Singer Named In Tax Case
KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Clyde Julian (Red) Foley, 43-year-old radio and TV country music singer, was indicted on two counts of federal income tax evasion Thursday.

The federal indictments charge Foley, star of the Saturday night TV show "Jubilee, U.S.A.," filed false and fraudulent income tax returns for the years 1954 and 1955 and owes \$28,498 to the government.

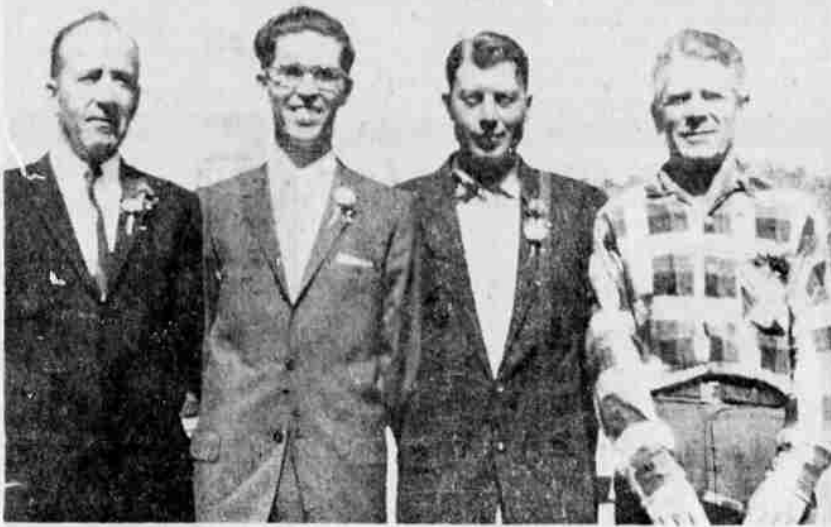
"I have gone over all my tax records with my attorneys and my accountant," Foley said at his home in Springfield, Mo. "Personally I know nothing about the law or the legal proceedings involved, but my attorneys have assured me I have violated no laws. We are confident that when all the facts are presented in court it will be clear that no law was violated either intentionally or unintentionally."

Two years ago the Internal Revenue Service filed a jeopardy assessment of \$270,323, which it alleged was income taxes due, penalty and interest for the years 1948 to 1955. The government collected \$214,435 from Foley's bank accounts. Foley filed a petition contesting the assessment.

That action, which is a civil case, is still pending.

People Have More Money To Spend On Christmas

NEW YORK (AP)—People have more money to spend and they're spending it for Christmas.

That's the report today from almost every section of the country as merchants ring up sales which they expect will be the biggest for any Yule season in history.

An Associated Press survey of 24 major cities produced predictions of gains ranging from 2 to 15 per cent over record 1958.

"It's going to be a crackerjack of a Christmas," was the report from San Francisco.

"Department store sales are really rolling," Cleveland reports. "This will be our biggest year," says Raleigh, N.C., merchants.

"Exceptionally good," report New York's biggest stores.

Merchants say the steel strike has had little effect generally on Christmas buying.

Store owners attribute the avalanche of buying to these factors: People earned more and saved more in 1959; prices are unchanged to only slightly higher than a year ago; credit is easier.

Credit cards spurred buying in Los Angeles. "At least the woman of the house thinks she has more money," said a department store official.

Shoppers are snapping up high-priced luxury items.

"The big price tag doesn't scare them anymore. They are more concerned with fashion and quality," says a St. Louis merchant.

Miami, Fla., reported a strong demand for furs and \$40 sweaters.

An Indianapolis store had to reorder \$100 suede jackets. In a North Carolina city, \$25 electric can openers are going good.

Marshall Field & Co. of Chicago expects to sell several \$2,000 assemble-it-yourself summer houses styled like a pagoda temple.

High-priced stereo and hi-fi sets are in general demand.

Shoppers are showing a practical side, too. "If you have a good bargain and they realize it, they grab the stuff like hotcakes," says a women's apparel shop owner in Kansas City.

The hot item in toys this year is a 36-inch doll that can be dressed in a 3-year-old girl's clothes. For boys the big attractions are space age toys such as

Desoto hasn't been as strong as in some years. But highly colored and decorated spats for girls are brisk in Desoto; red vests and gold shirts are sharp in Chicago.

Merchants reported advertised items sold well but that others did not.

A bus-trolley strike tied up most of Pittsburgh's mass transit.

Downtown department stores offered shopping service by phone and mail and expected their suburban branches to make up losses.

Triumphal Asian Tour Strengthens Ike Stand

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—President Eisenhower's triumphal tour of Asia powerfully strengthens his voice for the East-West summit conference with Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Eisenhower can sit down at the conference table backed by the cheers of millions of Asians who regard him as a symbol of peace with freedom.

Khrushchev will be facing a man who is proving to be his superior in appealing to Asia's teeming, underfed masses as a champion of their aspirations.

The hysterical, sometimes wishful, reception in Turkey, Pakistan, Afghanistan and India also may stimulate Eisenhower to exert more leadership at the Western summit session, opening in Paris Dec. 19, which begins shaping the West's negotiating position.

The diplomatic showdown with Khrushchev comes later, perhaps in April.

The frenzied reception by 1½ million Indians Wednesday stands out as a high point in the first week of Eisenhower's unprecedented goodwill trip.

Eisenhower and his top aides have been flabbergasted by the crowds which seemed to grow bigger and more deliriously enthusiastic at each stop.

Even before setting out, Eisenhower said he felt it his duty to make the tour because his name meant something in these areas and it might help in the quest for an enduring peace. The President was understating.

In each country he has visited, the government has directly or indirectly encouraged the people to show their like. But the fervor of spectators and the obvious sincerity of their cheers show the majority would have turned out anyhow.
