

# Golden Bears, Mountaineers To Meet; Bearcats Clash With Iowa In Garden

## Overtime Pays Off For Cal.

Unbeaten California and West Virginia, just a point apart in a 1-2 finish for the 1959 CAA championship, stage a rematch in the top game of the college basketball season tonight on a schedule heavy with standout showdowns for tournament titles.

California (8-0), ranked No. 3 behind Cincinnati and West Virginia in The Associated Press poll, extended a two-year streak to 24 but barely made it to the title game in the Los Angeles Classic. The Golden Bears trailed by six with 88 seconds left in regulation play, but came off with 65-61 overtime victory against Southern California Tuesday night.

West Virginia (10-0), again whipped along by All-American Jerry West, made it with an 87-73 victory over UCLA.

In other championship games tonight, top-ranked Cincinnati (8-0) and All-American Oscar Robertson play Iowa (8-1) in the ECAC Holiday Festival at New York's Madison Square Garden, and North Carolina (5-2) meets Wake Forest (6-2) in the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C.

Dwarrs Imhoff, whose tip-in with 17 seconds left lifted California to a 71-70 victory over West Virginia for the NCAA crown last March, scored a pair of field goals that gave the Bears the lead for good against Southern Cal.

West, top player of the NCAA tournament, scored 30 points for West Virginia, hitting 11 of 19 from the field.

Only Cincinnati and Iowa, beaten only by Colorado, had a day off in the ECAC. Wake Forest overhauled an eight-point Dayton lead and beat the Flyers 61-50 before North Carolina routed Duke 61-30 in the Dixie.

Unbeaten Texas A & M (7-0), the defending champ, rolled past Texas 84-74 into tonight's Southwestern conference title game at Houston against Southern Methodist (7-2). The Mustangs, spurred by 6-7 Steve Strange's 20-point job, broke loose in the second half for a 67-56 victory over Arkansas.

It's Kansas (7-2) and Iowa State (6-2) for the Big Eight crown at Kansas City. The Jayhawks made it with a 55-54 victory over Oklahoma. Iowa State whipped Colorado 55-41 after leading by one at the half.

Loyola (Los Angeles) smashed Santa Clara 64-43 and Santa Clara beat St. Mary's 60-54 in the WCAC semifinals at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A Seattle University football player who had been a disappointment in most games this season, became a star in the West Coast Athletic Conference tournament with a dramatic new method of improving performances, it was revealed today.

Dr. Huber Grim, Seattle University team physician, revealed he had put Chieftain forward Dave Mills under hypnosis six hours before the game with St. Mary's.

Mills, brought out of the trance before game time, responded by leaping three feet in the air many times to block shots; picked off 17 rebounds and collected 21 points.

Grim claimed that hypnosis helps an athlete to remove mental blocks that prevent him from playing his best game.

He said Ingemar Johansson was hypnotized before his fight with Floyd Patterson last June 26 when the Swede won the heavyweight title with a third-round knockout.

Shasta Junior College of Redding increased its season record to 8-3 Tuesday night as they downed cold-shooting Kingsley Field Jet quint, 70-52, in the second game of a two-game series at the Kingsley gym. Monday night the Jets clipped the Knights 64-43.

The defensive-minded Knights were never less than five points ahead after the first few minutes and almost always kept their lead at 10 or better.

A pair of sharp-eyed SJC guards, Joe Brouillard and Jim Micklich, kept the visitors going in the first half with their floor play and accuracy from the field while forward Terry Moores took command the second stanza, jumping in 10 vital markers.

Kingsley's Clarence Peoples took scoring honors with 17 points from his guard position while Moores and Brouillard topped the Knights hit for 16 and 12 respectively. SJC's Micklich and Jet center Lavern Brown added 11 each to their respective causes.

Brouillard and Micklich led SJC to an early bulge and the margin increased to a 15-point lead, 29-14, with seven minutes left in the half. But Jets Sam Bell and Peoples collaborated with Joe Chestnut to score 11 quick markers in the next three minutes to cut the Knight lead to 39-25. The count at half-time was 34-27 for Shasta.

Brouillard got the Knight off fast in the second half as, in quick fashion, they pulled out to a 12-point lead, 49-37. But Peoples and Bell whittled it to seven, 51-44, with six minutes showing on the clock. Here Knight Jerry Miller puffed in five straight tallies and took the spread back to 12 and coach George Kutras' Knight quit never looked back as they registered 14 quick markers in the last four minutes.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State College, the host team, Tuesday night won its fourth straight championship in the four-year-old Far West Classic basketball tournament by downing the University of Oregon 60-56.

Washington State won third place by edging Idaho 39-37. New Mexico State took fifth and the University of Portland seventh in the consolation bracket. New Mexico State downed Denver University 68-62 and Portland whipped the University of Hawaii 63-52.

Last night's crowd of 6,142 brought the total attendance for the three-day tournament to 19,112. New Mexico State's George Knighton, a 6-foot-7 sophomore, was named most valuable player of the tournament by coaches of the eight schools. Other members of the all-star team were Bill

## Cohn To Try Initial Steps Toward Bout

NEW YORK (AP)—Roy Cohn expected to take two steps today in his effort to promote the return world heavyweight championship bout between Ingemar Johansson and Floyd Patterson.

1. Decide on a definite site for the battle.  
2. Apply to the New York State Athletic Commission for a promoter's license.

"Right now we are sort of inclined toward the Polo Grounds here," said the 32-year old head of the new promoting syndicate.

"More people can see the fight better in the Polo Grounds," and since Johansson wants to fight in New York, the other alternative would be Yankee Stadium.

"After our group gets that settled, we intend to go before the State Athletic Commission and apply for a promoter's license."

Cohn, accompanied by two members of his 10-man group arrived home Tuesday night after conferences in Sweden with Johansson and his adviser, Edwin Ahlquist.

"We hope to hold the fight sometime between June 13 and June 23," he continued. "We and the Johansson group were in complete harmony on all matters and we anticipate no difficulty."

"We think exactly alike on how things should be done and on the question of full cooperation with the boxing commission."

"I expect Ingemar to arrive back here around Jan. 10 or 11. At that time, we'll make definite arrangements and commitments for the fight."

## Champion Named Fighter Of Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Ingemar Johansson, world heavyweight champion, has been named "fighter of the year" by Ring Magazine in its annual year-end issue for the second straight time.

Johansson's selection was based on his dramatic third round knockout of Floyd Patterson June 26 at Yankee Stadium. Gene Fullmer, National Boxing Assn's middleweight champ, was the runner-up. Although the boxing magazine still rated Sugar Ray Robinson as the world champ despite NBA's recognition of Fullmer, it listed Sugar Ray No. 3 among the middleweights.

Washington State held off a last-minute rally in its victory over Idaho. The score was tied 10 times before the WSU Cougars went ahead to stay with seven minutes to play. This game also was knotted at the half, 25-25.

Then Oregon State's Bill Wold was fouled by the Ducks' Charlie Warren. Wold sank both his free throws after the game had ended, icing the OSC victory.

Wold won Monday night's game with Idaho with a last-second jump shot.

The score was tied eight times in the first half including 27-27 at the intermission. As the second half opened, Oregon State moved five points ahead on field goals by Flynn and Jay Carly and Wold's free throw. Oregon went for five minutes without a field goal and stayed in contention only by dropping in five straight free throws.

Oregon State was ahead 48-37 when the Ducks began a rally that closed the margin to five points and then to two points.

Oregon State's 6-foot-10 Karl Anderson fouled out with half a minute remaining.

Dale Herron was high scorer with 16 points for Oregon. Flynn led Oregon State with 15.
