Phone Facilities Installed At Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl

WEED—Telephone calls were placed to and from the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl Lodge for the first time last week when the new and unique telephone system (a microwave radio setup) was inaugurated.

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company was host at the lodge Tuesday noon to state and county officials, telephone company personnel and members of the press.

Floyd Dill, PT&T district manager, Yreka, paid tribute to those who were so enthusiastic in working for the development on the mountain, increasing recreation development in the area.

Sen. Randolph Collier was introduced by Dill and complimented the telephone company for the installation of the public service which is the latest development at the ski bowl, itself a dream of 17 years, completed only last year.

Collier hinted at the possibility of more recreation development in the future for Siskiyou County including Box Canyon, Copco Lake and Medicine Lake. Collier foresees a future for the county that would not have to depend entirely on agriculture, dairying and lumbering as in the past.

Senator Collier particularly emphasized the importance of county-wide unity and population cooperation to improve conditions and help stamp out problems which create an east-west, north-south friction. He expressed appreciation to PT&T for installation of the \$60,000 project at a cost of only \$5,000 to the ski bowl corporation.

James Jeffery, Chico, district traffic manager for PT&T having the ski bowl corporation for praise the perseverance to accomplish the project. He pledged his department's best efforts to cooperate in the operating end of the new phone system.

At the climax of the ceremonies Sen. Collier telephoned A. Wayne Barth, director of California State Recreation Commission and Dewitt Nelson, director of California Department of Natural Resources. Nelson is a former resident of this area who was stationed with the state forest service at Mount Shasta. A special transmitter and receiving system was set up so the whole group at the meeting could hear both conversations.

The microwave and radio system for the new toll service is cased in three steel lockers on the top floor of the ski bowl lodge at a 7,850-foot elevation and has a transmitter and receiver at the PT&T hut at Dunsmuir, as well as at the bowl. There is also a switchboard control at the bowl for the use of the management.

The toll booth is located at the entrance to the Konwitskan room. Calls to Weed and Dunsmuir are 15 cents; to McCloud and Mount Shasta, 10 cents; Redding, 35 cents and Yreka, 40 cents.

The communication system links the bowl with the outside world and its services provide a major development for the area. Calls to the bowl will be detailed by calling operator and asking for the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl. Servicing of the toll equipment will be handled by personnel from the Weed PT&T power station.

Starlings Are Back In Siskiyou

YREKA — The starlings are back. Siskiyou County Department of Agriculture reports the unwanted European starling, looking like a fat, black robin, has returned again to Siskiyou County. Last year at this time, thousands of these birds migrated into the Little Shasta and Tulelake areas and moved out in the spring. Indications are that another invasion can be expected this year.

Actually, these birds are not pests at all so long as they do not stay here through our normal growing season. At present they are feeding on juniper berries, weed seeds and soil insects. By doing this they are doing more good than harm. If, however, they should decide to make Siskiyou County their home, they could present a serious problem.

Although the European starling is most troublesome in urban areas with its unclean habits and noise, it can cause considerable damage to agricultural crops. Seedling plants of alfalfa and other crops are nipped off in great numbers by the birds. Crops liable to be damaged are rye, wheat, oats, barley, millet and clover, most fruits and vegetables, and bush berries, sweet corn, corn and sorghums.

Businessman-Diplomat, W. Cameron Forbes, Dies

BOSTON (AP) — W. Cameron Forbes, 89, businessman-diplomat whose governmental career spanned four different presidential administrations, died Thursday.

He had been in poor health for several years and had been confined to his room in a Back Bay hotel for the past few months. He was a bachelor.

Much of his diplomatic work was in the Far East beginning in 1904 when President Theodore Roosevelt appointed him to the Philippine Commission, governing

body of the islands from 1902 to 1916.

The climax of his government service came in 1930 when he was appointed ambassador to Japan by President Hoover. He remained at that post until 1932. He had planned to return to private business in 1931 but the Manchurian crisis that year delayed him.

President Taft named him vice governor general of the Philippines in 1908 and a year later he became governor general.

He kept that post until 1913 when he quit to return to private business. He was again called to service in 1921 when President Harding chose him and Gen. Leonard Wood as special investigators of the Philippines where clamor was growing for independence.

President Hoover summoned him in 1930 to serve as chairman of a commission to Haiti. With the completion of the commission's task, Hoover sent Forbes to Japan as ambassador.

Forbes had established himself as an astute businessman before he was called to government service. He began in 1894 as a bank clerk in Boston before joining the contracting firm of Stone & Webster.

He returned to banking in 1898 as a partner in the Boston banking firm of J. M. Forbes & Co.

He was a football player at Harvard where he was graduated in 1892 and later coached the varsity team of 1897 and 1898.

His 1898 team was one of the few undefeated and untied teams in Harvard's long football history.

One of his grandparents was Essayist Ralph Waldo Emerson. He was a Harvard overseer from 1914 to 1920 and also served as a member of the corporation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

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Three Perish In Headon Coast Crash

Two cars collided head-on near the Oregon coastal town of Waldport Saturday, killing three persons. One of the cars was driven by Lloyd Hyde, 28, Waldport. The other was driven by his wife, Lavone, 28.

Mrs. Hyde, one of the Hydies' children and a family friend suffered fatal injuries in the crash. This was the worst of Oregon's Christmas holiday accidents that claimed the lives of seven persons through midnight Saturday.

These deaths increased the state's toll to 45 this month in the Associated Press tabulation. So far this year 486 have perished.

State police said they understood that Mrs. Hyde was driving into town to get her husband. They said Hyde apparently was on his way home.

Hyde apparently lost control of his car and it crossed over into the other lane, colliding head-on with the car driven by his wife. Mrs. Hyde died outright. The Hydies' son, Randy, 5, died before arriving at a hospital. Mrs. Jean Townsend, 35, died at the hospital. The Hydies' daughter, Kathy, and Mrs. Townsend's son, Thomas, 14, who also were riding in Mrs. Hyde's car suffered non-critical injuries.

Lloyd Hyde's injuries were considered critical and he was transferred to a Portland hospital. His brother, John Hyde, 29, of Powers, Ore., who was riding with him, suffered minor hurts.

One of Saturday's fatalities occurred a mile east of Mapleton, when a car carrying five persons plunged off Highway 36 into the Siuslaw River.

Two boys and two girls escaped as the car settled upside down in 10 feet of water. The fifth occupant of the car, Emory Dennis, 15, Eugene, died.

Dean C. Austin, 21, Gresham, was killed by a hit-run driver as he charged a fire on North Denver Ave. in Portland early Saturday.

Police later took a man into custody for questioning.

William John Williams, 24, of Milwaukie, died in a two-car collision on the Oswego-Portland highway. Several others were injured.

The first recorded fatality of the Christmas holiday occurred earlier when Jim Marez, 35, was killed by a car at Nyssa as he walked across a street.

"He worked in Russia as a jazz singer," she said. "He made a study of singing modern music in English, French, Spanish, Italian, Russian and German."

"His wife, Asja, is a concert pianist. She likes to listen to jazz but refuses to play it," Mrs. Gross added.

Rescued Christmas Day by the Coast Guard, Jennie Sue clumped ashore at Port Everglades with just a suggestion of sea-legs—the only sound item of a \$4,000 cargo.

The Rev. Donald Powell, founder of the Mission Through Faith, said the supplies intended for the natives' Christmas were bought with his group's last resources.

"I don't know what we'll do at least Jennie Sue is safe," Powell said. The sea ruined quantities of food, clothing, stoves and gifts stowed in the 36-foot cruiser SP II.

Don D. Wallace of Hallandale and Nelson Shaw of Miami set out a week ago Christmas Eve in the boat for South Andros. On Christmas Eve a tanker, the S.S. Gulfube, found the SP II drifting 26 miles southeast of Miami. The tanker took off the men and dog but couldn't rescue Jennie Sue because of rough weather.

Christmas morning, Coast Guards summoned by the tanker reached the wallowing SP II and towed it to shore. The Coast Guard said the boat was "tossing like a chip, but the donkey stood the deck like an old sailor."

Jennie Sue was ready for a good helping of hay, however. Her Christmas dinner was pastebord manched from a stove carton on deck.

Water Resource Bond Act Opposed By Supervisors

YREKA—Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors has gone on record as opposing the state of California's controversial \$1,750,000,000 water resources bond act. The action was taken at a recent session when the board unanimously adopted a resolution of opposition.

Objections to the water resources bond act by Barr cited that it would cost taxpayers \$2.16 to get one dollar's worth of work. Barr also referred to interest on the large sum, which Supervisor Don Avery said would average 90 million dollars per year.

Supervisor W. C. Ealy expressed the opinion that such an act would be putting too much power in the hands of one man, in that the governor would be in a position to dominate spending of the water funds.

Tabled for future discussion by the board was a request for action on Tulelake area land appraisals submitted by Klamath Basin Water Users Protective Association and Klamath Sportsmen's Association. The request was for the completion of land appraisals and other action by the board for Tulelake, Upper Klamath Lake and Lower Klamath Lake.

The board also gave approval to construction of an access road to a sewage site in section 32 just south of Black Butte Mountain, 6 miles from Highway 99. Tentative approval for a use permit for the site has been given by the U.S. Forestry Service to use the area as a collection basin for a cesspool and septic tank refuse.

The district attorney's office was directed to study county ordinances and, if necessary, to draw up a new ordinance, licensing persons to clean out cesspools and septic tanks in the county. To be included in the ordinance will be a provision for fines of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for violation of dumping ordinances.

The supervisors delegated the board chairman and County Road Commissioner Al Powers to meet January 7 with the Yreka City Council to discuss use of gravel above the Greenhorn Dam Site. The Yreka City Council had refused an earlier request by Powers to set up a gravel hot plant two and one half miles above the dam site. Powers reported to the board that the city would realize royalties totaling \$6,000 for gravel from the area and that transporting gravel elsewhere would cost the county up to \$30,000 more. Gravel from that area would be used on the Oberlin Road project.

The board appointed Peter C. Bergman to replace Oscar B. Hammer, representative of the Tulelake area on the county planning commission. Hammer's appointment terminates January 1, 1960, at which time he indicated that he wished to resign from further service.

The regular meeting was adjourned for the board to visit the Oberlin Road bridge site opened for traffic recently.
