

Psychologist Special Guest At Meeting

Charlotte David, Portland psychologist who is serving Klamath County one day each month, was a special guest at a meeting of members of the Klamath County Child Guidance Advisory Council Monday noon at the county health offices.

Miss David received her master's degree from Columbia University in 1943 and came to Portland in 1956 where she has continued her studies at the University of Portland. She has completed her work toward her doctorate with the exception of her thesis.

Her plans are to come to Klamath Falls once a month, arriving on Sunday so that the entire day on Monday can be spent on child guidance clinic work. She will spend Tuesdays in Medford and return to Portland on Tuesday night as her schedule requires her to be on duty at Morningside Hospital in Portland on Wednesday.

Miss David was introduced to the group by Dr. S. M. Kerron, Klamath County public health officer.

Phone Early, Official Says

Phone calls, like Christmas cards and gifts, should be handled early over the holiday season, says Thayne Cole, manager of Pacific Telephone in Klamath Falls.

Star At Turn Of Century Guarded Age Very Closely

NEW YORK (UPI)—Edna Wallace Hopper was a gentle and foolish and gay era when all the world seemed young and she was perpetual youth.

Any grandfather or grandmother can tell you. Edna Hopper was the Gay '90s right into the Roaring '20s. She was "Florodora" and stage-door Johnnies and the first face-liftings and women's diets.

She said her birth certificate was destroyed in the San Francisco earthquake. And so closely did Miss Hopper guard her age, that when she died of pneumonia in her New York home Monday the records showed that she was perhaps 85—and perhaps 95.

But her name brought the nostalgia of youth to any man old enough to remember bathtub gin and any woman who could remember her face glowing from the first beauty ads or those who saw the motion picture of her face-lifting operation which she took on a national lecture tour.

She was an overnight sensation on Broadway in 1933. Impresario Charles Frohman had seen the fragile beauty (she never weighed more than 90 pounds) in small parts and he engaged David Belasco to write for her the comedy, "The Girl I Left Behind Me."

She went from one success to another, reaching her top triumph as the starring lady Hollywood in "Florodora." And if you can't remember the Florodora Sextette and "Tell Me Pretty
