Local Airman Passes Test

S. Sgt. Claude Martin Shoemaker, of Klamath Falls, has successfully completed an American Red Cross water safety instructor's course, according to Robert S. Wilson, American Red Cross director of operations for Europe and North Africa.

Sergeant Shoemaker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Brown, 2143 Orchard Street. He was a student at Arsenal Technical High School in Indianapolis, Indiana, before entering military service. He is now stationed with the Aircraft Gunner Group at Tripoli, Libya.

Tax Forms To Be Mailed By Assessor

The assessor's office has a stack of post-Christmas cards ready for mailing after the holiday rush. The cards are personal property tax forms.

Ray Brackman, chief deputy assessor, said the return forms will be mailed on the last few days of December to approximately 4,000 taxpayers.

The forms are to be filled out and returned to the assessor's office before midnight, March 3.

Personal property, Brackman said, includes just about any property used to make money. Under that category comes farm machinery, store inventories, livestock, and furniture and fixtures used in offices and business houses, apartments and rental properties. It does not include furnishings in a private home.

The value of personal property in the county has risen significantly in the last few years. In the 1955-56 tax year, personal property amounted to slightly more than 15 per cent of the true cash value of the total tax roll. This year it is about twice that percentage.

Last year, Brackman said, personal property in the county was valued at \$55,365,200 (true cash value).

The value will be less this year, however, because legislation switched some items from the personal property category to other tax classifications. As an example, house trailers now will be licensed (taxed) by the State Department of Motor Vehicles—and there are about 550 such trailers in Klamath County.

Another example: Fixed equipment in sawmills now is considered real property, and the loss in personal property values will be felt strongly here.

The 4,000 personal property returns compare with some 24,000 real property returns in the county each year.

It is from the forms, due March 3, that the assessor's office determines the amount of tax due. Statements are mailed by the tax collector's office in October, at the same time property tax bills go in the mail.

Brackman said taxpayers are responsible for reporting personal property, although the assessor's office is making every effort to send a form to each personal property holder.

"If taxpayers need more information, or help, I suggest they stop by or call the office," Brackman said. "We'll be very glad to help anybody who needs it."

Profit Noted By State Fair

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon State Fair made a \$66,750 profit this year, despite a 40,000 drop in attendance, an auditor's report showed today.

The fair's revenues this year were \$488,050, compared with a total of \$541,960 last year.

State Fair Manager Howard Maple said he was able to show the profit by cutting expenses.

Key California Solons OK Constitution Revise

BERKELEY (UPI) — A far-reaching constitutional amendment which would change the framework of higher education in California had the general approval today of key state legislators.

But the lawmakers made it plain that they reserved the right to amend the proposal in any way they saw fit.

The University of California Board of Regents and the Board of Education, which runs the state colleges, were expected to give the proposed constitutional amendment formal approval at a joint meeting later today. There were indications that Gov. Edmund G. Brown would attend the meeting.

The proposal called for a separate state college board of trustees and for a watchdog coordinating council over both the colleges and the university. The state colleges would get a limited right to grant "cooperative" doctorate degrees jointly with the university.

Thursday, in presenting the constitutional amendment, a survey team headed by President Arthur G. Coons of Occidental College indirectly threw down a challenge to the governor and the Legislature.

The team of educators recommended that if the governor failed to call a special session of the Legislature on the high education master plan, the constitutional amendment should go directly to the people as an initiative measure on the 1960 ballot.

This was a revised version of an earlier recommendation. Earlier, the team urged use of the initiative if the Legislature tampered with the proposal.

The original version had an immediate effect on the seven legislators present at the liaison committee meeting.

Sen. Donald Grunsky (D-Watsonville), chairman of the Senate Fact-Finding Committee on Education, said that legislators were elected by the people, and "whatever you do we can rewrite, override or disapprove."

Sen. George Miller Jr. (D-Martinez) said he personally was "optimistic" that the proposal would gain legislative approval, but he added, "If we think any substantive amendments are necessary, we'll jolly well make them."

Assemblywoman Dorothy M. Donahue (D-Bakersfield), chairman of the Assembly Education Committee, agreed that the plan "has a very healthy chance of survival."

Assemblyman Richard Hanna (D-Garden Grove), chairman of the lower house Rules Committee, said creation of the watchdog coordinating council might help convince lawmakers who were skeptical about a "regent-like" state college board.

President Clark Kerr of the University of California said that educators had taken the Legislature into consideration in drawing up the proposal.

"We face the greatest growth of any system of higher education anywhere in the nation," Kerr said. "We all wanted to avoid

"I think," he added, "there are more than a few businessmen who are interested in seeing another newspaper put into Portland."

Sponsoring Of Daily Paper Considered By NW Labor

PORTLAND (AP)—Labor took the first step Thursday toward what it says will be a labor-sponsored daily newspaper in Portland.

The Multnomah County Labor Council named a five-man committee to investigate whether to buy a paper, whether the Journal can be bought or if another must be started.

James T. Marr, executive secretary of the Oregon AFL-CIO, said this is a definite first step toward getting a newspaper. "I feel certain it is," he added.

The step was called for last week in a resolution from the Carpenters Union Local, which expressed the fear The Oregonian may buy the Oregon Journal in the course of the current newspaper strike.

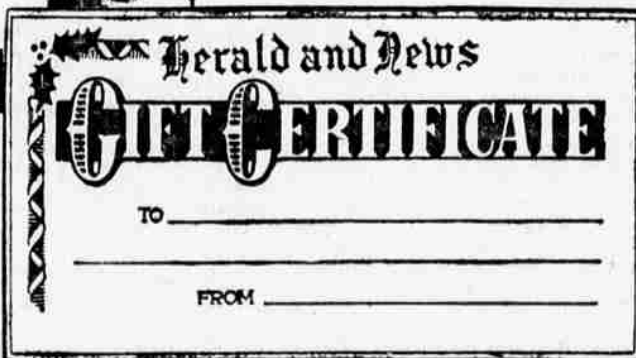
