

# Brown Unanimous Choice Of Writers

NEW YORK (AP) — Jarrin Jimmy Brown was the only unanimous selection in the Baltimore and New York-dominated 1959 all-pro football team picked for The Associated Press by NFL writers today.

The explosive fullback of the Cleveland Browns, who led the league in rushing for the third successive season, was named to the first team on all 37 ballots. Ray Berry, Baltimore's brilliant end, and Sam Huff, New York's redoubtable linebacker, missed out on one ballot.

The Colts and Giants, who meet for the NFL championship in Baltimore Sunday, captured 12 of the 22 positions on the offensive and defensive squads. Baltimore landed seven berths and New York five. Cleveland, San Francisco and the Chicago Bears took two each and Los Angeles, Green Bay, Detroit and Pittsburgh one apiece.

Brown's backfield mates included Johnny Unitas, the peerless passer; Lemmie Moore, his Baltimore teammate, and Frank Gifford, the Giants superlative triple threat.

Del Shofner of Los Angeles, who vied with Berry for league pass catching honors, won the other end berth on the offensive squad. Jim Parker, the 270-pound Colt tackle, headed a devastating line that included Rosey Brown of the Giants in the other tackle position. Green Bay's Jim Ringo at center, and guards Stan Jones of the Bears and Jim Ray Smith of the Browns.

The defensive line with Huff as the spearhead included Gino Marchetti of Baltimore and Andy Robustelli of New York at ends; Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb, Baltimore's man moutain, and San Francisco's Leo Nomellini at tackles. Bill George of the Bears at middle guard and linebacker Joe Schmidt of the Lions.

The defensive backfield consisted of Jimmy Patton of the Colts, Andy Nelson of the Colts, Jack Butler of the Steelers and Abe Woodson of the 49ers.

The second team included such outstanding performers as Alan Ameche and Art Spivney of the Colts; Ray Wietecha, Chuck Conery and Rosey Grier of the Giants; Mike McCormack and Walt Michaels of the Browns; Bobby Layne, Dean Derby, John Reger and Jimmy Orr of the Steelers; Tommy McDonald and Tom Brookshier of the Eagles; Forest Gregg and Paul Hornung of the Packers; Frank Fuller of the Cards; Les Richter and Lou Michaels of the Rams; Yale Lary and J. D. Smith of the 49ers.

The biggest man on the first team is Lipscomb, the only member of the squad who didn't go to college. He joined the Colts after graduating from Miller High in Detroit. At 6-6 and 288, he is the bulwark of the Colts' defensive line. Nomellini, Lipscomb's counterpart, is a mere 255. The former Minnesota great, 22 is the veteran of the squad. Shomer, Brown and Woodson, 23, are the youngest. Patton and Nelson, at 180 pounds, are the lightest.

Jim Owens, the Husky mentor, continued a strict program of conditioning. Where Wisconsin enjoyed ideal training weather at Madison before flying west, Washington lost valuable time due to rainy weather at Seattle.

If Tuesday was an indication, the Huskies will make up the lost time. After a morning drill, Owens kept Washington at work for almost three hours late Tuesday, including a scrimmage that had the offensive team running out every play for the full yardage it could gain.

"Frankly, I was impressed," said Frobly writer Oliver Kuechle of Milwaukee, who has covered Wisconsin's grid teams since 1923.

"Washington is a real good football team," said Fred Gage, Madison radio sports expert and a former Badger star himself in 1938-39-40.

It was their first look at the Huskies.

# Boston Celts Extend Streak

Are the Boston Celts ever going to lose another National Basketball Assn. game?

Sure, but no one in the league is willing to say when.

The champion Celts stretched their winning streak to 13 games Tuesday night by blasting the Detroit Pistons, 136-104.

The triumph also enabled the Celts to extend a streak within a streak. This was the 10th game in a row they've won from the Western division clubs.

Now the Celts are approaching the all-time NBA record for consecutive victories. The record is 18 set by the defunct Washington Capitols in 1946-47.

In the other game of the Detroit double-header, the New York Knickerbockers turned back the Cincinnati Royals, 127-119.

The Pistons gave the Celts a fight until the second period was four minutes old. At that time, the Pistons were leading 48-47. But K.C. Jones erupted for 8 points and Tom Heinsohn pitched in with 6 and by intermission the Celts were ahead, 68-58. They had no trouble the rest of the way.

Bill Sharman paced the winners with 26 points, Bailey Howell had 25 for Detroit.

The New York-Cincinnati game was tied at 109-109 with four minutes to go when Charlie Tyra found the range for two baskets for the Knicks. Jack George added a half dozen points and the Knicks pulled out of range. Kenny Sears and George led the Knicks with 24 points each.

# Yakima Apples To Aid Huskies

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — Football fans in the apple growing Yakima Valley have a new theory on why West Coast teams don't do so well against Big Ten squads in the Rose Bowl.

It's all those oranges they eat, said the Monday Morning Quarterbacks of Yakima Tuesday.

So 5,500 apples, more than a ton, were sent off to Long Beach, Calif., to sustain the University of Washington Huskies as they drill for their Jan. 1 encounter with Wisconsin.

Local fruit companies donated the apples after hearing the tongue-in-cheek suggestion of the football boosters' group.

# UW Stock Going Up, Note Fans

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Washington football stock, never low, took a healthy rise today in the eyes of Big Ten observers.

It came after a socking scrimmage the Huskies put on at their Long Beach training site Tuesday with the press, both West and Midwest looking on.

The Wisconsin Badgers, well ahead of Washington in Rose Bowl preparations, worked less strenuously. Badger coach Mitt Bruhn scheduled a drill for this morning and dismissed the Big Ten champions for an afternoon at Disneyland.

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# Cuban Faces Ring 'Must'

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — This is the one Luis Rodriguez has to win, and he knows it.

The unbeaten welterweight from Camaguey, Cuba, ranked No. 2 among the challengers, meets third ranked Garnet (Sugar) Hart in the 10-round main event of the fight show at the Miami Beach Auditorium tonight.

If Rodriguez wins—and he's a 2-1 favorite—he is in a direct line for a shot at Don Jordan's world championship. And if Jordan doesn't defend his crown within the six-month period of grace which expires in January, Rodriguez would be the logical man to ascend to the throne.

This is the reasoning of promoter Chris Dundee, who says he has offered Jordan's manager, Don Knesseth, \$50,000 to meet the winner of tonight's fight, but has received no reply.

Dundee said he had tried to make the bout, which will be nationally televised over the ABC network starting at 10 p.m. (EST), a 12-round affair, but it was too late to make the change.

In his last three fights Rodriguez defeated Isaac Logart, Larry Baker and Rudell Stutch. After a knockout at the hands of Charles Scott, Hart defeated Logart by decision and kayoed Willie Johnson in the first round.

# Late Rally Wins For WSU Quint

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Little Doyle Wilson and Jim Hepton combined for eight points in three minutes Tuesday night to snatch a 64-58 basketball victory for Washington State over Arizona.

It was the Cougars' first victory in four games on the road. They took a 12-point lead in the first half, but Arizona struck back after intermission and raced to a 50-point lead with 7½ minutes to go.

With three minutes remaining, Washington State tied it at 59-56 and went on to win on the shooting of Wilson and Hepton. Arizona meanwhile was scoring two free throws.

Ernie McCray topped scoring for the night, with 23 for Arizona. Nick August was high for the Cougars with 13.

Don Osborne, 1959 manager of the Wilson team in the Carolina League, pitched for 14 seasons in the Pacific Coast League.

## Pels Keep Working For Medford Test

The Klamath Union varsity Pelicans have no game action scheduled until next year, January 2, to be specific, but that doesn't mean for a minute that they don't have plenty to do in the interim.

Coach Dean White has planned a heavy practice slate throughout the holiday vacation, the primary purpose of which is to prepare his club for the Medford Black Tornado invasion here the Saturday night following New Years Day. The Medford-Klamath clash is the feature attraction of the Southern Oregon Conference schedule. The same night the Grants Pass Cavemen will visit the Central Point court for a "counter" with the Crater Comets.

"The fact we have six straight wins to our credit doesn't mean a thing—especially to Mr. Roelandt and his boys. When they arrive here they'll come with blood in their eyes and we have to be ready," exclaimed White as he directed his club through long practice sessions that began Monday night and are to continue through Thursday.

Thursday morning at 10 the Pels come back to Pelican Court for a two-hour session, then rest over the holiday. Saturday morning they will again return at 10 and follow through drills at 10 Monday, 2 Tuesday, 10 Wednesday and 10 Thursday.

For the most part the squad is in good shape, but Freddie Blehn, junior guard, will miss a few sessions because of a run-down condition and a re-injury of his elbow. Paul Bishop, the Pels' scoring leader, although not ailing enough to miss practice, has been slowed considerably by a bad cough.

Bishop has collected 106 points over the six-game route for a 17.7 per game average. He has hit 43 field goals and 20 from the free throw line. His closest competition comes from big Bob Lewis who has 22 field goals, 14 free throws and an average of 9.7.

Senior guard Dean Dunson is running close to Lewis with 54 points and 9.0 mark. Sophomore Gary Patzke is next with 7.5 while Steve Binney and Don Eastman share the number five spot with 20-point totals.

During their first six games the Pelicans have scored 336 points for a 56.0 per game average while holding their collective opponents to 249 and a 41.5 per game mark. Pelican individual scoring to date:

The shooting of senior Chuck Rask almost single-handedly kept Oregon ahead in the early stages of the game. He scored his team's first 9 points and finished with a total of 13.

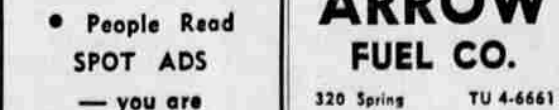
Oregon led only 20-18 at the half-time. During the last nine minutes of that period they were without a field goal.

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# 'Big O', Bearcats Conquer Strong Bradley Five, 86-71

Cincinnati's No. 1 rated Bearcats and their "Big O", Oscar Robertson, continue to be the scourge of the college basketball courts.

The powerful Ohioans, called by some the greatest college cage team ever assembled, faced their biggest test of the young season Tuesday night and came through with their sixth straight victory.

The victim was previously undefeated Bradley. The Braves, ranked fifth nationally, gave it a good try. Trailing only 38-35 at the half, Bradley trimmed Cincinnati's lead to a point, 44-43. But the Bearcats surged back with nine straight points and were never threatened again as they registered an 86-71 triumph.

As expected, Robertson was the big gun. He hit with 42 points to match his season's scoring average. The high-scoring All-America didn't really get going until the second half. Held to 18 points in the first half, Oscar stormed the basket for 24 markers after intermission. Bobby Joe Mason led Bradley with 21 points.

Other teams in The Associated Press top ten fared well. Ohio State's third-ranked Buckeyes rebounded from Monday night loss to Utah with a 91-79 triumph over Brigham Young. St. Louis, ranked seventh, whipped Kansas 66-59. Eighth-ranked Georgia Tech, topped from the unbeaten list by SMU Monday, edged out Texas Tech 63-60 for its seventh victory in eight starts. Ninth-ranked Indiana defeated a stubborn Butler team 91-85 in the opening round of the doubleheader played at the Butler Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

In other major games, Kentucky won from Temple, 97-92. Marquette turned back Stanford 63-50. Santa Clara beat Connecticut 54-47. Fordham drubbed Pittsburgh 80-68. Oklahoma City whipped TCU 74-63. Iowa conquered Loyola of New Orleans 68-60. Dayton flat-tened St. Mary's of Texas 79-53 and Mississippi won in overtime from Tennessee Tech by the low score of 37-36.

## Jittery Pittsburgh Cagers Suffer Ill Effects Of Bribe

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Pittsburgh Panther cagers, rocked by a reported bribe attempt in shades of the black cage scandals of nine years ago, may be feeling the ill effects.

Only Monday Dick Falenski, who had been averaging 17 points a game for Pitt, and John Fridley, the team's top rebounder, reported they had been offered a bribe.

Tuesday night the jittery Panthers suffered an 80-68 defeat at Fordham with Falenski scoring just 7 points, and Fridley 9.

A hearing for Dr. Edward H. Sebastian, 43, a nearby McKees Rocks dentist, has been postponed from today to next Tuesday because Fridley and Falenski were playing in New York.

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## Long Future Nearly Cinch For Elliott

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—Pete Elliott has a one-year contract as football coach at Illinois but the former Michigan star who has coached at Nebraska and California can look forward to a long tenure.

Elliott will be Illinois' third coach in 47 years. During that time the university has had a half dozen presidents.

The late Bob Zuppke—painter, writer and upset master—held the reins from 1913 through 1941. Ray Elliott did the coaching from 1942 through last season.

Zuppke, a great success in his first two decades, won only two championships following the departure of Red Grange, those coming in 1927 and 1928. From 1930 until the end of his coaching days Zup never came close to a title except for a third place finish in 1934.

Elliott had an 81-74-11 mark in 18 seasons, which included two championships, one tie for the title and two Rose Bowl victories.

Like Zuppke, Elliott could bring his boys up for that one big upset victory just when disaster appeared on the horizon.

Pete Elliott, 33, a native of near-Bloomington, Ill., inherits a team which finished with a 5-3-1 record and was regarded one of the strongest in the conference when the season ended.

Ray Elliott, who becomes assistant athletic director by choice, said "He'll have veterans at some positions and some others may be weak."

Probably the most interesting factor concerning Pete's appointment as Illinois coach is that he and Michigan's Bump Elliott make up the first brother head-coaching act in the Big Ten.

Pete, now the youngest coach in the Big Ten—Bump is 34—does not come to Illinois with any "boy wonder" tag.

In four years as a head coach in top college jobs, he has an unimpressive 14-27 record. His 1956 Nebraska team was 4-6. In 1957 he was 1-9 at California.

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
