

Delinquency Eyed By Rock

NEW YORK (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller says he has a personal knowledge of juvenile delinquency because his son Steven was beaten up three times by a youth gang.

The governor said it was 10 years ago when Steven was 13. He said the beatings took place in Manhattan while Steven was en route home from school.

Rockefeller made the disclosure

in a panel interview on juvenile delinquency, published in the latest issue of the Ladies' Home Journal.

"Youthful crime and violence have increased in alarming proportions in recent years," the governor is quoted.

"You know, one of my sons was beaten up three times on his way home from school here in New York a few years ago. In fact, 32 boys in his school were attacked and beaten.

"Juvenile delinquency isn't some abstract problem of a group of unfortunate people remote from us. It is right here. It affects all children and all families directly and indirectly."

At that time, Steven attended a private school.

Housewives Are Target For Con Men

WASHINGTON (AP)—A housewife who would like to earn a few dollars at home is a favorite target of deceptive employment advertising, a spokesman for the Association of Better Business Bureaus said today.

Edwin M. Lockard, who is also general manager of the Baltimore Better Business Bureau, spoke today from a statement prepared for a Federal Trade Commission Conference on Deceptive Advertising.

He cited promotional matter put out by a Baltimore firm speaking of "numerous affiliations" with businesses needing envelopes addressed and chances to earn "\$35 or more per week for a few hours a night." Women were asked for two dollars "to cover cost of mailing, listing and registration."

Bureau investigation, Lockard said, disclosed that the advertiser was a newly formed company which could not prove it had work to offer. After a postal investigation, the firm went out of business and the Post Office returned to the senders the letters with the fee, Lockard said.

The FTC concludes today a two-day session for representatives of 47 consumers, civic and other organizations, seeking to strengthen defenses against misleading advertising and other deceptive sales practices.

Lockard applauded the effort but suggested care "to avoid creating a national psychosis that would cause the feeling that all advertising is suspect."

Killer Plans New Appeal

Convicted murderer James Quinton Anderson apparently plans to take his latest appeal for freedom into the federal courts.

District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said Anderson has filed a bill of exceptions to a ruling last fall which denied his latest legal appeal.

That ruling, made by Circuit Judge Jeff Darrah Jr. of Ontario, rejected Anderson's motion in the nature of a writ of habeas corpus. Anderson intended either to grant Anderson freedom or at least a new trial.

Beddoe said Anderson sought a settled bill of exceptions to Judge Darrah's judgment. The district attorney interpreted this as a step toward federal court appeal.

Anderson is serving a life sentence in Oregon State Penitentiary for the rifle murder five years ago of Richard David Miller of Tucson, Arizona. The murder occurred on a ranch near Beatty.

In Anderson's motion argued last fall, he maintained that Walter Garcia, the state's star witness, was actually Miller's killer.

Anderson at that time was represented by Attorney Louise Jayne of Portland. He was not so represented in his bill of exceptions.

Beddoe said he would not contest Anderson's request for a settled judgment.

Anderson has had two appeals denied by the state supreme court. An appeal to the United States Supreme Court was denied without opinion on May 19, 1958.

Accused Thief Given Probation

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A Houston man who got caught robbing a liquor store to get money for his wife, an expectant mother, has been freed on probation.

Michael Cotter, 33, pleaded guilty to a charge of holding up the liquor store Oct. 27. He was released on 10-year probation after the store manager, Ross Clawson, recommended clemency.

A new daughter, Mary Ann, born Nov. 25, was at home when Cotter returned Monday. His other five children smothered him with hugs as he walked in the door.

Video Actor, Mate Separate

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Efrem Zimbalist Jr. of television's "77 Sunset Strip" and his wife, Stephanie, have separated after 3½ years of marriage.

Zimbalist moved into a hotel Monday. He said the parting was a friendly one.

"Basically we both love each other," the actor said. "I feel sure that given a little time we'll be able to clear things up."

Throng Hears 'Messiah'

The first, possibly annual, community rendition of Handel's "Messiah" suite for orchestra and chorus drew nearly a capacity audience at Pelican Court, Klamath Union High School, Sunday evening.

Director M. Dale Hallack said everyone he spoke to liked the production—especially the performers, who want it to be annual.

The show, done by more than 300 student and adult voices and the high school symphony orchestra, was two hours long. It featured the better-known portions of Handel's work, originally written to last four hours.

"The performance was the best since rehearsal began," Hallack said proudly.

He lauded the 10 soloists particularly, and was high in praise of the remainder of the vocalists.

Most were members of high school vocal groups, but about 115 members came from the community, including a sizable delegation of Kingsley Field Air Force men or their wives.

'Music Man' To Be Filmed

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Meredith Willson's musical, "The Music Man," has been bought by Warner Bros. for what the studio calls one of the top prices ever paid for a Broadway show.

A trade publication said the figure was a million dollars or 10 per cent of the gross, whichever is larger.

Several motion picture studios had bid for the comedy—tale of a confidence man's visit to an early 20th century Iowa hamlet—now in its third year on Broadway.

Willson was unofficially reported in line for 60 per cent of the price as author and composer. The rest would go to Kermit Bloomgarden as producer and representative of investors.
