Steamed Pudding

"Steamed Date Pudding" is an unusual dessert that is sure to please family or guests. Chewy slice of fresh California dates are blended into a batter with finely grated raw carrot, raw potato and chopped almonds to give interesting flavor and texture.

These naturally sweet, fresh California dates, that come from the desert region of Southern California, impart a deep, rich flavor to this delicious dessert.

STEAMED DATE PUDDING

- 1 cup fresh California dates
 - 1/2 cup shortening
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 cup finely grated raw carrot
 - 1 cup finely grated raw potato
 - 1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup chopped almonds
- Pit and slice dates. Cream shortening, sugar and vanilla together until light and fluffy. Blend in carrot and potato. Sift flour with soda and salt, and blend into first mixture. Stir in dates and nuts. Turn into greased 2-quart mold and cover closely. Place in large kettle of boiling water, cover kettle tightly, and steam in continuously boiling water for 2 hours. (Water should come halfway up pudding mold.) Remove from kettle, let stand 5 to 10 minutes, and invert over serving plate to remove from mold. Serve hot, with hard sauce, vanilla sauce or with whipped cream.
- Makes about 10 servings.

Upside-Down Cake

- UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE
- 4 cup butter
 - 1 cup brown sugar
 - 2 large Washington apples, cored
 - 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 - 1/2 package white or yellow Prepared Cake Mix

Prepare the Cake Mix according to instructions on the box. Melt butter in 10 inch heavy skillet. Add the brown sugar. Slice apples about 1/2 inch thick and arrange over mixture filling spaces between with the chopped nuts. Sprinkle apples generously with cinnamon. Pour over all the cake mixture. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 45 minutes, or until firm. Whipped cream with a dash of cinnamon, or ice cream make a good topping for this. Serve warm or cold.

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
