NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed higher in heavy trading today. Early gains were reduced considerably. The ticker tape was late in final dealings.

Volume was estimated at 3,200,000 shares compared with 3,430,000 shares Wednesday. Motors were among the issues registering gains of fractions to around 2 points.

Chemicals were strong with Allied Chemical and Union Carbide up a couple of points. Rails were fractionally higher.

Steels, rubbers, mail order and retail firms, electronics and drugs all moved ahead. Avco was heavily traded and up more than a point.

Local Man Injures Hand

A Klamath Falls man whose hand was badly mangled in a machine at the Car-Ad-Co, Inc., manufacturing plant Wednesday night was reported recovering satisfactorily in Klamath Valley Hospital Thursday morning.

Delmar Stone, 44, 5619 Cottage Avenue, his mutilated fingers sutured and his hand in a cast, told hospital personnel he was injured by a scarier, one of the machines which processes door and window frames.

He underwent emergency surgery shortly after he was brought to the hospital at 8:50 p.m. Doctors reportedly joined severed tendons in some of his fingers. He was reported in a cheerful mood Thursday morning.

Kiwanis Club Meeting Held

Chief Satisfied, Says Secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Christian A. Herter said today that President Eisenhower has had extremely satisfactory discussions with foreign government chiefs on his present 11-nation tour.

Herter told a news conference that the public acceptance of the President in every country he has visited exceeded the greatest expectations which Herter and other U.S. officials had for the trip.

State Police Arrest Pair Wanted On Flee Charges

Two persons arrested on routine warrants this week have proven to be men wanted as fugitives from other states.

State police, who made both arrests, identified the men as Frank Dale Clinton Jr., wanted for escape in Washington, and James Harold Ridgeway, wanted for escape in Alabama.

Both men used other names. Officers said Clinton was arrested on a routine warrant from Medford where he is wanted for obtaining money by false pretenses (a bad check charge). Clinton's fingerprints were identical with those of an Albert Elwood Roe, who escaped from a veterans hospital in Walla Walla in January 1955, preparatory to serving a state prison term, officers said.

Clinton was not admitted being Roe, police said, although he permitted officers to take his fingerprints.

Ridgeway was arrested on a private warrant resulting from a family dispute. He was sentenced to 30 days on a vagrancy charge. The name he gave here was Charles Williams.

In the meantime, police said, it was learned that Williams, as Ridgeway, was wanted for escaping from a county jail in Alabama four years ago, also preparatory to serving a state penitentiary sentence.
