Indicts 14

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers announced that a federal grand jury at Jacksonville, Fla., today indicted 14 present and former guards at the Florida State Prison on charges of mistreating prisoners in violation of a federal civil rights law. Rogers said a far-reaching investigation by FBI agents preceded the department's presentation of evidence to the grand jury. He said the evidence involved mistreatment of inmates of the maximum security building in the prison at Raiford. The indictments charged violations of three sections of the U.S. Criminal Code which prohibit conspiracies to injure or oppress any citizen in the free exercise of any right or privilege secured to him by the Constitution and federal laws. Rogers' announcement said violations charged included conspiracy among members of the prison's custodial force to inflict physical brutality on prisoners for the purpose of administering summary punishment, as well as actual imposition of the brutality. The brutal treatment alleged consisted of shacking or chaining prisoners to the bars of their cells, sometimes without food or clothing, for periods ranging from 24 hours to a week or more. In addition, Rogers said that in some instances chained prisoners were sprayed with water under high pressure.

For three months they haven't been able to scratch their tails or lift a paw to scratch a biting flea—you must know how exasperating this can be. . . . It's up to you to see that these animals get what's coming to them."

The above letter was received when the zoo at The Pike was first installed and the animals housed in temporary cages. The following letter is our "classic": "Dear Persecuting Attorney: "I want that you should arrest Mrs. Swanson. She is no fit person to associate with us christian sales. She lives in that old green house across from the school and lets her husband drink beer in the backyard. "I asked her to make him stop and she called me an old biddy body and said a good bottle of beer is just what I needed. "When I go to the store she comes out and turns on her sprinklers so I have to cross over to the other side of the street to get back home. Please tell me if I can sprinkle her with my hose if I stand on my own property."

Field House
Bids Opened

Six bids for construction of a field house on Klamath Union High School grounds were opened at the Monday night meeting of the high school board of directors, district No. 2.

All of the general contractors who had taken out plans and specifications from the offices of Morrison and Howard, architects on the project, submitted bids. Bidders and amounts bid were: Vik Construction Company, Eugene, \$136,545; Brosthouse Construction Company, Klamath Falls, \$137,000; Riverman and Sons, Portland, \$138,751; Thompson - George, Inc., Portland, \$140,310; Gilbert Ballantyne, Klamath Falls, \$141,600; and McCormack Construction Company, Pendleton, \$147,397.

The bids will be reviewed and announcement of the board's decision is expected before the end of the month, according to John Howard, architect. Work is expected to start on the project as soon as weather permits in 1960. The field house is planned to incorporate the present natatorium, adding 8,144 square feet to provide field house facilities for both boys and girls. All facilities will meet the state's sanitary requirements.

125 Students
