Ducks, Beavers Earn Classic Wins

Hawaii, Denver Defeated

CORVALLIS (AP) — The University of Oregon whipped Denver University 66-49 in the finale of the first round of Far West Classic basketball action here Saturday night after Washington State University had pounded the University of Hawaii 71-45 in the evening opener.

On Monday Oregon State will play Idaho and Washington State will take on Oregon in the championship bracket. In the afternoon consolation round, New Mexico will play Portland and Hawaii will play Denver.

In the final game of the first round Saturday night, Oregon moved to a 21-5 lead in the opening 10 minutes and held Denver without a field goal for 9 minutes.

Denver's squad was weakened by illness. Coach Hoyt Brawner was confined to his motel room with intestinal flu and the team was directed by assistant coach Troy Bledsoe. Two other members of the team also had light cases of flu but played. They were Dick Barrett and Clare Skov.

Oregon's 6-foot-7 Glen Moore was high for the game with 21 points. Jim Peay was high for Denver with 14.

The Oregon Ducks sank 25 of their 84 field goal attempts for a shooting average of 29 per cent. Denver sank 17 of 67 for 25 per cent.

In the first night game, Washington State used a fast break as its principal weapon against the Hawaiian Rainbows.

Hawaii jumped into the lead with 30 seconds gone on a jump shot from 20 feet out by Frank DeLauro. Washington State quickly tied the score and went ahead. From then on Hawaii trailed all the way.

The University of Hawaii used a zone defense but it collapsed repeatedly in the face of WSU's fast breaking. The Washington team consistently outscored Hawaii and scored many easy layins.

The high score honors were shared by 6-foot-7 John Maras of Washington State and 6-foot-9 Tony Davis of Hawaii, each with 17 points.

Davis excited the crowd with six sensational hook shots for field goals. DeLauro had 14 for Hawaii and Dwight Damon was second high for Washington State with 13.

Washington State's team was well-balanced and all 11 WSU players who got in the game scored. Only five players scored for Hawaii.

Reserves played most of the second half for Washington State after the Cougars gained a 10-point 33-23 halftime margin.

Hawaii's shooting from the field was poor. The Rainbows sank only 8 in 37 attempts in the first half and 16 of 71 for the game for a 22 per cent average.

Washington State sank 26 out of 84 for 31 per cent.

Caldwell Leads North To 27-17 Upset Of South Shrine Stars

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Army's fine passing quarterback, Joe Caldwell, bombed the South team mercilessly Saturday night and accounted for three touchdowns as the North scored a 27-17 upset in the Shrine's annual College All-Star football game.

Caldwell, operating behind a burly North line that gave him ample protection, threw a scoring pass to his "lonely end" teammate, Bill Carpenter, and set up two other touchdowns scored by Iowa's Don Horn.

These scoring flurries, one in each of the first three quarters, kept the North comfortably ahead all the way. Each team scored in the final period of a spirited game marked by several fist-fights.

A two-point underdog, the North, driving 73 yards for its first touchdown, scored on a 28-yard pass from Caldwell to Carpenter.

The second Yankee touchdown came easy, after Florida's Jack Westbrook of the South signaled

a fair catch, then fumbled a punt to Carpenter at the Rebel 23. Caldwell threw 17 yards to Iowa's Curt Merz at the South 3, from where Horn dashed across.

Gordon Speer of Rice kicked a 22-yard field goal for the South to make it 14-3 at halftime.

A rugged goal line defense by the Rebels kept the North from piling up the score in the second half as each team scored twice.

In the fourth period, the Yankees were stopped only a foot away from the South goal.

It was only the fourth win for the North in this series for the benefit of the Shrine's crippled children. The South has won seven and there has been one tie.

A 15-yard pass from Caldwell to Carpenter in the South 12 set up the third North touchdown early in the third period. Three plays later, Horn ran for the score that made it 21-13.

The South struck back late in the third to score on the passes of North Carolina's Jack Cummings. He completed throws to Dan Edgington of Florida, Al Goldstein of North Carolina and Roland Brandquist of Navy to take the Rebels to the seven, then threw to Edgington for the score.

Bill Garner, 6-9 center, topped Portland with 12 points.

Idaho hit 21 of 37 field goal attempts for a 57 per cent shooting average. Portland averaged 27 per cent, with 16 of 60.

In the opener, Bill Wold's jump shot sent Oregon State into an early 7-6 lead and the Beavers remained ahead the rest of the way.

Late in the first half, OSC pulled ahead 14 points but saw its lead whittled to 27-30 at halftime. Oregon State later padded its margin to 15, but New Mexico again shaved it quickly.

Several times late in the game, New Mexico pulled within four points, the final margin, but never could get any closer.

The mainstay of the New Mexico rallies was George Knighton, a 6-7 sophomore. At one point late in the game he scored six straight points in a minute. He wound up with 23, high for the game.

Karl Anderson, who is 6-10, drew the job of guarding New Mexico's stylish, 6-8 Billy Joe Price, and held him to two points. Anderson and Wold topped OSC's scoring with 11 points each.

New Mexico had the superior shooting average, 19 of 54 field goal attempts for a .352 percentage. OSC sank 22 of 74 for .297.

The Missourians, with a 48-player squad, arrived late Friday, and were sent through a limbering-up workout near their Miami Beach hotel.

Georgia was due here this afternoon.

Danny Devine, Missouri coach, obviously was apprehensive of Georgia's offensive power, pointing out the Bulldogs scored three touchdowns in the first half against Georgia Tech.

"They have probably 30 formations," Devine said. "They pick out three or four which they figure might hurt you most and use them in a game."

"I wouldn't say we have outstanding quarterbacks in Phil Snowden and Bob Haas. Maybe it's the comparison as we have played against such fine quarterbacks and passers this season."

Portland, NMS Fall In Opener

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State and Idaho opened the Far West Classic with victories Saturday afternoon, Oregon State downing New Mexico State 54-30 and Idaho trouncing the University of Portland 63-45.

Idaho had an easy time of it in the second afternoon game as it squared accounts with Portland for a defeat earlier in the season, 71-64.

The game was close only in the opening minutes.

After an 11-11 tie with nine minutes gone, Idaho slowly forged ahead and built up a 12-point halftime lead as the tall Portland team found itself frustrated by ball-handling violations.

Portland, which also had shooting troubles, failed to come close in the second half when both teams substituted freely.

Idaho had four players in double figures—Joe King with 17 points, Ken Maren with 14, Dean Baxter with 13 and Rollie Williams with 11.

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Pair Of Champion W's Meet In 46th Rose Bowl Chapter

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Comes now the 46th chapter in Rose Bowl football history, the oldest post-season game in the nation, and the 14th in the series between the Big Ten and the West Coast on New Year's Day.

A pair of champion "W's," Wisconsin from the Big Ten and Washington from the new Athletic Assn. of Western Universities, successor to the defunct Pacific Coast Conference, furnish the competition.

A crowd approaching 100,000 will gather in the famous old battle pit in the Arroyo Seco, and looking on will be a national television audience for the kickoff at 2 p.m.

It will be the fifth trip to the bowl for a Washington team, dating back to 1924, and the second visit by Wisconsin.

The Badgers' previous appearance was in 1953. They lost a heartbreaker to Southern California, 7-0, the only defeat in the series between the Big Ten and the PCC.

Washington is looking for its first victory, too. The Huskies tied Navy, 14-14, in 1924; dropped a thriller to Johnny Mack Brown and Alabama in 1926, 20-19; to Pitt in 1937, 21-0, and in a wartime intra-conference game, to Southern California in 1944, 29-0.

But past history is just that for the current rivals.

Wisconsin had a 7-2 record, winning over Stanford, Marquette, Iowa, Ohio State, Michigan, Northwestern and Minnesota and losing to Purdue and Illinois.

The Huskies' record was 9-1, their only defeat by Southern Cal, 22-15.

The Badgers are favored by some six points.

Swedish Quint Refused O.K.

NEW YORK (AP) — AAU Chief Dan Ferris said Saturday night a Swedish national basketball team had been refused permission to play a series of games in the United States because a professional promoter was involved.

The action caused a furor in Sweden. In Stockholm Ake Nilsson, president of the Swedish Basketball Federation, said the team would make the trip with or without the AAU's permission.

And in Munich, R. William Jones, president of the International Basketball Federation, said he found nothing wrong with the way the Swedish officials handled arrangements for the trip.

Center of the controversy is the new Swedish national basketball coach, Jim McGregor. Ferris said that he found out McGregor was arranging the tour "and to have a professional arrange such a tour is contrary to our rules."

McGregor is a native of Portland, Ore., and formerly coached national basketball and track teams in Greece, Turkey and Italy.

Among heads of state who are also golfers are President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Macmillan of Great Britain, King Baudoin of the Belgians, and Prime Minister Kishi of Japan.

Robertson Nets 47 Points To Set Tournament Record

NEW YORK (AP) — Oscar Robertson established a tournament record Saturday night, scoring 47 points to lead the Cincinnati Bearcats to a 96-58 victory over St. Bonaventure in the opening round of the ECAC Holiday Festival in Madison Square Garden.

A sellout crowd of 18,239 saw Robertson, the nation's top col-

lege scorer, sink 14 baskets and 19 of his 25 free throws, he was held without a basket from the floor for the first 12 minutes, but made five of his 19 one-pointers during this time.

In the opener of this evening's twinbill, New York University jumped into an early 31-17 lead and then held off a late Dartmouth drive to defeat the Indians, 78-68.

St. Joseph's of Philadelphia and Iowa advanced in the afternoon doubleheader. The Hawks, paced by Jack Egan's 28 points overcame a 16-point deficit to turn back Manhattan, 84-70. Iowa, with 5-8 Mike Heitman scoring 22 points, eliminated favored St. John's of Brooklyn, 91-84.

The underdog Bennies were never in the running, although they made a game try of it in the first half. Unable to score for the first 2½ minutes, the Bennies fell behind 28-13, before rallying in the final minutes to trail by 39-30 at the half.

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Billikens Belt Bluejays 84-66

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Seventh-ranked St. Louis slapped Creighton 84-66 Saturday night with a hot shooting first half, balanced scoring and control of the backboards.

The Bills, now 8-2 for the season, ran up a 50-30 halftime lead by hitting 54 per cent from the field, then coasted in, using all 15 players.

Pete McCaffrey led the Billikens with 18. His teammates on the big St. Louis front line gave him strong support. George Burkley, a 6-foot-7 lefthander, hit 17 and Bob Nordmann, 6-foot-10 270-pounder, scored 12 and pulled down 16 rebounds. Backliner Ken Mankowski hit 11, all in the first half.

The Bluejays, now 5-2 for the season, were outclassed from the start. Dick Harvey, a 6-foot-7 frontliner, was the game's top scorer with 21 points. It was the first meeting since 1948 between the two clubs, once arch rivals and perennial antagonists for the Missouri Valley Basketball title. Creighton since has withdrawn from the Valley.

St. Louis' biggest lead was 23 points, at 74-51 with five minutes left.

Player Tops Bolt JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) — British Open Champion Gary Player of South Africa finally won a match from former U.S. Open king Tommy Bolt in their pro golf challenge series Saturday.

Player, who lost the first three of the five-match series, scored a 7 and 6 victory at the Bemoni Country Club. Player was nine under par for the 30 holes played.

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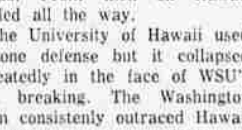
