WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed with a loss today. Final prices were around the lows for the session. Trading slackened after a vigorous start.

Volume for the day was estimated at 3½ million shares compared with 3,570,000 Tuesday.

Losses of fractions to a point or a bit more were the rule for most key stocks.

Some took wider losses, notably American Motors, down about 4. The electronics group also showed greater losses than the list as a whole. Texas Instruments and Motorola falling more than 3 apiece and Ampex about 4.

General Electric and Westinghouse Electric dropped more than a point each.

Litton Industries dropped about 3.

Counselors To Visit KU

A team of counselors from the State System of Higher Education is expected to visit Klamath Union High School Thursday, December 10, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

The session will cover preparation for college and other post-high school training. Representatives from each of the state schools will explain the academic offerings of each school and discuss their specific requirements.

Other members of the team will include Francis B. Nickerson, executive secretary of the High School - College Relations Committee of the state board, and a representative from Oregon Technical Institute.

The men are expected to stress importance of post-high school education and the need for adequate early preparation.

They also probably will describe adequate preparation and outline career opportunities, costs, scholarships and methods of applying for and enrolling in state schools.

Principal Willard McKinny said these guidance sessions are conducted annually as a portion of the standard guidance program designed to give students the complete picture of educational opportunities at public expense within the state.

Rogue Jurist To Get Case

Circuit Judge James M. Main of Medford has been assigned to hear the assault trial of Leon Merle Crawford of Chiloquin.

Notice of Judge Main's assignment by Chief Justice William McAllister of the State Supreme Court was received Tuesday by County Clerk Charley Delap.

Judge Main will set his own time for hearing the trial, originally scheduled for January 25. It also is definite that he will hear the case, Delap said.

Crawford's attorney, Glenn D. Ramirez, demanded disqualification of both Judge David R. Vandenberg of Klamath County and Judge Charles H. Foster of Lakeview on the ground they were prejudiced against the defendant. Only two such demands for disqualification are normally allowed, so the third judge named must hear the case.

Crawford, 23, was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon after allegedly pulling a gun on Chiloquin Chief of Police Louis Jones during a speeding arrest June 2. He was indicted by the October grand jury.

Fire Blamed On Chimney

A faulty chimney touched off a fire in a home at 619 North Eighth Street shortly after midnight Wednesday. Firemen nipped it in the nick of time.

Occupant Ellis Doty said he awoke at 12:45 a.m. He said he thought a living room light was on. When he investigated he found flames leaping from a wall.

Firemen said the wall was badly damaged. They added Doty was lucky to have been awakened. He, his wife and child all were asleep when the fire began.

City firemen also were called to the Anchor Hotel on Main Street early Wednesday, but the call turned out to be a false alarm, firemen said.

At 2:07 p.m. Tuesday they quenched a fire in the engine of a car belonging to Frederick C. Permann, no address given, at Fifth and Pine streets. Little damage resulted, a backfire through the carburetor apparently started the fire, they said.

They also were called to the home of Bob Mest, 2022 Benson, at 9:25 p.m. Tuesday. The Mests said their home was smoked up but they couldn't find the fire. Firemen discovered some fireplace ashes had slid down into a basement receptacle where they were smoldering.

Sheriff Asks Jail Closure

The county court received today a request from Sheriff Red Britton to close the Beatty jail for the "next six months of winter."

Britton said maintenance of the Beatty jail during winter months would be unnecessary because the county jail could be used, and the Bly jail could be available for emergency.

"I would just like to try this program for the next six months as I really believe we can operate without keeping the Beatty jail in commission," the sheriff wrote.

Britton said the October grand jury visited county institutions last week and "had nothing but praise for what they saw."

He thanked the court for authority to improve the county jail, and noticed that the standard of cleanliness set in the county jail had followed elsewhere in the county.

Police Detain Two Juveniles

Juvenile officers and city police said petitions have been filed or will be filed against two boys and court dates set for December 12, for both—believed responsible for separate crimes.

One, a 17-year-old, confessed to a series of thefts in the city, including several at Klamath Union High School, police said.

The boy was arrested Friday by city police. He admitted taking about \$100 from KUHS Wrestling Coach Delance Duncan's gymnasium dressing room locker in two forays in November and December. He also confessed this week to having stolen five textbooks and a binder from four students, and small change from six gym lockers, officers said.

He opened the lockers with a master key he found on a table while working last year in the gym for a custodian, he said. Other goods found in his locker at school and at home, which he said he stole, included an electric razor, a transistor radio, a pair of pliers, a crescent wrench, two padlocks, two ball point pens, a skinning knife and scabbard, a hunting knife and a pocket knife, two key rings and a pen light.

He took the goods either from other students' lockers or from various stores in town, police said the boy admitted.

City Police Juvenile Officer Ray Howard and county juvenile officers are continuing investigation. Officers also have filed a petition against another 17-year-old whom they say has admitted stealing a car from an alley behind 106 Martin Street in mid-November and driving it into Upper Klamath Lake.

The boy told officers he stole the car while a companion was working out in a gymnasium. The pair drove to Lakeshore Drive. The car began to miss severely, so he drove it down the boat ramp near Moore Park into the water, then got a ride back to town with a friend.

The companion substantiated the story, officers said. No charges have been brought against the companion.

The car belonged to Beverly Hyde of Klamath Falls. Police said it was soaked clear to the floorboards from the dunking it received.

Meeting Aims Tule Battle

TULELAKE — The controversy over the Tule Lake National Wildlife Refuge was discussed here Tuesday at a meeting of government officials, farmers and sportsmen.

Main purpose was to outline the dispute to Rep. Harold T. Johnson (D-Calif.), in whose district the refuge lies. He expressed hope the matter can be settled out of court.

The Tulelake Irrigation District has a contract with the Bureau of Reclamation to maintain water level at 4,034.75 feet above sea level, as prescribed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
