Fat Gate Predicted For June Title Bout

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Now that a rematch with Floyd Patterson has been arranged, world heavyweight champ Ingemar Johansson jokingly said today he'll be even lazier in training than he was for the bout that brought him the title.

The return bout, set for June in New York at either Yankee Stadium or the Polo Grounds, was announced Monday by Edwin Altkvist, the champion's adviser, and Roy Cohn, the New York attorney who heads a 10-man promotional group.

In an interview, Johansson said he was all set for the return, despite a little too much of his mother's cooking.

"Just before Christmas," Ingo said, "I was just over my best fighting weight, 196 pounds." He was 196 when he knocked out Patterson in the third round last June in Yankee Stadium.

Asked if he plans to train as he did for the first meeting with Patterson, Johansson said he always trains the same way.

"As lazily as you did before?" he was asked.

"This time," said Ingo with a grin, "I will be lazier."

One of Johansson's favorite subjects in speeches and at appearances is a recital of boxing writers' criticism of his seemingly lazy training methods for the first bout.

Ingemar met with Cohn and several other members of the promotional group and under night over a smorgasbord and TV lights.

Cohn, former counsel to the Senate investigating committee headed by the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, and his associates recently bought full control of the old

Cohn said he will make a formal application to the New York State Athletic Commission for a promoting license.

Promoter Humbert (Jack) Fugazy, a member of the Cohn group, predicted a gate of 14 million dollars for the return bout.

Under terms of the contract formerly held by Rosensohn Enterprises, Johansson and Patterson each would receive 25 per cent of the gate plus an equal split of 70 per cent of radio, TV and movie receipts.

Ewbank's Five-Year Plan Runs Exactly On Schedule

BALTIMORE (AP) — "You're great, and we're going on and on," Coach Weeb Ewbank told his Baltimore Colts after they won their second consecutive National Football League championship Sunday.

Only four other teams in 27 years of NFL playoffs have won consecutive titles, and no team has won three in a row.

Ewbank's confidence shouldn't be taken lightly. His announced five-year plan for a Baltimore championship came through right on schedule last year.

The Colt players were especially happy with the wide margin of their 31-16 victory over the New York Giants in Sunday's playoff game. Some critics had suggested the Colts were lucky to edge the Giants 23-17 in overtime for their first title year.

"You win the title one year, and some say you're lucky," summed up offensive guard and linebacker Steve Myhra. "But we've won it twice, so I hope they'll say we've really got something going for us."

George Halas, owner of the Chicago Bears, seemed to agree. He said in Chicago Monday night that "I definitely would class the Colts with the great teams I have seen."

Willamette Tops Humboldt 75-64

CHICO, Calif. (AP) — Larry Lynn scored 31 points and led Willamette to a 75-64 victory over Humboldt State in the Far Western Conference annual basketball tournament Monday.

Whittier, the other visiting school, also posted a victory, 68-51 over Nevada.

Willamette led 39-28 at the half and then coach Johnny Lewis cleared the bench as his team built up an 18-point lead.

1959 Bowl Fever Mounting Rapidly

Huskies Favored

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A surprising tide of favoritism for the Washington Huskies cropped up today among members of the press corps here to cover the Rose Bowl New Year's Day.

One poll of writers, television and radio men came out to 53 favoring Washington to win to 39 favoring Wisconsin, the Big Ten champion.

A less extensive poll came out 17-15 favoring Wisconsin. The Midwest voted solidly for the Badgers, the Northwest unanimously for Washington.

Professional odds still favor Wisconsin by at least six points. One-day workouts remained in effect for both squads today while Coach Milt Bruhn continued his barred-gate policy for all West Coast writers.

Big Jim Owens confided that he is feeling somewhat better over the condition of his Huskies and said "by game time I think we will be all right."

Bad weather at home, as well as a missed key workout here, hampered the Huskies' training program.

Bruhn apparently had no such concern. "We are on schedule and I hope we will be ready to play a real fine football game New Year's Day," Bruhn observed.

Syracuse Gets Nod

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Football fever is rising here today as the time neared for 103 young huskies to move in for the twenty-third Cotton Bowl game.

Texas and Syracuse both came to town Wednesday — Texas from its Austin, Tex., base and Syracuse from Houston, where the Orangemen went to train with favoring Wisconsin, the Big Ten champion.

UO's Moore Injured

Oregon, Oregon State To Meet For Title

CORVALLIS (AP) — It will be an all-Oregon final in the Far West Classic basketball tournament here tonight.

The two Oregon teams, defending champion Oregon State and the University of Oregon Ducks, posted semifinal victories Monday night. OSC edged Idaho 49-48 and Oregon whipped Washington State 63-48.

The two losers will play in tonight's opener for third place. The consolation round in the afternoon pits New Mexico State against Denver for fifth place and the University of Portland against Hawaii for seventh.

In Monday's games, Denver beat Hawaii 76-59 and New Mexico defeated Portland 66-61.

Oregon's victory came at a high cost. Glenn Moore, the Ducks' top scoring 6-foot-7-inch sophomore, turned an ankle and will not be able to play today.

X-rays taken Monday night showed that Glenn Moore's ankle was sprained, not broken, but it was doubtful if he would see action in Tuesday night's finals against the Beavers.

'Big O And Company' Still Top College 5

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Big O and Co., formally known as Oscar Robertson and Cincinnati, still top the nation's college basketball teams in the weekly Associated Press poll of sports writers and sportscasters.

The voting was conducted over the weekend, so the results of Monday's tournaments were not a factor. Robertson had solidified Cincinnati's position by scoring 47 points in Cincinnati's 96-56 rout

of St. Bonaventure in Saturday's first round of the ECAC Holiday Festival.

Cincinnati drew 57 of the 100 first place votes, West Virginia received 27, California 14 and Utah five. In the point total, Cincinnati led West Virginia 932-879.

West Virginia, idle last week, edged a bit closer to Cincinnati in the balloting despite Cincinnati's triumph over Bradley and St. Bonaventure. West Virginia, with All America Jerry West, is competing in the Los Angeles Classic with such other high-ranked teams as California and Illinois.

California was rated No. 3 in the voting, moving up on its victory over Michigan State. Utah advanced two pegs to the No. 4 position by handing Ohio State its first defeat and also knocking off the College of the Pacific. But the Utes lost 63-52 to Duke last night in the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C.

Ohio State drew solid backing and ranked fifth. There was a wide gap between Ohio State and sixth-place St. Louis which defeated Kansas and Creighton during the week. They have an important date Saturday with Bradley.

Close behind seventh-place Indiana came Illinois, which took a perfect 5-0 record into the Los Angeles tournament.

There wasn't a new face among the top 10, just a shuffling. However, Miami (Fla.), Toledo, Wake Forest and DePaul moved into the second 10, displacing Michigan State, LaSalle, Texas A&M and Southern California.

Oregon State was ahead through most of the first half. Then Idaho tied it up with three minutes to go and moved ahead 24-22 at the intermission on a jump shot by Gary Floan.

Floan, who sank 7 of his 8 field goal attempts in the first half, was high scorer with 17 points. Jerry Carty led OSC with 15.

Kingsley Five 64-63 Winner Over Shasta

Guard Clarence Peoples dropped in a free throw with 30 seconds left in the game to give the high-flying Kingsley Field Jets a thrilling 64-63 win over visiting Shasta Junior College in the base gym Monday night.

For the Jets this win was their fifth in six games this season while the Knights' loss was only their third in 10 tests.

The two squads tangle again tonight in the second game of the two-game series beginning at 8 o'clock. The test will be preceded by a preliminary between two Kingsley intramural squads at 6:15.

Peoples' free toss gave the lead to the Jets for good in the nip-and-tuck contest which saw the lead swap hands numerous times throughout both the first and second halves. After the 5-9½ Jet guard sank the charity toss, Shasta took over possession of the ball but lost it just as quickly as they were charged with a dribbling infraction. The Jets stalled out the remaining seconds to insure the hard-fought triumph.

Peoples grabbed game scoring honors with 22 points while teammate Sam Bell, the Jets' usual big gun, added 20. Shasta's Ron Miller topped his team with 18 counters, trailed by 6-5 Dave Dix with 11, and reserve Tom Moores with 10.

Times lead traded hands several times in the first half but Kingsley built an eight-point margin just before the buzzer only to see the visitors flurry to close the count to 35-30 at halftime.

In the nightcap, Oregon took a 19-6 lead early in the first half and held off Washington State the rest of the way.

Washington State's major threat came early in the second half when Oregon's lead was cut to

six points. But Oregon's Charlie Warren poured in seven points and the Ducks were never threatened after that.

Washington State was held scoreless for the first three minutes of the contest. Then the Cougars got into the game on a hook shot by Dwight Damon.

Warren was high scorer with 18 points and John Maras led WSU with 14—12 in the second half.

Washington State sank 17 of its 35 field goal attempts for an average of 31 per cent. Oregon sank 24 of 89 for 27 per cent.

Monday night's contest totaled 4,047, bringing the total for the two-day tournament to 11,934.

Duke Humbles Utah; Top Three All Win

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Cincinnati, West Virginia and California are still thumping anybody who comes along as the top three clubs in major college basketball, but Utah, Ohio State and Illinois have just been thumped.

Utah, ranked No. 4 in this week's Associated Press poll, came to the end of the string Monday night as Duke (5-1) handed the Utes their first defeat in nine games 63-52 for a first-round upset in the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C.

Southern California beat Northwestern 81-62 and West Virginia in tonight's semifinals at Los Angeles. UCLA walloped Michigan 93-63 for the berth opposite California.

Indiana (7-1), ranked No. 7, was the only other top 10 team to work Monday night and beat Maryland 72-63 despite Al Bunge's 26 points for the Terps in the Bluegrass Invitational at Louisville. The Hoosiers, led by 6-10 Walt Bellamy's 25 points, go for the title tonight against Louisville, a 66-61 winner over Fordham.

Kentucky, a three-time loser, came from 15 points back for a 96-93 decision over fifth-ranked Ohio State (7-2) despite a 34-point job by the Bucks' Jerry Lucas in a non-tournament game at Lexington, Ky. Bill Lickert, switching to the backcourt, scored 29 for the Wildcats and Bennie Coffman sank 26.

Unbeaten Cincinnati, still No. 1, made it eight straight and gained the finals of the ECAC Holiday Festival with an 86-77 victory over stubborn St. Joseph's (Pa) at New York's Madison Square Garden. St. Joseph's, walloped 127-79 earlier by the Beavers, had the high scorer in Bob McNeill with 30 points and held All-America Oscar Robertson to 25 points, but never got closer than five points.

West Virginia (9-0) and California (7-0), ranked 2-3 headed toward another showdown with first-round victories in the Los Angeles Classic. The Mountaineers beat Stanford 66-47, but led by one, 40-39, with 8 minutes left before All-America Jerry West, who scored 27 and took down 21 rebounds, took charge in a 10-0 spurt. California, a one-point winner over West Virginia in last season's NCAA final, ran its two-year streak to 23 by handling eighth-ranked Illinois a 62-48 loss, first for the Illini in six games.

Darral Imhoff, 6-10, scored 23 points and had 16 rebounds for the Bears.

Iowa's hustling Hawkeyes (5-1) challenge Cincinnati for the ECAC title Wednesday night after knocking off previously unbeaten NYU 80-75. The Hawks (8-1), who trailed by eight, got their first lead at 60-55 with a 10-0 drive led by 5-8 Mike Heitman, who then gave them the lead for keeps with a jump shot that broke a 68-68 tie. NYU's Tom Sanders led scoring with 26.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—"The best football coach in the business," Tom Landry, defensive mentor of the New York Giants of the National Football League, Monday became a Texas coach without a squad.

Landry signed with Bedford Wynne and Clint Murchison Jr., who hope to land a National Football League franchise in Dallas, to coach their Dallas Rangers.

A native of Dallas who played with the University of Texas, Landry was also sought by Bud Adams, owner of the Houston Oilers franchise in the newly organized American Football League.

Detroit's Jim Bunning led the American League in strikeouts in 1959 with 205. Washington's Camilo Pascual was second with 184.

San Francisco (AP) — West Coast Bill Meek of Southern Methodist and his squad will plot secretly against the East today in preparing for the Shrine East-West football game here Jan. 2.

All except those closely associated with the team will be barred from the workouts for the next two days. Meek said the West is concerned at this stage with tightening up its defense.

Celtic Surge Dominates Score Duel

NEW YORK (AP) — A great scoring duel between Cincinnati's Jack Twyman and Philadelphia's Walt Chamberlain is beginning to take shape, but is being overshadowed by the Boston Celtics great winning spurge.

The Celts need only to beat St. Louis Wednesday night to tie the National Basketball Assn. consecutive game winning streak at 17 after edging Minneapolis 107-104 Monday night.

Scoring statistics released today show Twyman with 1,068 points, only 47 ahead of the Philadelphia rookie who has played in six less games. Chamberlain has 1,041 for a 35.9 average in games through last Sunday.

St. Louis Bob Pettit is third with 781, followed by Elgin Baylor of Minneapolis with 764 and Detroit's Gene Shue with 731.

Twyman and Chamberlain gave a good indication of what is to come when they faced each other Monday night and the 7 foot 1 Philadelphia center won the duel 39-35, as the Warriors defeated the Royals 109 - 104. Wilt Audiotrium rebound record with 39.

In the second half of the double-header the St. Louis Hawks beat the Syracuse Nets 120-106 as Cliff Hagan and Pettit led the winners with 28 and 22 points respectively. Dick Barnett led Syracuse with 24.
