

Syracuse Number 1, Naturally

All-conquering Syracuse University wore the national football championship crown today with an overwhelming first place vote in the final Associated Press poll, which also showed the first 12 teams solidly lined up for major bowl engagements.

The Orangemen, winners of 10 straight and the only major unbeaten and untied team in the country, took over the No. 1 spot Nov. 7 and held it the rest of the way.

The climax of the season came Saturday in Los Angeles, where Syracuse displayed its might by crushing UCLA 36-8. It was no surprise when Coach Ben Schwartzwalder's team landed 134 of the 201 first place ballots cast by the nation's sports writers and broadcasters.

Perhaps never before have the major bowls snatched up such highly ranked college teams. Most were signed up for the bowls more than a week ago. Syracuse accepted a Cotton Bowl invitation Nov. 14 after walloping Colgate 71-0. The Orangemen will meet the Texas Longhorns, beaten only by Texas Christian and No. 4 in the final poll.

Syracuse, in replacing Louisiana as national champion, is the first Eastern team to gain the honor since Army in 1945. Last year Syracuse was ninth in the final balloting with an 8-1 record.

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle University scored its first basketball win of the young season Monday night, downing the University of Hawaii 83-54.

The Hawaiians grabbed the lead three times in the early minutes of the game, but the Chiefs went ahead to stay at 11-9. Seattle's defense choked off the visitors and the Chiefs led by 45-25 at halftime.

A Rainbow rally early in the second half faltered when lanky Tony Davis fell and was stunned when his cheek hit the floor. He missed the rest of the game.

Junior Dave Mills topped the scorers with 29 points for the Chiefs. Frank DeLauro had 17 for Hawaii.

The two teams clash Wednesday night at Everett.

Cain Hoy Leads Money Winnings

NEW YORK (AP) — Capt. Harry F. Guggenheim's Cain Hoy Stable heads the money winning owners list for 1959 with \$742,001 through Nov. 30, the Morning Telegraph reported today.

In other departments, the Brookmeade Stable's Sword Dancer — horse of the year — is the top money winning horse with \$537,004. Willie Shoemaker leads the jockeys with 334 winners, and V. R. (Tennessee) Wright is the leading trainer with 159. All figures were for the period from Jan. 1 through Nov. 30.

C. V. Whitney is second in the owners' list with \$672,613, the Brookmeade Stable third with \$669,054, and the Kerr Stable fourth with \$641,355.

Chamberlain Stamped Wilt Swaps Still For Crutch, Still Lead Scorer

NEW YORK (AP) — Know how to defend against towering Wilt Chamberlain? Step on his footies! That's the only way Wilt — scoring at a record 35.7 points a game — has been stopped since he began the league's top rebounding with Warriors' top scorer last week.

League statistics released today show Chamberlain leading the scoring parade with 715 points, one point more than Cincinnati's Jack Twyman. Twyman, however, has played three more games and shows a 31.0 average.

Panther, JV Quints Clash At Pel Court

With the County B League's official opening set for Friday, a pair of warmup tests are slated tonight by two county teams, Chilquin and Gilchrist.

In the local feature, coach Gordon Kuist's Panthers tangle with coach Al Keck's Klamath Union Jayvees at 8 o'clock on Pelican Court. In the preliminary Chilquin's JV squad meets the KU Freshmen at 6:30.

In the only other action Sisters, winner of a recent tournament on their home court, travels to Gilchrist to battle coach Les Martin's Grizzlies at 8 o'clock. The two schools' Jayvee squads will be matched in the preliminary.

Non-league action continues Wednesday as the KU Frosh and Bly's Bobcats clash on the Bly maple in an 8 o'clock contest.

The Jayvee's Keck, ex-Merrill mentor in his first year at KUHS, noted he has "four definite" starters for tonight while the fifth position is "up for grabs." Picked by Keck for starting assignments are forwards Wayne Dennis (6-1) and Wally Palmberg Jr. (5-11) and guards Fred Biehn (5-9) and Bob Lapsley (5-10). The fifth starter will be chosen from Kent Hunsaker (6-0), Sherm Allen (5-7) or Earl Yeoman (6-4).

Kuist, one of the county's veteran cage mentors, will go with the same lineup used against Gilchrist Saturday. Lyle Hall (6-1) and Paul Harris (6-2) at forwards; Ron Hogarth (6-1) at center and Frank Hegland (6-0) and John Ochoa (5-10) at guards. Also mentioned by Kuist as a possible starter is speedy guard Hubert LeBeau (5-8).

A Western Conference official said the package offer has been made by a national advertising agency.

However, the official, who asked not to be identified, stated that the Big Ten could not receive the offer under present rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn.

The contract calls for one million dollars a year for three years with option for renewal.

The Big Ten, as a member of the NCAA, cannot accept the bid without sanction of the ruling collegiate body.

The Big Ten, which has its own television contract for football, would have to break from the NCAA if it decided to accept the offer.

Conference officials would not comment.

Russian Teams In Action Tonight

DENVER (UPI) — The Russian national basketball teams make their fifth U.S. appearance here tonight — the men's team meeting the Denver-Chicago Truckers, and the women playing Iowa Wesleyan College.

A near capacity crowd of 12,000 is expected to jam every inch of Denver's Coliseum to see the Russians and their 7-foot-3 inch men's star — Yan Kruminsh.

The Russian delegation, 33 strong, has been in town since Sunday. The teams took a brisk workout Monday night.

DETROIT (UPI) — The Detroit Tigers have signed four hopefuls — John Griffin of North Branch, Mich., Don Nowory of Albion, D.C., and Tom Schroeder of Kenmore, N.Y. — to 1960 minor league contracts.
