City Residential Area To Hear Yuletide Carols

Christmas carols will be ringing throughout the residential area of Klamath Falls from 7 to 9 p.m. between December 10 and 24.

The BAPTIST Association plans to carol on Main Street from Eighth to Third streets on Saturday, December 19. They will use choirs from the various churches of the association of the caroling, and, in addition, are planning a community Christmas sing on the courthouse grounds the same evening, featuring these choirs and any of the public who wish to join them.

Two longtime members of city commissions submitted their resignations. Mrs. Annabelle Newton, 423 Plum Avenue, who has served on the Dog Commission since its inception, resigned effective December 1. In her letter of resignation, Mrs. Newton said, "It is very gratifying to me to note the improvements made in our dog shelter. I consider it among the finest in the state."

W. Don Miller resigned as a member of the city's Traffic Safety Committee. He cited the pressure of business interests. Both were accepted and a letter of thanks forwarded to the individuals for their faithful service.

The question of damage to an automobile from an open manhole cover was posed to the council by George G. Yost, Route 1, Box 2A, Tulelake. Yost submitted a bill in the amount of \$20.25, pointing out that a manhole cover at the Broad Street intersection had been lifted aside and his vehicle hit the opening in the street, damaging the wheel and the car's alignment.

CITY MANAGER G. S. Vergerer told the council that the street department had been informed of the open manhole shortly before the accident happened, and arrived to fix it a short time later. He pointed out that it was a peculiar accident, perhaps involving a rock on the manhole cover, then the car hitting the cover just right to tip it over and out of place.

City Attorney Henry Perkins told the council that it was not liable if it had been replaced in a reasonable time. The council, however, chose to avoid the inconvenience of a possible lawsuit, and Attorney Perkins dictated the motion approving the claim, but pointing out that payment of the claim in no way agreed that the city was liable for damages.

Bids were opened on two automobiles, one for the police department.
