KU Wildcats Get Whipped By Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN (Special) — The mighty Chiloquin Panthers blasted the visiting Klamath Union Wildcats 67-47 here Tuesday evening in a fast moving contest that saw the Cats drop their third straight test of the season. KU's season record now stands at two wins and three defeats.

Coach Bob Johnson's scrappy freshman crew captured the preliminary tilt from the Chiloquin JVs by a score of 45-33, behind the 15-point performance of center Fred Kelly.

Speedy John Ochao and Ron Hoggarth, the Panthers' big guns, canned 20 and 18 points respectively. To nab high point honors in the match, Paul Harris, who fouled out in the fourth quarter, added 11 tallies to the winning cause.

On the other side of the ledger, the Wildcats, who worked behind the 13-point effort of Sherril Allen and the nine courtiers of Earl Brisson, held the host team to only a 17-12 first quarter margin, but finished the half at the short end of a 32-23 count. Dropping farther behind in the third, the Klamathites came out short in the 52-30 quarter total.

Reserve Dave Stippich came in the fourth quarter for the Cats and swished four consecutive gift shots and a field goal while adding his team greatly on defense. Teammate Gary Buchholz also helped the final period by his field goal and defensive work.

In the frosh match, the future Pelicans started the first quarter slow and shaky, but battled to a slim lead of 7-6 at the end. Working smoothly in the second, they rolled to a 20-16 count, and went on to lead in the third by a margin of 33-24.

Buffalo Next New League Subscriber

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Buffalo appears to be in line for the eighth spot in Branch Rickey's proposed Continental League, observers who talked to the baseball man here today believe.

Rickey and Bill Shea, the original organizer of the Continental, granted Dallas-Fort Worth the seventh franchise Tuesday.

The development came after a three-hour meeting between J. W. Bateson, owner of the American Assn. Dallas Ranger franchise; Amos G. Carter Jr., president of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram; Rickey and Shea.

New York, Toronto, Atlanta, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Denver, and Houston, Tex., previously had been granted franchises in the embryo league.

"Now that we have the heartland portion of the league formed with the four great midland centers of Minneapolis-St. Paul, Denver, Fort Worth-Dallas and Houston," Shea announced, "we are ready to finish the eastern wing."

It was obvious that Buffalo is ahead in the race for the eighth franchise.

Rickey, Shea and representatives from five of the other six cities in the league Monday held a meeting at Arlington, Tex., midway between Dallas and Fort Worth—with 200 Dallas-Fort Worth leaders.

After that meeting, Rickey, Shea and Allen Russell, owner of the Austin franchise in the Texas League, started holding conversations in Fort Worth with smaller groups. Bateson and Carter became the key men in the problem that had to be settled before Jan. 10.

"Things took an explosive turn," Rickey said. "The thing came to a head quicker than any of us expected."

Shea said Russell, who arranged the meetings with Rickey and Shea as a Continental League liaison man, is not in the franchise picture.

"We have dealt only with Mr. Carter and Mr. Bateson," Shea said. "They have, in effect, accepted responsibility of meeting the financial requirements for granting a franchise."

Carter and Bateson did not disclose the amount of money for which they are committed. But it is known that the standard price of a franchise is \$150,000 with \$150,000 available and another million dollars in reserve.

Trinity, who defeated Tulelake, 42-22, to win the annual affair, placed Ken Carpenter, the tourney's leading scorer, and Dixon Jones on the All-Tourney team. Three other teams — Tulelake, Lakeview and Fall River — also placed two members apiece on the squad, Bob Osborne and Joe Rogers were chosen from Tulelake, Jerry Parkinson and Frank Egenhoff from Lakeview and Dave Zumwalt and Earnest Bruce from Fall River.

Others chosen were Wayne Durlachide from Surprise Valley, Gary Krescoe from Big Valley and Bill Sauerdo from host Modoc Union in Alturas.

Fall River grabbed third place honors in the tourney by edging Lakeview, 45-43, in overtime Saturday night while Modoc Union won the consolation round by clipping Surprise Valley, 30-28.

Today's Sport Parade As Star Backs Go, So Goes Title Clash

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Baltimore Colts and the New York Giants go at it Sunday for the pro football championship and the outcome depends on a young man nobody wanted and an old gaffer nobody believes.

You could debate from now until the final whistle about the comparative strength of the defensive lines or the rival merits of the offensive platoons. It would be as decisive as any discussion comparing John L. Sullivan and Ingemar Johansson.

Because in the final analysis the game is going to be decided by and between young Johnny Unitas and Charley Conerly, the Methuselah from Mississippi.

Surprising scores from week to week more than hint that there is little to choose these days when two pro teams collide. Primarily it depends on which quarterback has the most magic at the moment and Conerly himself explains that, for this reason, "you can easily be a hero today and a ham tomorrow."

Both he and Unitas have sliced the ham mighty thin this season. For it was their talents in tossing the ball and directing the attack which led their teams back to a second straight championship meeting. The Colts took it, 23-17, the last time out on a sudden death verdict and are three point favorites to do it again.

That's because of Unitas, the 26-year-old who makes Horatio Alger look like a pessimist. Johnny had been turned down more times than a Bowery panhandler before Baltimore picked him up for a telephone call and started him to stardom.

On the other side is Conerly, the quiet man who never all but in defeat nor orates in victory and who, at 38, is the league's oldest player.

There are some who still reject Chuckin' Charley as one of the great quarterbacks in pro football annals. It has, in his 12 years with the Giants, become a habit to belittle him. Because back in 1952, when the Giants had no ends to catch the ball and no guards to keep out the onrushing tacklers, Charley ate the ball of often and took the brunt of the disdain heaped upon the team.

"It was so bad that several times I thought of quitting," he admits.

But Conerly hung on and, when the ends and the guards were obtained, year after year clung to the quarterback post. This fall he

was serious, speaking without rancor, when the Giants obtained the same Shaw displaced by Unitas at Baltimore.

"After 12 years, we finally have a quarterback," Charley said. Shaw started in a blaze of glory but never could replace Conerly and then, when the Oregon boy damaged the thumb on his passing hand, it was Charley who rode to the rescue once again — and flipped the Giants out of a scoring slump to the Eastern Division title and the playoff.
