### OS Wins, UO Loses On Friday

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State's rangy Beavers treated their fans to a 67-52 victory over Montana State University in the opener of their home basketball season here Friday night.

The Beavers, with a starting lineup that averaged 6-4, started slowly and were behind 14-13 midway in the first half. Then they spurred to a 28-19 halftime advantage and coasted in through the final period.

Jay Carty, 6-7, and reserve Jimmy Woodland were high scorers for Oregon State with 14 points each.

The close-checking Beavers held the Montanans' ace scorer, Terry Srenear, to six points. Vince Ignatowicz topped the visitors with 13.

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP)—Montana State College, with Larry Chanay leading the way, handed the University of Oregon its first defeat of the season, 81-75, Friday night.

It was one of two first round games in the Treasure State basketball classic, Oklahoma City University beat San Francisco, 71-64, in the other.

Chanay sank his last six free throws as the visitors fouled in pressing to get the ball after the Montanans had gone ahead, 74-63, on guard Andy Matson's field goal.

Chanay wound up with 32 points, 20 of them on 27 tries at the foul line, for high scoring honors.

### KUHS Tops Millers 48-41 Friday Night

Friday night the Pelicans won themselves a hallday, 48-41, but not before they came mighty close to getting their tail-feathers singed.

Paul Bishop, who topped all scorers with a total of 18 points, counted eight big ones in the third quarter to keep his club in a game that saw the score tied five times and the lead swap ownership 11 times in the first three quarters.

At the end of the first frame the Pels trailed 12-11; led 25-24 at the half then managed a 37-33 spread at the three quarter mark off the combined efforts of Bishop and Don Eastman.

In the big third the Whitebirds failed to score until the period was four minutes old. Here, Eastman rebounded and sunk a long shot missed by Bishop to make the count 29-29. Bishop, on the next 3 1/2 minutes, hit four for four tries from outside and passed off to Eastman for another, to boost the KF five to the 37-33 lead.

KU's Bob Lewis fouled out with 7:01 left in the fourth period and on subsequent free-throws by Larry King, Springfield high-pointer, the Millers moved to 37 - 35, the closest they were to get for the balance of the game.

The Springfielders slapped a full-court press on the Pels that lasted for the remaining five minutes and from here on the Pelicans counted, with the exception of one field goal by Eastman, seven points at the free-throw line as the Millers were charged with seven consecutive fouls.

The rough, erratic game saw the Pels connect on only 17 of 60 shots from the field while the Millers made 14 of 53. The KU club hit 14 for 24 at the charity stripe and Springfield was good for only 13 of 27.

The shorter Millers dominated the backboards in the first half but the Pels took command in the last two periods. Both teams lost their "bit" man in the last quarter; Miller Jack Matthews, 6-5.

### Knick 'Runt' Files Claim

NEW YORK (AP) — Richie Garden and Knickerbocker records, both team and individual, were shattered, but it was Guerin who stole the spotlight. Richie hit on 18 of 31 field goal attempts and 21 of 26 free throw tries. His previous high was 41 points against St. Louis.

Guerin, in his fourth season with the Knicks after two years in the Marines, scored 20 points in the first quarter and 12 in the second stanza for 32 at halftime. He slumped to 7 in the third period but wound up with a flourish as he netted 18 in the last 12 minutes.

The Knick ace, equally effective in front and back court, was hampered with a bad back earlier in the season. Guerin broke Carl Braun's Knick scoring record of 47 points, set 12 years ago. He also eclipsed the Garden pro mark of 50, established by Philadelphia's Neil Johnston in February 1934 and the college standard of 56 two seasons ago by Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati.

Guerin's 18 field goals tied both Garden and Knick records while his 21 free throws bettered previous Garden and Knick marks.

MeMinnville (AP) — Jack Riley poured in 18 points Friday night and led Linfield to a 71-69 basketball victory over College of Puget Sound.

The score was tied eight times in the first half which ended with Linfield ahead by a single point, 33-32.

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## Don Carter Grabs World Keg Crown

CHICAGO (AP)—Any doubt as to the greatest bowler in the country was quickly dispelled Friday when Don Carter, the 33-year-old St. Louis native, won his second world's bowling title in three years.

While Carter was winning the men's title and a check for \$5,000, Olga Gloor, a spunky 38-year-old housewife and bowling instructor from Chicago, was capturing the women's crown before a packed Chicago Coliseum and a national television audience.

Carter's performance, which was all the more spectacular since he was in 71st place last Saturday among the 128 men.

Going into the final four games of the position round, Don needed one victory and when Billy Golembowski of Detroit won the first two games, the pressure was on the stoop-shouldered veteran.

Don actually won the title in the third game when he doubled in the tenth frame to win 186-180 and end Golembowski's hopes for the title. Carter added a little icing to the cake in the final game, winning 205-204.

This left Carter with a Petersen point total of 320.32 while Golembowski had 316.27. In third was Andy Rogoznica of Chicago with 313.05. Second place was worth \$2,500 and third \$1,250.

In the women's division, Mrs. Gloor came through in the final position round match to win her first major individual title.

Olga beat Donna Zimmerman of Akron in the two final games to take the title, worth \$2,300.

Mrs. Gloor finished with 149.02 Petersen points while Miss Zimmerman had 143.41 for second and \$1,250. Third place went to Janet Hurman, Whittier, Calif., who had 145.34 for \$625.

Individual scoring honors for the tournament went to balding, 41-year-old Lou Frantz of Louisville, Ky., who had a perfect 300 game in the qualifying round last Saturday and to Miss Sylvia Wene of Philadelphia who matched Lou's feat with a 300 in the finals on Friday.
