optimistically of even more trades today following the completion of two major deals Sunday. There was one in each league, involving 11 players with such big names as Minnie Minoso and Frank Thomas.

Minoso was the key figure in a swap between Cleveland and Chicago that sent pitchers Don Ferrarese and catcher Dick Brown, along with the 37-year-old slugging outfielder, to the White Sox in exchange for third baseman John (Bubba) Phillips, catcher John Romano and first baseman Norm Cash.

Thomas, acquired by Cincinnati from Pittsburgh in the biggest trade of 1959, was shipped by the Reds to the Chicago Cubs for three players—pitcher Bill Henry and outfielders Lee Walls and Lou Jackson.

The twin trades, following on the heels of a couple of lesser transactions the day before, was greeted with enthusiasm by officials of other clubs.

"It looks like the log jam has been broken," said General Manager Bing Devine of the St. Louis Cardinals. "Now that certain players have been eliminated in the trade mart, we can concentrate on other players. Too many trade possibilities sometimes can be confusing and as a result you don't make any."

The acquisition of Henry gave the Reds what they needed most—a strong relief pitcher. The 32-year-old southpaw had a 9-8 record but turned in an impressive 2.71 earned run average in 65 games. Walls, a .237 hitter last

year, slugged 24 home runs in 1958. Jackson, 24, led the Eastern League with his .338 at Lancaster, Pa.

"We hated to give up Thomas," said Cincinnati Manager Fred Hutchinson, "but we simply had to have a relief pitcher. We lost 21 games last year when we were ahead in the last three innings."

"We're going to return Thomas to the outfield, where he belongs," said Manager Charlie Grimm of the Cubs. "The big guy has proven he can hit. His thumb is all right now. We had him checked by a doctor and we have been assured he is physically okay."

The multiple Cleveland-Chicago deal marks the second time the Indians have traded Minoso to the White Sox. He originally came to Chicago in April 1951 and was returned to Cleveland in December 1957. He has hit over .300 in seven of his nine seasons in the majors and owns a lifetime mark of .307 including 146 home runs. Last year he batted .302 for the Indians with 21 homers and 92 runs batted in.

Ferrarese, a 30-year-old southpaw, started brilliantly last spring and was Cleveland's best pitcher in early June with a 5-3 record. Then he came up with a sore arm that rendered him useless.

Striker, 26, is a rookie left-hander who won 12 and lost 9 at San Diego. Brown, 25, spent most of last season with the Indians but was shipped briefly to Buffalo. With Cleveland he batted .229 in 47 games.

Phillips, 29, is expected to fill the void at third base for the Indians. He also can play in the outfield. Last year he batted .284 in 115 games for the Sox.

Burned Beavers Suffer 2nd Loss

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State's hoop squad returned home with more traces of sunshine than victory from a three-game series in Hawaii.

The incredibly cold Beavers lost 69-55 Saturday night to the Navy's Service Force Pacific in Pearl Harbor's Bloch Arena.

The cold shooting was in sharp contrast to the obviously warm shoulders, apparently sunburned on the beaches of Waikiki.

The Beavers were smooth Thursday night when they won 72-48 from the University of Hawaii, but were upset 56-51 the night before by the same team.

RB Ducats Sold

SEATTLE (AP) — If you haven't got your Rose Bowl ticket, better plan to watch the game on television.

George Briggs, athletic director at the University of Washington, said Sunday the school has applications on hand for 6,000 to 7,000 tickets more than Washington's allotted number. The exact number of refunds won't be known for a couple of weeks.

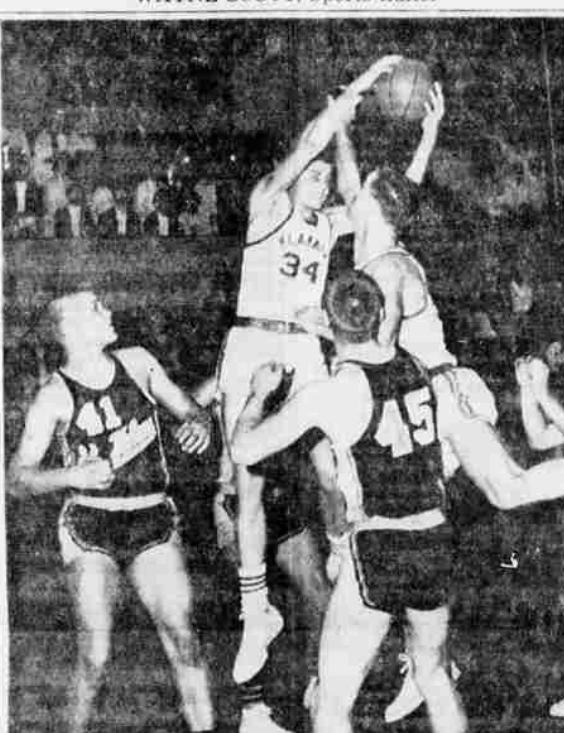
As host school, Washington was given more than 40,000 tickets for alumni and the general public.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Heavyweight contender Sonny Liston of Philadelphia seeks his 19th straight victory Wednesday night in a TV 10-rounder with Germany's Willie Besmanoff of Milwaukee at the Cleveland arena.

Because of his skill and punch, Liston is favored at 3-1. Each is 27 but Liston is rated third among contenders. Besmanoff is not ranked among the top 10.

Their bout will be televised nationally by ABC. There's no Friday night TV fight this week.

In his latest bout, Besmanoff

dropped a decision to Eddie Machen, Sept. 16. However, he won his other three starts this year on decisions over Al Williams, Mike DeJohn and Marty Marshall.

The Philadelphia Warriors could be in for a rough time in the National Basketball Assn. Wilt Chamberlain has an injured foot which may keep him out of action for a week.

The high-scoring rookie star suffered the injury Saturday night when teammate Woody Sauldsberry stepped on his left foot during a 113-112 defeat by the Hawks at St. Louis. Chamberlain scored only 20 points, his lowest output of the season.

Sunday night, the former Kansas All-American sat on the bench as the Warriors eked out a 118-116 victory over Detroit at Philadelphia and remained within 2½ games of the Boston Celtics. The Celtics, eastern division leaders, downed crippled Minneapolis 121-104 Sunday.

Chamberlain was scheduled to have the foot X-rayed Monday. The Warriors get one break in that they are idle until Thursday when they play Cincinnati. But on Saturday they come up against the powerful Celtics. Philadelphia and Boston have met three times this season with the Warriors winning two.

A 40-foot one-handed shot by Paul Arizin just before the final buzzer gave the Warriors their two-point victory over the Pistons, who were beaten 124-108.

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
