Country Club Aides Named

Members of the Reames Golf and Country Club elected and appointed officers and chairmen at their annual meeting recently. Frank Tarr was elected president, Buz Larkin, vice president and George Kovich, secretary. George Brosterhaus, Frank Mosebar of Tulelake, and Jim Kerns also were elected to the board. Tarr, Kovich and Brosterhaus will serve two years and Mosebar, Larkin and Kerns one year. Kerns was appointed chairman of the Membership Committee, Brosterhaus of the Social Committee, Mosebar of the Greens Committee, Kovich of the Tournament and Golf Committee, Larkin of the House and Swimming Committee and Tarr of the Finance Committee.

Air Route Plea Planned

The chamber of commerce and the city have made still another pitch for air service between here and Reno. This time the appeal — which has been denied twice by the Civil Aeronautics Board — was put on a temporary basis. The chamber and city seek service between Klamath Falls and Reno from January 5 to April 4. It is at that time that the Olympic Winter Games will be held at Squaw Valley near Lake Tahoe. The petition notes that a large segment of the Pacific Northwest is sports minded, and could be expected to fly to Reno, via Klamath Falls, if such service is provided. The petition supports an application from West Coast Airlines for authority to establish the temporary route under an exemption order. The chamber and the city are not deviating from their position that air service between here and Reno is in the public interest, is needed, and would be profitable. Tucker's statement read: "When, or if, the CAB will consider West Coast's application is not known now."

Klamath Construction Firm Awarded Bid For KU Work

A contract for construction of a new field house at Klamath Union High School was awarded to Brosterhaus Construction Company, 1541 Elm Street, by directors of KUHS District No. 2 this week.

Six bids had been received at the bid opening on December 14 and the bids were taken under consideration for a week.

After discussion, alternates No. 2 and 4 were accepted by the board which resulted in the Brosterhaus bid being the lowest of the six received.

In plans and specifications prepared by the architects, Morrison and Howard, there were four alternates to the basic bid. Alternate No. 1, which was rejected, was for the demolition and removal of the present brick and masonry field house. Alternate No. 2, accepted, calls for underground electrical connections to the field house in order to permit full utility of the area. Alternate No. 3, rejected, covered the drilling of a new water well and the necessary connections. Alternate No. 4, accepted, calls for two separate pours of concrete for radiant floor heating in the new structure.

Total amount of the contract with Brosterhaus Construction Company is \$141,250. The basic bids received were all within a 10 per cent range in amount and there was less than \$2,500 difference in the three lowest bids.

"The bids were remarkably competitive for this time of year," John Howard commented after the bid opening.

The new field house involves construction of a 136-foot by 94-foot building incorporating the present natatorium and bringing it up to state sanitary standards. Ground area of the new structure will be approximately 8,144 square feet.

The school district will seek to negotiate a contract for demolition and removal of the old field house. The building is about 120 feet long by 30 feet wide. The exterior brick veneer extends up the walls about 10 feet, exclusive of window openings. Proposals may be submitted to the clerk of the school board at 619 Klamath Avenue.

Increases from 10 per cent up to 27 per cent were reported in 11 categories sampled by chamber Manager R. Frank Tucker.

The greatest increase was in the appliance business, whose sales were up 27 per cent over last year.

Other increases reported in Tucker's survey of things in 1959 and an estimate of things in 1959 were:

New and used automobiles, up 17 per cent; beer and soft drinks, up 10 per cent; bulk gasoline, up 16 per cent; department store sales, up 13 per cent; farm machinery and supplies, up 15 per cent; foods and beverages, up 20 per cent; groceries, up 22 per cent; lumber and hardware, up 15 per cent; men's wear, up 20 per cent, and shoes, up 20 per cent.

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Governor Of Minnesota Overstepped Authority, Three Judges Declare

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP) — Three federal judges ruled today that Gov. Orville L. Freeman went beyond his authority in using National Guardsmen to shut down the strikebound Wilson & Co. packing plant at Albert Lea, Minn. They told the company it could reopen the plant.

The judges held Freeman had no absolute power to declare martial law at Albert Lea.

Their ruling barred Freeman and the National Guard from interfering with the company's right to have "free and unlimited" access to the plant.

The court panel granted a stay of its injunction until midnight Sunday, however, to permit the state an appeal to a U. S. Circuit Court.

Freeman declared martial law at Albert Lea on Dec. 11 after violence broke out at the plant involving pickets and nonunion workmen who had been hired by the company to replace strikers.

"Military rule cannot be imposed upon a community simply because it may seem to be more expedient than to enforce the law by using the National Guard to aid the local civil authorities," the judges said.

Freeman's office said he would make no comment until the governor has had a chance to read the 12-page decision.

Wilson's president, James D. Cooney, said in Chicago the decision pleased him and that he hopes the court's opinion "will clarify Gov. Freeman's."

"A great many of our so-called liberal governors seem unable to distinguish between being candidates for governor and governor," Cooney said. "They are supposed to be governor for the entire state. Freeman is governor for everybody in Minnesota. One of his primary executive duties is to keep peace for everyone in his state."

The state's attorney general, Miles Lord, indicated prior to the ruling he would appeal if it went against the state.

The three judges—Circuit Judge John B. Sanborn, Dist. Judge Edward J. Devitt and Dist. Judge Gunnar Nordbye—said they are mindful of the necessity of preventing bloodshed. They acknowledged that property rights must at times be sacrificed to prevent the spilling of blood.

"But a free people do not surrender to mob rule by the expediency of martial law until all means available to the city, county and state to enforce the laws have proved futile," the court said.

In arguing against the Wilson & Co. move for a court order, Freeman told the judges last week: "People are today living that otherwise would be dead."

He ordered the National Guard into Albert Lea after two days of violence in which pickets upset some cars and stoned hundreds of other cars.

Members of the United Packinghouse Workers of America have been on strike since Nov. 3 in a dispute over work schedules. The company began hiring nonunion employees later that month after warning union members they would lose their jobs unless they returned.

Negotiations, broken off Oct. 29, were resumed in Chicago last week but were broken off Tuesday until after the holidays.

In requesting the restraining order, Wilson & Co. contended the Democratic governor bowed to mob rule.
