Holiday Decorations Demonstrated To Club

Klamath District Garden Club members and friends enjoyed an unusual treat when Marvin Black, Salem nurseryman, landscaper and flower arranger, presented a demonstration of arrangements suitable for the holiday season at the city library on November 21.

Marvin Black, who specializes in growing chrysanthemums, featured that flower in a number of his creations. Using a few "mums" in combination with dry materials, evergreen sprigs and Christmas balls he composed a number of eye-catching arrangements. A horizontal arrangement in a low, narrow basket included two large yellow chrysanthemums, several sprigs of juniper, a group of gold-colored Christmas balls set off by bunches of dry barley heads.

Using one large, green-centered, white chrysanthemum in combination with two large, chartreuse green candles and a cluster of Oregon grape on a large flat piece of white styrofoam he created a picture of breath-taking beauty.

Carrying out his style of "Oregon Casual," he used driftwood, rocks and other native materials to produce a number of original compositions. A tall, gnarled limb of jack pine on a piece of thick brown cork set off two heavy brown candles, resulting in a startling though pleasing effect.

Featuring a number of figurines in his designs the arranger stressed particularly the quality

of simplicity. A clay-colored madonna placed against a background of rugged pine limbs and lava rock reflected a feeling of reverence in its simplicity of treatment.

A figurine of St. Francis was the center of interest in a very large composition using lava rock and pink stepping stones placed at several levels to create the illusion of a garden setting. Andromeda used as background material gave the effect of trees while a scattering of hen-and-chickens in the foreground masqueraded as cacti. This unusual combination of materials radiated a spiritual quality appropriate to the Christmas season.

Introducing a touch of humor and giving rein to a lively imagination, Black amused his spectators with an original piece featuring a stylized black rooster against a white fence with greenery and colored balls placed at strategic points.

Two door swags, one representing the traditional, made of evergreen branches and colored Christmas tree balls and the other carrying out the modernistic theme, concluded an enjoyable and instructive day. The very modern swag featured three stems of white-sprayed artichokes against a green background made from an egg divider and set off by a large bow of multicolored ribbon with chartreuse and lavender predominating.

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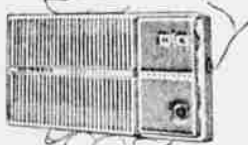


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
