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Gratitude To US Expressed By Refugee From Ukraine

NEW YORK (AP) — It wasn't even Christmas for Nina Zozulina, but she out-santa'd the old gent himself.

Nina, a 35-year-old Russian refugee, runs a small grocery and luncheonette in a tenement area of Brooklyn. A Russian Orthodox Catholic, blonde Nina celebrates Christmas on Jan. 6.

But she has the yuletide spirit in her heart the whole year 'round. Take Thursday, for instance:

Two policemen, stationed across the street from Nina's shop, dropped in for their daily cup of coffee. When they placed their coins on the counter, Nina showed them back, saying: "There's no charge because it's Christmas Eve."

The patrolmen protested, but the lady was adamant. In they went for lunch. Again, no pay. The cash register was locked up. Things like this get around, whether its Park Avenue or not-so-fashionable Miller Avenue. Folks began lining up in front of Nina's store. Reported one of the policemen: "Some of the grocery orders were more than five dollars."

The cash register played no tune, but there was a hum of happiness and wonderment in the crowded store. Here was the Christmas spirit everybody talks about but seldom sees.

At the end of the business day, Nina's store was depleted but her contentment shone through gentle eyes. She softly explained:

"It is my only way of showing my gratitude for the way the United States treated me and gave me such wonderful asylum." Nina, who lives with her 64-year-old mother, was born in the Ukraine. During World War II she was sent to a German concentration camp. When the war ended, she wound up in a U.S.-run displaced persons camp.

Concluded Nina: "I am grateful, thankful and very happy. When I first came to this country seven years ago I was very confused and knew no one. Since then I have made many friends. Every-

Juvenile Curfew Successful

WASHINGTON (AP) — Signs shouting "Down with curfew!" once blossomed on some walls in the Washington suburb of Seat Pleasant, which has now grown proud of its curfew.

Since Nov. 1, no boy or girl under 18 may wander on the streets past 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and past midnight Friday and Saturday. Neither may youngsters loiter with friends in any establishment beyond those hours.

If they do, police may take them to Juvenile Court. And their parents and the owners of the establishment may be fined. In seven weeks of curfew, however, no one has been arrested or fined. The threat has been enough.

Police say not one young hoodlum has disturbed the peace of the community during this period. The nights of Seat Pleasant are quiet now.

They were not always. The curfew was installed, community officials said at the time, to protect Seat Pleasant from "raiding bands and juveniles from other communities who have come in wanting to do pitched battle."

Mayor Edward J. Goodwin has no misgivings about the curfew. "It's not just good, it's excellent," he says, adding he has received more than 50 letters praising the law and none against it.

"It represents an awakening on the part of the parents," Mayor Goodwin says.

Parents appear to be enthusiastic about the law. The enthusiasm from teen-agers, however, may be less sure.

On one hand, the Rev. Jerold K. Jones, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, says, "There are quite a few teen-agers in our church, and all the comment I've heard has been favorable."

But Bessie Beavers has a different report. "I don't think any of the kids like it, but it certainly gives us parents peace of mind. My 17-year-old boy doesn't like it a bit, but I do."

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CHAMBER COMMENTS

After last week's semi-facelift treatment of climatological, and certain other aspects of 1959, it might be well today to seriously consider the year from the standpoint of chamber goals accomplished.

The number one objective of the chamber this year was to initiate an independent, professional survey of hospital needs in the Klamath area. After one major reversal and several "detours," the objective is within sight. Nearly all of the \$8,000 needed to pay for a survey by Stanford Research Institute has been raised through voluntary contributions, and SRI's Dr. Mark Blumberg will meet with the chamber's hospital committee and the survey fund board of governors Wednesday noon to go over details of a contract for performing a four-month survey. A new, modern hospital is still many, many months away. There still is a great deal of hard work to be done, and sacrifices to be made. . . . but the first step toward the ultimate goal, small though it may be from the overall point of view, will be taken Wednesday, the next to the last day of the year.

1959 started out with a drive to refinance the chamber of commerce. . . . to bring its income up a point commensurate with the services and duties expected of a modern chamber serving a progressive and growing community. The campaign was a complete success from a financial standpoint, but more important was the fact that during the six weeks of the drive, more people than ever before took part in a chamber program and

learned more about chamber operation, policies and goals.

Later on in the year, a vital community obligation was discharged when a chamber committee spearheaded the drive to raise \$40,000 for the purchase of a new campus site for Oregon Technical Institute. Eighty per cent of the goal was reached in short order. Today, firm pledges account for another 12 per cent. The final eight per cent is expected to be raised by early January. Through this effort Klamath Falls and the entire county is assured of the continued presence and expansion of this fine institution of technical learning.

There were other achievements along the way in '59. . . . among them the construction and operation of the Centennial information booth at the California state line, and the series of visitations to the county's outlying communities. . . . Malin, Merrill, Bonanza, Chiloquin, and the Chemult-Crescent-Gilchrist area.

The year was not without its reversals and disappointments, of course, but 1959 must be counted as one of the more successful ones for the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce. A successful chamber year results from a combination of many things, most important of which are willing, active participation in the chamber's program by its members, and progressive, decisive leadership. In its many hard-working committee members and chairmen, its board of directors and its president, Bob Best, the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce came up with just the right combination.

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Casino Aids Lebanese

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A new four-million-dollar casino is part of a Lebanese effort to make this little Arab country an international playground.

The country is well endowed with natural attractions. Picturesque mountains rise from the blue Mediterranean. Lebanon has the best hotels and night life in the Middle East. And the climate any time of the year compares favorably with Europe at its best.

The Casino Du Liban, one of the world's largest, shows the optimism Lebanese have in their country's economy. Barely 15 months ago this country was in virtual civil war; business was brought to a standstill for five months. Today all that is forgotten, and Lebanon is riding on a wave of prosperity.

Lebanese businessmen who built the casino are spending lavishly. Jean Beuchet of Paris trained a special ballet for three months in the Moulin Rouge before bringing the girls to Lebanon.

The 16-man Orchestra Da Silva, well known in Cannes and Monte Carlo, is booked to play while guests dance. Special dishes are prepared by Raymond Roulet, one of the finest chefs in France.

But the big attraction is the vast gambling hall, with its 22 tables for roulette and baccarat.

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
