NEW YORK (AP) — A final wave of buying pushed a rallying stock market higher at the close today. The ticker tape was late. Volume for the day was estimated at 3,200,000 shares compared with 3,040,000 Thursday. Gains of fractions to more than a point pushed a previously mixed market well to the upside. Ford was outstanding among motors, advancing nearly 3 points. Jones & Laughlin spurted about 2 then shaved the gain. U.S. Steel about a point, Republic Steel more than a point. Rails mounted a display of fractional gains. Chemicals were irregularly higher.

Tot Dropped By Dad, Dies

An 11-month-old boy, being tossed into the air by a playful father, died Thursday afternoon after being dropped to the floor. State police quoted the father, William Olen Gairson, 40, Route 1, Bonanza, that the baby slipped through his hands and fell to the bottom of a flight of stairs.

The baby, Gary Lee Gairson, rolled to the bottom of a five-or-six-step stairwell. The father and mother, Ethel Myrtle Gairson, attempted to revive the child through artificial respiration before help arrived. They were unsuccessful.

The child was dead on arrival at the Malin clinic. Death was attributed to a brain concussion. Officers said the incident occurred about 1 p.m.

District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said Dr. George Nicholson would be instructed to make an autopsy of the body.

Dismiss Plea Is Denied

A motion for dismissal of assault and robbery charges against Leon Pearson, 33, Chiloquin, and Cleo Williams, 31, Klamath Falls, was overruled Friday.

Circuit Judge Charles H. Foster ruled against the motion submitted by Attorney David R. Vandenberg Jr. on the ground that more than 60 days had elapsed between the time the pair was bound over to the October grand jury and the time the defendants were indicted.

Pearson and Miss Williams were indicted in the theft of \$180 and a watch from a Chiloquin visitor last July. The state maintained the victim was beaten and left in the street.

A third defendant, Wilford Hill, 21, Chiloquin, was acquitted of the charge by the grand jury.

Judge Foster set 11 a.m. next Wednesday for entry of pleas by Pearson and Miss Williams.

Assault Case Fines Paid

Two men found guilty Tuesday of assault and battery were sentenced to pay \$250 fines in district court Friday.

However the defendants, John Detto, 29, 2410 Watson Street, and L. M. Pate, 42, 525 South Fifth Street, asked leave of the court to delay payment of the fine until 3 p.m. today.

The request was made through Clifford D. O'Brien of Portland, the defendants' attorney.

Detto and Pate were convicted by a district court jury of assault and battery upon C. M. Lemacks of Medford on the Green Springs Highway November 14.

Hearings Set For Youths

Circuit Judge Charles H. Foster scheduled hearings in juvenile court today for five boys, aged 15 to 17, charged with delinquent behavior.

One youth, 17, was accused of larceny, a felony. He was arrested today for five boys, aged 15 to 17, charged with delinquent behavior.

Authorities also removed from the youth's own locker an accumulation of goods stolen from lockers or downtown stores. Included were five transistor radios, an electric razor, a pellet gun, a BB pistol, two high school locker combination keys, and assorted knives, rings and other small items.

Other cases before the judge: A 17-year-old who admitted stealing a car from an alley behind Martin Street and driving it into Upper Klamath Lake near Moore Park in November.

Two boys, 15 and 17, charged with taking joy rides in cars driven from store parking lots. The 15-year-old was involved in two such joy rides; the 17-year-old in four, officers said.

A 16-year-old considered beyond parental control. The boy also has a truancy record, juvenile authorities said.

Trial Dates Set For Trio

Trial dates were set by Judge David R. Vandenberg today for three prisoners who entered not guilty pleas in circuit court.

The judge set February 23 for the trial of William Christian, 49-year-old transient accused of attempted rape in a downtown parking lot October 26. Christian was judged capable of assisting in his own defense at a hearing earlier this week.

Trials for two defendants accused of assaulting a companion after a drinking bout are to be consecutive. The judge set February 29 for the trial of Louis Gibbons, 27, who with Charles J. Hood, 29, is accused of beating Cyril Bierle with a stove poker November 11.

Hood's trial is to follow Gibbons', the judge ordered. Both men are charged with assault with a dangerous weapon.
