

Outside Help Requested In Ohio Sniper Slaying

PAINESVILLE, Ohio (AP)—Lake County's sheriff, admittedly baffled, asked outside crime experts today to help solve the Christmas Eve sniper slaying of Charles R. Clark in nearby Mentor.

Sheriff William B. Evans said he would release from custody today Floyd E. Hargrove who had

in turn denied, admitted and then again denied firing the fatal shot. A polygraph test Monday indicated Hargrove, 35, a truck driver, had lied when he admitted Saturday and again Sunday that he killed the husband of the woman with whom he carried on an eight-month love affair.

Evans asked the state to send

its mobile crime laboratory to Mentor. He also wants Cleveland police experts to examine the lead slug that pierced Clark's right temple.

It was the failure of skin divers to find the rifle with which Hargrove said he fired that slug that cast doubt on his profession of guilt.

Hargrove, divorced father of five, said he decided after a 16-minute meeting at the jail Saturday with Lois Clark that he "could spare her and her family any further investigation and suffering by confessing."

"I love her deeply, I'm worried for her welfare," he explained. Mrs. Clark, a beautiful brunette of 30 who was a model in Florida where she met and married Clark at 16, has admitted sex relations with six men besides Hargrove, Sheriff Evans said. Three

of these men were observed by polygraph tests Monday, the sheriff said.

Clark, 35, a \$10,000-a-year electrical engineer, was buried Monday after services in the Mentor Methodist Church where he was Sunday School superintendent. His wife said he never knew of her relations with other men.

Evans said he planned to question Mrs. Clark today "without the lie box" but may use it "if she's calmed down enough." She has been under sedation much of the time since the slaying.

Mrs. Clark has told the sheriff that she went to Cleveland on Dec. 24 to buy two corduroy shirts as a gift for her husband. She said she was in another room with three of the Clarks' four children, Clark at 16, has admitted sex relations with six men besides Hargrove, Sheriff Evans said. Three

Unander Appointed By Ike To Federal Maritime Board

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Sigfrid B. Unander, Oregon state treasurer since 1953, was appointed Monday by President Eisenhower to the federal Maritime Board.

The temporary White House here announced that Eisenhower plans to send Unander's nomination to the Senate after Congress reconvenes Jan. 6.

Unander, 46, a Republican, will serve out a term that ends June 30, 1961. The vacancy occurred through the Dec. 21 resignation of Ben Guill.

The three-member board regulates shipping rates on service between the U.S. mainland and Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, and acts on subsidies for ship building and conversion contracts.

Unander, notified in Portland of his appointment, said:

"The President has conferred a great honor on Oregon. As for myself, I look forward to this important assignment."

"My resignation as state treasurer will go forward to the governor at the proper time. Matters of the state treasury are up to date and all accounts are in first class condition."

SALEM (AP)—An aide to Gov. Mark Hatfield said he is considering five or six persons for appointment as state treasurer after he receives Sigfrid B. Unander's resignation from the position.

Rep. Shirley Field, Portland, and Lee Ohmart, Salem, a former legislator, have indicated they will seek the Republican nomination for the position.

Unander's four-year term expires in Jan. 2, 1961.

Tar Admits Being Wrong

HONOLULU (UPI)—A 21-year-old sailor told police Monday that he was wrong when he said earlier that comedienne Joan Davis urged him to flee the scene of an auto accident.

Richard H. Gray, a hospital corpsman at Tripler Army Hospital, suffered a broken nose and two black eyes when he was beaten by the occupants of the other car involved in the accident.

Gray said the other car overtook him when he attempted to flee after sideswiping the vehicle. Miss Davis and a companion, Miss Virginia White, were passengers in Gray's car at the time of the accident.

At first, the sailor told police that the 47-year-old comedienne advised him:

"Keep on going. I'll pay for the damage of your car. I don't want any publicity about me."

However, Gray said Monday that he "lost a lot of blood" as a result of the beating and apparently didn't know what he was saying.

He explained that he meant to say that he himself did not want any unfavorable publicity for Miss Davis—so he kept going despite her pleas for him to stop.

Miss Davis has been in Honolulu for the past two weeks for her \$125,000 damage suit against a Honolulu beauty salon. She claims bleach was spilled in her eye at the salon in 1954.
