

British Launch Manhunt; Appeal Issued To Public

BIRMINGHAM, England (UPI)—Police appealed today to the frightened passengers of a No. 6 bus to come forward and tell what they could about the blood-stained man who boarded the bus shortly after a killer decapitated a YWCA girl last Wednesday.

British newspapers took up the cry and tried to shame the 39 still-silent passengers into speaking up. They called the killer the most sadistic in the annals of British crime and said no one was safe as long as he remains free.

So far only one passenger and the conductor have told police of seeing the man who boarded the bus near the YWCA but neither knew where he got off. He was stained with blood so badly no one would sit by him or occupy the seat after he left.

Conductor Bill Humphreys said the man offered his fare in a blood-stained hand but refused to give his destination.

The most valuable information thus far came from Mrs. Evelyn Peake, 27, who told police she saw the killer suspect waiting for the bus near the YWCA, slumped against a wall.

She said he explained his blood stains by saying in an "educated

voice" "I had a fall. I'll be all right when I can get on a bus."

She described the man as "about five foot seven with fair, curly hair and wearing a hip-length American type jacket."

Margaret Brown, 21, another resident of the YWCA, also was attacked but was not critically hurt because her hair, worn in a thick knot, softened the blow.

Both Miss Brown and Mrs. Peake were being kept under guard for fear their lives might be endangered.

The killer attacked friendless, unemployed 29-year-old typist Stephanie Baird, apparently with a bag of stones, then beheaded her with a pen knife.

YORK, Pa. (AP) — "The devil told me to stab my four children and my husband," a 39-year-old woman told state police.

They arrested Pauline E. Ampsper Sunday on charges of murdering her infant son, Jackie, 9 months old, and her eldest child, Joan, 6. Each was stabbed several times in the chest.

Mrs. Ampsper's husband, Sylvester, 62, a laborer, told police his wife awakened him Sunday morning and said Jackie was dying.

He found the boy bleeding. A few minutes later he said he heard Joan whimpering and saw his wife coming from the girl's bedroom with a paring knife.

The Ampsper's other two sons weren't harmed.

Mrs. Ampsper was held without bail after a hearing at which a psychiatrist recommended that a sanity commission examine the woman.

The U.S. Navy announced Christmas Day, 1941, that a Japanese sub had been sunk off the California coast but did not give the exact location. A spokesman for the Japanese navy's history section said, "We have not heard of any Japanese submarines lost in that area."

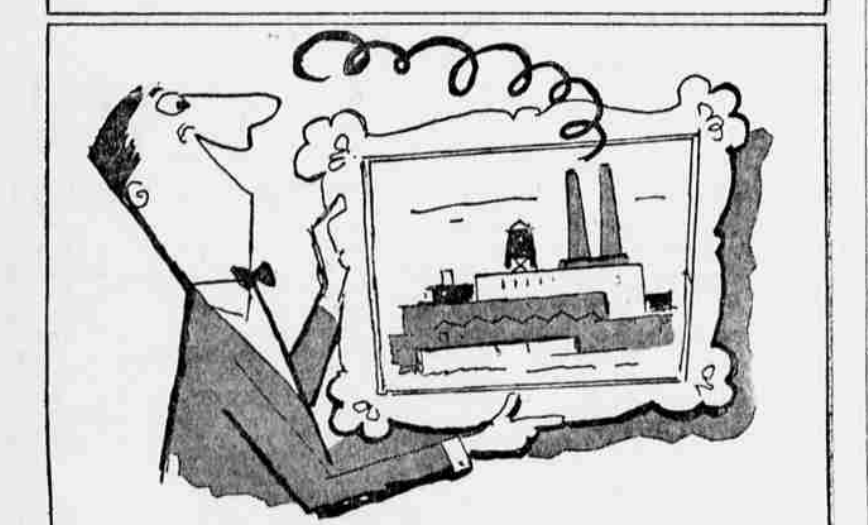
The Japanese Disabled Veterans Assn. reported the imperial navy records showed no submarines lost near Los Angeles "throughout the entire annals of the Pacific War."

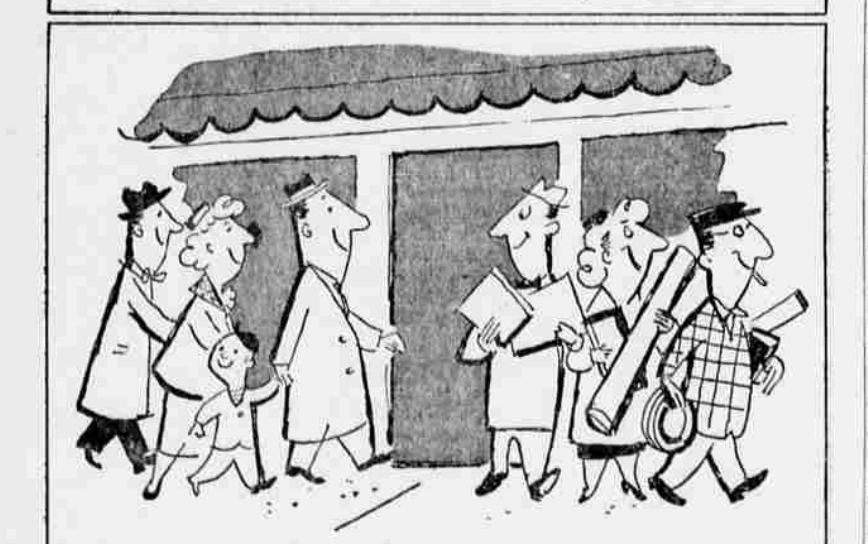

And a doctor gave the children free medical checkups.

Japan Denies Sunken Sub

TOKYO (AP) — Former Japanese submarine officers expressed doubt today that a Japanese submarine was sunk off Los Angeles harbor in World War II.

The claim of American diver Bob Bell that he had found the hulk of a Japanese sub in 50 feet of water near the Los Angeles breakwater sent naval sources here scurrying for records.
