Real Thrill, Says Pilot Of F104 Jet

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The slim, sandy-haired pilot stood in the shadow of a needle-nosed jet and smilingly said, "yes, sir, it was a real thrill."

The real thrill was taking a Lockheed F-104 Starfighter up into the sky for almost 20 miles — a new world altitude mark — and the smiling pilot was Capt. Joe B. Jordan, 30, of Sweeney, Tex.

Jordan flew an F-104 to International Airport here Tuesday to talk to the press about his record flight staged the day before at Edwards Air Force Base over the Southern California desert.

His unofficial mark of 103,295.5 feet topped by 4,835 feet the altitude of 98,560 feet reached by a Navy Phantom II F-4H just a week before.

Jordan's mark has been approved by the National Aeronautics Assn. but to gain world recognition it must get the sanction of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale in Paris. Air Force officials saw no reason why it should not get international approval.

Jordan, standing almost at attention to his full height of five feet nine inches, remembered his Air Force buddies — the maintenance crew and the planners — as he politely answered questions of the press.

"The glory is mine," he said earnestly, "but I'm just a member of a real large team."

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—A demand for quick racial integration of public schools has been rejected by the Memphis Board of Education.

Hotel Work Scheduled

PORTLAND (AP)—Demolition of buildings on the site of the new 10 million dollar Hilton Hotel in downtown Portland will start early next month.

John L. Jersey Inc., which holds the demolition contract, said Tuesday the work was held back because the city wants to keep streets clear during the holidays.

Construction bids probably will be invited in mid-January with work scheduled to begin in February.

The 23-story, 500-room hotel is tentatively scheduled for completion by the fall of 1961.

Supreme Court In Japan OKs Stationing Of Troops

TOKYO (AP) — The Japanese Supreme Court ruled today that the "no-war" clause in Japan's constitution does not prevent the stationing of American troops here. The court also said Japan's own armed forces are constitutional.

The unanimous decision by the 15-man court was a blow to left-wing hopes of forcing the U.S. troops out of Japan, disarming the nation and neutralizing Japan in the cold war.

At issue was Article 9 of Japan's constitution. Written under the postwar American occupation, this "no-war" section declares that Japan forever renounces the possession of all war potential.

But the high court, in reversing a Tokyo district court ruling made last March, declared: "There are no stipulations in the constitution that deny Japan as a sovereign nation the right of inherent self-defense. The principle of peace in our constitution does not stipulate in any way complete defenselessness or non-resistance."

Japan's growing army, navy and air force—re-established after the Communist attack in Korea — are called self-defense forces. They are regular political targets of the leftists in Japan.

The opposition Socialist party criticized the court's ruling as a political decision "which has cast a serious blot on the history of Japan's judiciary."

A government spokesman said the decision "realistically reflects conditions in present-day Japan." The ruling strengthened the hand of Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi.

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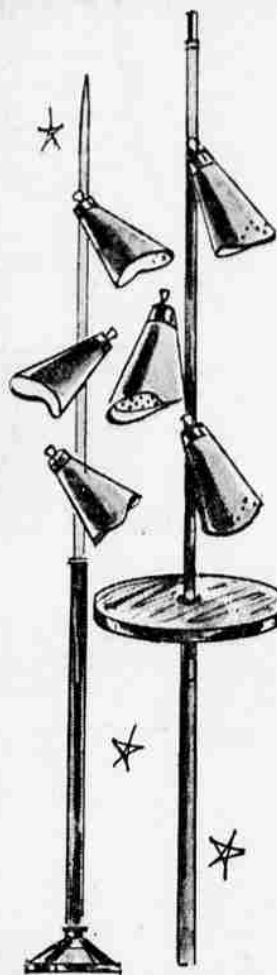
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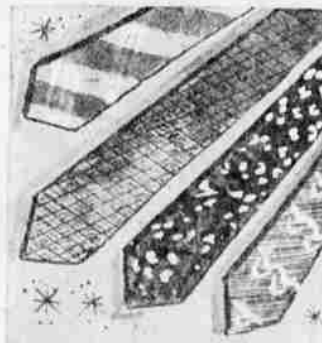

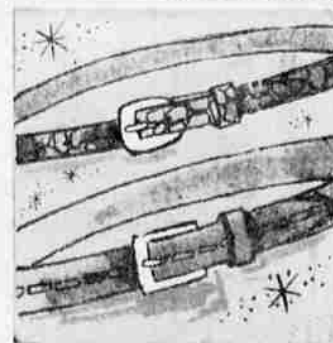
