

# Rockefeller Is Finding Good Reception On Tour

Editor's note: Pulitzer Prize-winner Helman Morin is accompanying Gov. Rockefeller on his visit to the Middle West, Southwest and South. Here Morin reports on the reception accorded the governor in the Middle West.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, touring the wintry Middle West today, is running into unexpectedly warm political weather.

In some places it turned almost tropical toward him. He drew overflow crowds in South Bend, Ind., and St. Louis, Mo. The majority of Republican chiefs in both states are reported favoring Vice President Richard M. Nixon as the nominee for president.

But as one of them put it, after seeing Rockefeller, "You have to take a good, long look at this guy. I was pleasantly surprised."

Again and again, rank-and-file Republicans in St. Louis said to him, "I hope you make the race." A woman said, "Governor, you've got to run now after so many of us stood in line this long."

Most significant, a number of people who shook Rockefeller's hand told him they are Democrats.

GOP strategists are painfully aware that, being outnumbered in registration by the Democrats, their presidential candidate must pull votes from the opposition party, along with independent votes, to win.

Last month, Rockefeller went to the West Coast.

The present trip across the Great Plains will be his last, he says, before he announces whether to try for the Republican nomination. He says he would like to be able to make it before Jan. 6, when the New York Legislature convenes.

On both trips, he invaded states where Nixon's strength is supposed to be overwhelming.

In both cases, there were clear indications that Republican leaders began having second thoughts after talking with him and seeing him in action.

An Indiana judge said, "People

around here have seen Nixon several times. They had never seen Rockefeller. I think he has changed some minds."

Sen. Homer Capehart (R-Ind.) offered to bet that Rockefeller would have half the state's 32 convention delegate votes if he makes the run. Capehart, alone among Indiana's top Republicans, is openly favorable to Rockefeller.

"I've been for Nixon for many years," said Missouri state chairman H. Kenneth Wangelin. "But I'm glad to see a good Republican like Rockefeller here. This reception shows great interest in him."

He referred to the biggest, noisiest, warmest welcome Rockefeller encountered on either trip. Some 4,000 people pushed and shoved through a hotel ballroom to meet Rockefeller Sunday afternoon.

"It's the biggest Republican turnout in 15 years," said Homer Cotton, a coal operator and party worker.

Rockefeller gave the crowd a peppy, jut-jawed fight talk first. The room thundered with applause.

"I think we're in business now," said John J. Schroeder, St. Louis GOP leader. He said he meant the Republican party in Missouri, which hit a low point last year when it elected only one congressman and no state officials.

Then, for nearly two hours, Rockefeller stood, shaking hands with people. Some told him they came from distant points in Missouri, others from nearby Illinois. Here are some word-for-word comments:

"I sure hope you run."  
"We're all behind you, governor."

"You look like the next president."  
"We're from Cyprus, Mo., and we're Democrats."

One man gripped Rockefeller's hand for a long moment, looked at him earnestly and said, "Governor, take second place on that ticket and we're sure winners."

Rockefeller smiled and shook his head. "I'd like to oblige you," he replied, "but I just can't do it." He has often said he would not be the vice presidential candidate.

After the hand-shaking marathon, Rockefeller went to a closed meeting with Missouri GOP leaders and some labor union officials. After that, he had dinner with a group of some 45 Missouri businessmen.

A Missouri Republican who asked not to be quoted said later he estimated Rockefeller could have "at least half" of the state's 26 convention votes.

From St. Louis, Rockefeller flew to Minneapolis. He planned to spend two nights and a day in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

He has prepared what his lieutenants say is a definitive speech on agricultural problems and probably will deliver it in Minneapolis.

# Bible Assists Policeman In Tough NY Neighborhood

NEW YORK (AP) — A burly high-ranking police officer, kneeling in prayer with a pair of teenage boys. This is a common scene at offices of the man who supervises law enforcement today in one of the city's toughest neighborhoods.

Deputy Inspector Conrad S. Jensen does the job—not just with a strong arm—but with spiritual stimulation. The Bible is his handbook.

"It's the only real answer for any situation," he says. Big, muscular, 48-year-old Jensen for 3½ years has commanded the 23rd Precinct, embracing Manhattan's discordant, racially variegated, gang-ridden East Harlem.

"What most of these people need," he commented in an interview, "is a little love and attention."

On the force 23 years, Jensen this month was promoted from precinct captain to divisional deputy inspector.

"I try to discharge my duties first as a Christian, then as a policeman," he said. "When a person comes to the place that he realizes the word of God does have the answers to the

problems of society, it is amazing what happens." In motley, jumbled East Harlem with its Italian-Negro-Irish-German-Puerto Rican population and the biggest concentration of youth gangs in town, the high crime rate has declined during Jensen's tenure.

He urged his force to make friends with residents, to help them with their troubles. Officers are sent into schools to make talks.

"We try to latch on to every opportunity to do good," he said. Jensen's office door is always open to any kid that wants to see him.

Jensen keeps a Bible on his desk. In discussions with upset families or worried teen-agers, he often reads pertinent verses, sometimes kneels with them in prayer.
