

State Public Works Board To Meet On Showdown

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—The California Public Works Board was scheduled to meet this afternoon for a showdown on the Stanislaus and Southern Alameda County state colleges.

The Legislature has ordered the state to buy sites for the two colleges, and the board set these actions as the first two orders of business on its agenda.

The board also was to consider at its 1 p.m. meeting a letter from a higher education study committee asking that site selection on the Stanislaus campus and a North San Francisco Bay State College be postponed.

The letter said that "very low in priority" and that there were "not less than five areas of greater need."

In somewhat similar situations in the past, the state has honored the mandate of the Legislature and has rejected the suggestion of a study committee. If that were to hold true today, the board would choose the sites for the Southern Alameda and Stanislaus colleges.

"If the board decides to obey the Legislature and ignore the

study committee letter and picks a site for the Stanislaus State College, then that decision probably will be the one on the North Bay site when that comes before the board in the near future," a spokesman said.

The board had under consideration three sites each for the Stanislaus and Southern Alameda colleges. They included:

Southern Alameda: Salt site, 330 acres along Whipple Road at the south city limits of Hayward. Hauschildt Ranch, 453 acres about three miles southeast of the Hauschildt site.

Stanislaus: One 240-acre site about two miles west of Modesto on Maze Road near Dakota Ave.; a second site of 230 acres on the southwest corner of California and Pauline Ave., intersection west of Modesto; and a third site of 220 acres at the intersection of Monte Vista and Geer roads north of Turlock.

In its letter to the board, the higher education committee planners said if a delay on selection of the Stanislaus site is not possible, the Stanislaus campus should be located in the extreme northern end of the county in the vicinity of Salida so it also could serve Stockton as well as Modesto, since 1951.

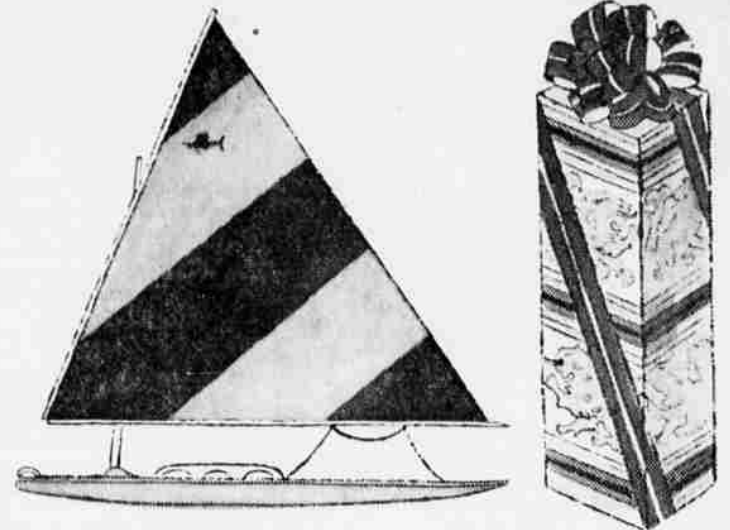

Dope Charge Facing MD

ALHAMBRA (UPI)—Dr. Charles W. Folsom, 53, faces a six-month jail sentence or a \$500 fine on a conviction of failure to keep accurate narcotics records while Tulare County health officer in 1958.

Folsom, who served a brief term as Tulare County health officer in 1953, was convicted by a jury here Tuesday but found innocent on a second charge of narcotics addiction.

He must appear in Municipal Court Jan. 8 for a probation hearing and sentencing. The doctor was arrested Oct. 28 after a lengthy investigation by the California Narcotics Board.

Folsom served with Philippine guerrilla forces and escaped from a Japanese prison camp during World War II.

Snow Awaited In Cascades

Heavy snowfall can be expected in the higher Cascades Thursday.

That was the warning from Weather Bureau forecasters at Portland today. They said a storm far off the coast of Oregon can be expected to move in Thursday, bringing rain to lower elevations in Western Oregon and snow to the mountains.

The snowfall is expected to start in the afternoon, continuing in the night.

Most of Oregon warmed today, as a small weather disturbance moved into the state. Among Weather Bureau stations, Baker had the low report, 14 degrees. Burns reported a low of 18, Klamath Falls 24, Pendleton 26, Medford 28, Eugene 31, Salem 33, Portland and Roseburg 35, North Bend 40, and Brookings 42.

Mystery Blast Rocks Germany

LUEBECK, Germany (AP)—An explosion shook the border region between East and West Germany today. West German police say they believe a Communist explosives depot blew up.

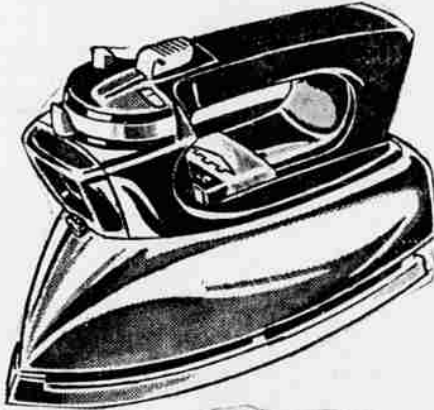
Officials said they heard two detonations and observed a 1,200-foot smoke cloud about a mile inside East Germany. The shock wave shattered windows in several houses on the West German side.

Police recalled small detonations had been heard from East Germany in the last few days. They said it appeared East German guards wanted to clear a wooded area for better control of the border.

The West German authorities theorized the charge used in this clearing work had been stored at a depot which blew up today, either by accident or sabotage.

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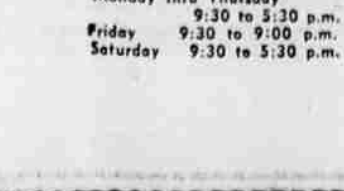
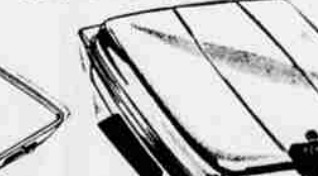
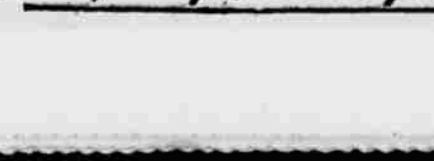
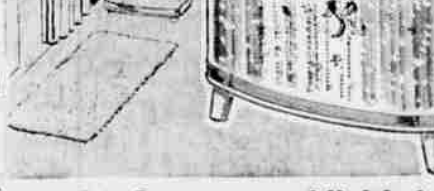
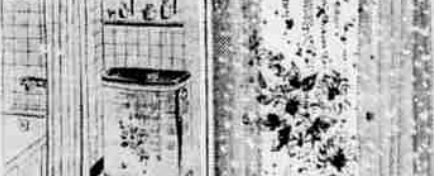
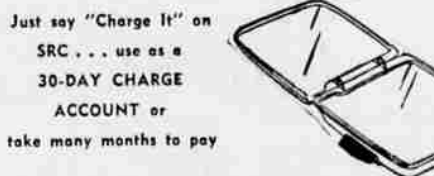
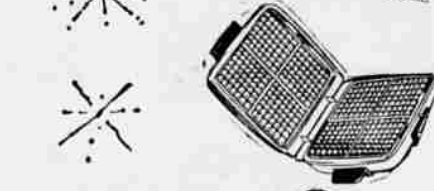
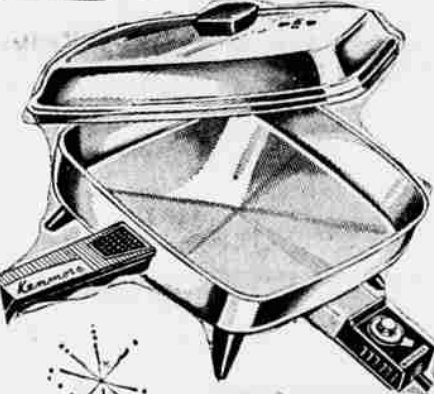
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
