'Be Careful,' Says Chief

Chief of Police Charles Howard this week asked city drivers to be a little more careful during the holiday season of petty road liberties which cause discriminating motorists to snort and which sometimes cause accidents.

His targets are drivers who stop to park without signaling, get out of the car on the traffic side, double park in heavy downtown traffic, and pull from a parking spot into traffic without looking back. Howard said his officers have been instructed to watch for the driver who double parks — even just for a moment — and to keep traffic moving in all lanes.

"Nothing," he said, "is more irritating to other drivers than the person who stops the traffic flow to discharge or pick up a passenger."

He warned, too, to be especially careful of traffic during the parking maneuver. Statistics for the first half of the year indicate the third most frequent cause of accidents is the parking process.

Rooters For Rockefeller Come Up With New Plea

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's rooters have come up with a new appeal they hope will offset Vice President Richard M. Nixon's identification with the peace issue.

As it was spelled out by Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.), the new challenge boils down to the contention that the New York governor is better equipped than the vice president to deal with the Soviet Union's economic threat to the West.

Javits told a news conference Wednesday he expects Rockefeller to develop the economic theme in speeches during a midwestern tour beginning Saturday. If the public reaction is good, Javits indicated this might be a compelling factor in getting Rockefeller into the race against Nixon for the 1960 Republican presidential nomination.

Rockefeller's supporters regard the economic issue not only as an attractive one but as very nearly foolproof politically.

In portraying a man who killed his stepfather, Grizzard was supposed to say, "Look, that night I dined with Jeannine at Mixin's... suppose the old buzzard were a different kind of buzzard."

Before reaching the first "buzzard," Grizzard hesitated for a fleeting moment and said something else, a seven-letter word that begins and ends with the same letters as buzzard.

An NBC-TV spokesman said it was a "psychological slip" occasioned by Grizzard's being too familiar with the original Broadway production.

"The play was taped earlier in the day," the spokesman added, "and nothing like this happened. But they decided to do it live because it needed that one more run-through."

The spokesman said 15 telephone calls were received and only four callers objected. "They objected violently to the use of a swear word on a show that included a Christmas setting."

Gas Pipeline Meet Slated

SALEM (AP) — Two staff members of Public Utilities Commissioner Jonel C. Hill will go to Washington, D.C., next week in an effort to speed construction of a 129-million-dollar gas pipeline that would benefit Oregon.

They will appear before the Federal Power Commission, which is considering Pacific Gas Transmission Co.'s application to build a line from Kingsgate, B.C., and across Idaho, Washington and Central Oregon into California.

Those going to Washington are chief engineer Dave Don and chief counsel Lloyd Hammel.

The company would sell at wholesale to companies which would serve customers in the Bend, Klamath Falls and Southern Oregon areas.

Ex-Call Girl Asks Divorce

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Pat Ward, former New York call girl who was a key witness in the Mickey Jekke vice trial, has sued for divorce for the third time.

Her suit, filed Tuesday, charges her husband, Dr. Charles Seaverson, an osteopath, with extreme cruelty.

An agreement, also dated Tuesday, gives her their house in near-by West Hollywood, alimony and support for their 6-month-old son. She is asking full custody of the child.

Jekke, heir to an oleomargarine fortune, was convicted on a compulsory prostitution charge in New York in 1953.

Boys To Aid Needy Tykes

ALBION, Mich. (UPI) — Some 150 youths at the Starr Commonwealth for Boys, in need of help themselves, will go without lunch Tuesday to help give needy Detroit children a better Christmas.

It has been a tradition since 1914 at the Commonwealth for the boys to have a "fast day" just before Christmas so they can raise money to contribute to some charity.

Although they are also trying to raise \$100,000 to match \$100,000 donated by the Knights Templar for a new recreation building at the school, the boys voted to donate this year to the Detroit Goodfellows Old Newsboys Fund, which buys gifts for needy children.

The boys go without lunch so the money that would normally have been spent on the meal can be contributed to a charity.

"Uncle Floyd" Starr, who founded the Commonwealth for wayward boys, usually matches the amount saved by the fasting out of his own pocket.

But he explained that he would make an exception this year because the money is needed so badly for construction of the new recreation building.

He said the money raised by the boys would go to the old newsboys fund but his matching contribution would go to the recreation building fund this year. He estimated the contribution to the old newsboys' fund would be about \$150.

The "fast day" was begun about a year after Starr founded his home for homeless and wayward boys on a farm west of here.

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China accused the United States today of using President Eisenhower's current tour to the detriment of the Peiping regime.

The charge was made by Peiping radio, official voice of Red China, in reporting on President Eisenhower's visit to Pakistan.

Peiping Radio said "The U. S. ruling clique has been making use of the current tour to openly carry out an anti-China scheme."

Space Monkey Takes Rest

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Sam the space monkey rested today while scientists worked to determine what his trip into space means to man.

He was shot 55 miles up last week in a Little Joe rocket from Wallops Island, Va. He was fished from the sea and sent to the Aerospace Medical Center at Brooks Air Force Base here. Today he is back at his birthplace, Austin, Tex.

Scientists here said Tuesday that one of the flight's main purposes was achieved when it was demonstrated that the container in which Sam made the trip worked well.

They are studying medical data gathered from the instruments attached to Sam to get his heart-beat, temperature, blood pressure and other reactions while in flight.
