Gifts Of Beauty For Your Hostess

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Safeguards Listed For Safe Holidays

Detour fire danger from your home this Christmas with these safeguards suggested by extension service foresters at Oregon State College.

Keep the Christmas tree watered. In a dry, warm room, a tree can require a quart or more of fresh water every day. A good share of Christmas tree fires may not start at the tree but travel from short circuits, lighted candles, sparks from the fireplace, matches or cigarettes carelessly left near flammable decorations, paper or trash.

Boxes, wrappings, decorations, gossamer fabrics and other dainty cottons will burn and start a fire without much prompting, says Charles Ross, extension forester. Combustible materials in the home, use of more electrical devices and a general relaxation of precautions are often the start of fires.

During the holidays, a bucket of water doesn't rate too badly as an extinguisher, reminds Ross. "Where there's smoke, there's usually fire" rings true on fires started by thoughtless smokers, Ross says. Careless smoking habits cause about one in four dwelling fires in Oregon. Last year, nine persons died from fires where the cause was listed as careless smoking.

Don't let combustible decorations and wrappings accumulate close to the tree, cautions Ross. See that wires or electrical lights on the tree are in good condition and not frayed. Ross recommends that the switch for the lights be placed at some distance from the tree, rather than right underneath it.

Leaving tree lights burning when no one is in the house is also playing with fire, Ross concludes.
