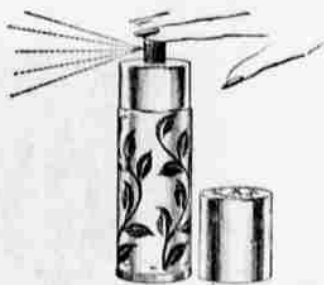
Special prizes were won by
