

Assistant School Chief Addresses Local Group

Parents and Patrons President Mrs. Joy Hills Gubser, assistant superintendent of schools for Oregon, spoke Monday night at the KUHNS Parents and Patrons meeting on "The Responsibility of the Community in the Education of its Children." She prefaced her remarks with the statement that they are applicable in any community in the state.

Mrs. Gubser said that the quality of education in any school district exactly reflects the people who live in that district and what kind of education they want and are willing to provide. "Education is for the unknown future," said Mrs. Gubser, "and must be based on enduring values."

She mentioned two different concepts of responsibility for education of children in a democratic society: (1) Some people without children feel they should not be taxed to support the educational programs; (2) Some taxpayers feel they have a vested interest in the schools. Both concepts are erroneous, she pointed out, because the payment of taxes to support

an educational program which is for the well-being not only of the individual, but also of the society as a whole, is the duty of the citizen.

Mrs. Gubser's answer to the controversy over "Who shall come to high school, and what shall be taught there," is in effect, "since our laws require that young people shall attend school until graduation or they have attained the age of 18; therefore, all shall

come to high school, and the school must help each to realize his own potential. The community ought consistently to develop this program and must jealously guard this development.

"The community must be alert to the role of education in our society. It is a different role than in Russia because of the great difference in Russian and American culture. It is possible to transplant a system of education without transplanting the culture that made it," stressed Mrs. Gubser.

In a section of her talk devoted to remarks concerning school boards, Mrs. Gubser emphasized how important it is for the community "ever to be alert to select to school boards, forward-looking, educated, well-rounded citizens," whose reason for seeking election is a public spirited concern for the welfare of the children, and for the development of the entire curriculum, rather than emphasis on single or isolated areas, to the exclusion of others.

In return, the community has a right to expect the school boards

to function in a business-like manner. A public statement of policy should be made mandatory, and the board must function according to known "ground rules."

Mrs. Gubser explicitly stated that it is a symptom of approaching trouble if a member of the school board will listen, as an individual, to individual complaints. Such matters should be brought to open meetings of the entire board. Another factor which makes for trouble is too many closed school board meetings.

In the matter of selecting an administrator, "It is vitally important for the community to select and employ an individual who has the capacity to administer," she emphasized. "There is probably no more difficult job than administrator of a school district." Some points of importance in selection of a person for this office are: He should be a good

thinker, a man of conviction, a learned and cultured person, and a good personnel man.

Mrs. Gubser also said that it was the board's responsibility to create a situation where a corps of good teachers is willing to remain. This occurs when the board

has a consistent system and the teachers know what it is. She emphasized that when good teachers are separated from a district for one reason or another, it is not the teachers who suffer, rather, it is the children of the district.

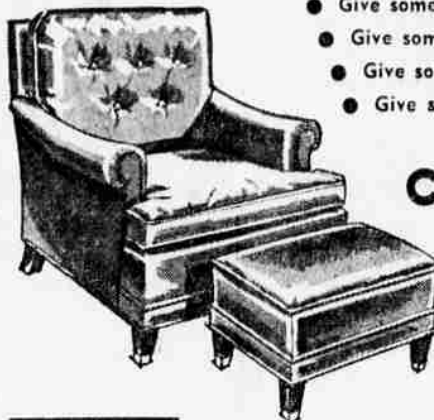

Employment Shows Drop

WASHINGTON (AP)—Employment dropped by over a million in November. Unemployment rose by over a half million.

That was the advance word on what a government job report due today will show about the November job situation.

The November survey was taken only a few days after the half million steel strikers went back to work under an 80-day court injunction. Much of the unemployment caused by the strike still was going on.

Employment in October was reported at 66,831,000 and unemployment at 3,272,000. In November the employment total reportedly sagged to about 65,600,000 while the jobless total rose to about 3,200,000.
