Hay Shippers Get Warning

TULELAKE — Hay producers who are shipping hay from the Tulelake Basin and suspicion the presence of noxious weeds in the crop are advised by Manager Clifford Jenkins of the Tulelake Growers Association to have hay inspected at the loading point. The advice follows rejection of several loads of hay recently at the agricultural inspection station at Dorris which has necessitated a return haul and unloading. Noxious weeds under ban are Canadian thistle, morning glory, white top and knap weed. Rejection also complicates sale of hay to outside growers who depend on the crop brought here for steady delivery. Jenkins said, "While California has had a previous ban on the sale of hay crops with noxious weeds, a more recent action of the California State Legislature initiated by the California State Grain Dealers Association, prohibits the movement of crops of hay and straw containing primary noxious weeds. Growers should contact agricultural inspectors Bill Huse, for Siskiyou County or Lefroy Smith for Modoc County, both in Tulelake for a check and clearance slip, to be presented to inspectors at the checking stations. Official clearance will eliminate further inspection of truck load lots.

Tule Growers Arrange Meet

TULELAKE — The annual membership meeting of the Tulelake Growers Association is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, December 9, in the growers' office. Manager Clifford Jenkins in announcing plans for the meeting said posts of two directors whose terms expire will be filled, proposed 1960 association projects will be discussed and set up, 1959 achievement reports will be made by Jenkins and association president Dick Falconer, completing his third term, and E. Webb-Bowen will give the treasurer's report. Dues and assessments will be established and plans set up for a membership drive. Sam Anderson, who attended the recent meeting of directors of the National Potato Council on which he serves, will report on that meeting. During the sessions Anderson was honored for his contributions to the potato industry at local, state and national levels. Retiring association board members are Falconer, retiring in accordance with association bylaws and Dick Halousek, who is completing a term for a director who left Tulelake. Ben Reimer, chairman of the nominating committee, will report. Nominations will also be in order from the floor.

Magistrate Edward Chapman Thursday issued a summons ordering Campanella to appear in court Dec. 31 in connection with 21 building code violations against the tenement.

Flying Glass Hurts Woman

A shower of splintered glass blinded a Klamath Falls woman briefly early Sunday morning resulting from what police believe was a spat between friends. Cleo Williams, 31, of 714 North Third Street, was treated at Klamath Valley Hospital and released. A physician extracted slivers of glass from her eyes. She refused to sign a complaint against an assailant. Police suspect Leon Pearson, 34, Chilcoquin of smashing a pane of glass at the victim's front door with a fist or instrument of some kind when she refused him admittance. A roommate called police. The assailant was gone when officers arrived. They took the woman to the hospital. Indictments recently were brought by the grand jury against Pearson and the woman on charges they severely beat a Chilcoquin visitor and stole \$180 and a watch, then left the victim crumpled on the ground.

Witness Gone, Case Dropped

A new jury panel reported in circuit court today, and from it a new grand jury was drawn, but the first trial for the December term of court was dismissed. The 40-member jury venire reported to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg with the expectation of hearing the trial of Leonard Edward Mackey, 34, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. Mackey was indicted by the October grand jury for his alleged attempt to knife Lydia Crain on a downtown street early July 11. As the trial was to begin, however, District Attorney Arthur Beddoe informed the judge that the state could not locate its complaining witness, Lydia Crain. For that reason Beddoe moved that the case be dismissed. David Card, appointed by the court to represent Mackey, joined in the motion and further moved for a judgment of acquittal. Because the witness could not be found, Judge Vandenberg granted both motions and Mackey was released from custody. Before the trial's opening, grand jurors were drawn from the December panel of 40 names. Beddoe said the state had business to present before the jury, but was not yet prepared to submit it. The jury was recessed until further notice. Grand jury members are Henry F. Grimes of Klamath Falls, Route 2, foreman; Fred G. Brown of Fort Klamath, and Fred G. Brown, Howard W. Amidon, Jack M. Patton, Harry W. Ward, Maud Hosley, and Willard Noble, all of Klamath Falls.

Youth Arrested On Gas Charge

A 16-year-old boy police believe ran away from his home in Yakima was jailed Sunday morning to await questioning by local juvenile officers for failing to pay for gasoline. A filling station operator said he bought at Wocus. Don Vanderhoff of a Shell Station on Highway 97 reported the incident to city police and gave them a description of the boy's car. Police stopped the lad minutes later at Esplanade Avenue and Spruce Street. Officers impounded a dog and a shotgun found in the youth's car. The boy subsequently paid Vanderhoff the \$2 he owed for the gasoline, police said.

Chamber Begins Politics Course

An Action Course in Practical Politics, sponsored by the chamber of commerce to inform interested persons in the mechanics of politics, starts Tuesday morning. The first of four separate classes meet for breakfast at 7 in the Winema Hotel. Other classes begin this week, one Wednesday noon at the Willard Hotel, and two others at 7 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday in the chamber offices opposite the courthouse. Registrations for the course have grown from 37 when it first was announced to a total of 55 persons. Classes will be from 12 to 18 members in size. A discussion leader for each class will be chosen at the first meetings this week.

Sheriff Finds Lost Hunter

A duck hunter who built a signal fire and sounded the traditional distress alarm was rescued from Buck Island in Upper Klamath Lake Saturday night. Sheriff Red Britton identified the hunter as J. L. Rogers, 225 North First Street. Britton said Rogers had been duck hunting, but found his power boat would not start when he prepared to come back to shore. The alarm was called to the sheriff's office about 7 p.m. by Betty Eells of Cove Point, the sheriff said. Eells said he had seen the fire, later heard three shots fired on two occasions. The sheriff notified both KASRU and Klamath Boaters, and rescue operations were begun. "It was very well organized," Britton said. Bitter cold, at 20 degrees or less, hindered operation of rescue boats, just as it had prevented Rogers' twin-40 horsepower engines from functioning. "We had to break ice all the way from the Dugan and Mest Marina," the sheriff said. "Our own motors quit six or seven times."

Youth Injured In Car Mishap

A 15-year-old driver was treated and released at Klamath Valley Hospital Sunday after a minor accident on Alameda Avenue near Beverly Drive. State police said the youth was driving a car which crossed a center line and struck an oncoming car driven by Lawrence Walter Scott, 32, 2001 Reclamation Avenue. The accident apparently was caused by a stuck foot throttle, the youth told police. Officers said he had no driver's license. The accident occurred at 4:15 p.m. Sunday.

Youth Blamed In KU Thefts

City police believe they have found the culprit responsible for thefts of about \$130 during the past month from Klamath Union High School Wrestling Coach DeLance Duncan's dressing room locker. They arrested a 17-year-old Klamath Falls boy and lodged him in the city jail under suspicion of larceny. The boy, say city police and juvenile officers, admitted stealing the money, but said he was not guilty of stealing a transistor radio and an electric razor found in his own locker at the school. Rather, he told them, he bought the articles from other boys. He was kept in jail pending further interrogation. Police were alerted Friday by Athletic Director James Johnson, who made a preliminary investigation. Johnson told police Duncan reported loss of money from his locker on two occasions recently. Duncan told Johnson he left a wallet containing \$100 in the locker December 2. He said the locker was locked. On returning, the money was missing. Duncan also said he lost \$30 in similar fashion in November. Johnson became suspicious when he spotted the boy loitering in the locker room. The boy, he said, was reported absent from school. He held the suspect for police. Officers extracted a key to Duncan's locker as well as a confession from the boy, they said. They said he may have gotten the key while working last year for H. B. Largent, a KUHS custodian who works frequently with athletic gear.
