Pels Drop SOC Test To Rugged Tornado

The 1959 Southern Oregon Conference basketball debut of Klamath Union High was something less than satisfactory for the Pelicans who were slapped down, 62-46, by the Medford Black Tornado on Pelican Court Saturday night.

In other scheduled conference action Saturday night the Central Point Crater Comets topped the Grants Pass Cavemen 57-50 despite the fact that Caveman Rex Benner hit 35 points.

The defeat was the first dealt the Pelicans, one that brought their win-loss record to 6-1. The victory gave the Medfordites a 4-win, 3-loss mark.

The Tornado, sparked by a pair of scouting 5-9 guards, Ken Durkee and Dick Ragsdale, and the shooting and rebounding of forward Jerry Anderson, 6-3, got the jump on the Pelicans when the ball game was just two minutes old and never stopped jumping.

Anderson, one of the Conference's high scorers last season, pumped in eight field goals, four of them in the last quarter, and picked up a pair of free throws for a total of 18, the best of the night. In addition to his shooting the agile Anderson outjumped the taller Pelicans and personally accounted for 14 rebounds. His passing-off to teammates set up more than a few additional Medford four-pointers.

A large portion of the Pelican defeat can be charged up to the fact that the Medford club commanded the boards, both offensively and defensively, hauling in 41 rebounds while allowing the Pels 34.

"They did just exactly what we thought they would do—run. And we couldn't stop their running," noted Pelicoid Dean White. "We were poor on defense and poor on offense. We've got a long way to go on team defense."

Big Pelican Bob Lewis' terse comment, "We looked just as if we hadn't practiced," capped White's statement.

Seemingly unable to get their offensive rolling the Pelicans were down 13-6 at the quarter-post, 23-18 at the half, and 42-33 at the three-quarter mark.

Paul Bishop, the leading Pel scorer to date, kept his pace with five jumpers from outside and a perfect 3-3 from the foul line for a total of 13 points and second place behind Anderson.

The number two Pelican was rookie Bruce Brickner, a recent transfer from Merrill who hit five from the field and one from the foul line for 11 points.

Medford's Lowell Dean, Durkee and forward Jerry Shults each also picked up 11.

The Pels hit 17 of 46 shots for a .369 mark while Medford fired up 66 tries and connected on 24, for .363.

The KU quint had a 3-0 lead until the game was just one minute and 50 seconds old when Anderson got loose along the base line and jumped up the first Medford tally. Seconds later Dean hit from the same place and the Tornado was in front. Anderson followed with one from the same area and the score was 6-3 and the "wind" was blowing.

At the opening of the second period Bishop and Brickner counted with jumpers and the Pels moved up to 10-13, the closest they were to get the rest of the night.

At the beginning of the third quarter, however, despite the fact that Lewis was benched with five fouls after a minute and a half of play, the Pelicans pulled up to 25-29, but again Medford took hold and got away.

At the opening of the fourth Brickner tallied with a beautiful hook but Anderson countered with

a pair of jump shots and a free throw to set the stage for the finish.

The Pelican coach sent in nearly a full squad of fresh shorter men with 6:30 left in the game but the damage was already done.

"We just didn't have it tonight—but just the same I wouldn't trade our ball team for any I've seen around the state and I have

seen quite a few of them," was Coach White's parting comment as he headed for a meeting with his team.

Georgia T. Beaten 14-7 By Arkansas

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Arkansas ripped Georgia Tech with All-America Jim Mooty's speed and Joe Paul Alberty's quick power Saturday and whipped the Yellow Jackets 14-7 in the 15th Gator Bowl game.

For Bobby Dodd, it was his first loss in nine bowl trips as head coach at Tech. And the coach who beat him — Arkansas' Frank Broyles — once played for Tech and was a Dodd aide for six seasons.

The teams swapped first-half touchdowns but Arkansas took charge after halftime. Mooty and his sophomore sidekick, Lance Alworth, were unable to break wide for long gains until the third quarter. Then they turned it on.

The 165-pound Mooty started Arkansas' clinching touchdown march with a twisting, 24-yard sprint to midfield. Alworth chipped in with two good sweeps. Then Mooty barreled 19 yards for the touchdown.

Tech's heavier line, led by All-America center Maxie Baughan, whipped Arkansas during a first quarter which Tech completely dominated. After that there was little difference between the two lines.

Tech's touchdown came on the final play of the first quarter when quarterback Marvin Tibbetts raced 51 yards on a keeper play. Tibbetts, best known for his defensive play, was hurt on the second half kickoff and saw no more action.

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The young Pelicans were led by guard Fred Biehn's 13 points, followed by Bob Lapsley's 10. Klamath's Wally Palmberg and Kent Hunsaker chipped in with nine each while Medford was topped by George Clearwater who hit for eight.

Beaver Quint Hands WSU 49-38 Loss

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Cold shooting and a tight man-to-man defense held the score low, but Oregon State broke loose late in the second half and defeated Washington State University here Saturday night 49-38.

Washington State trailed 28-13 at the half, but pushed within three points of Oregon State, at 35-32, midway through the second half. Then Bill Wold sank 7 quick points and Steve Flynn added 2 in the next three minutes. This put Oregon State well ahead to stay.

Washington State was ice cold in the first half. The Cougars made only three field goals out of 22 attempts. Oregon State in that first period sank 10 of 27 attempts.

But in the early stage of the second half the opposite was true. Oregon State went eight minutes without a field goal and was able to sink only one free toss in that time.

Bill Wold was high for Oregon State with 11. Terry Ball led Washington State with 11. Both teams used a man-to-man defense.

A crowd of 3,210 watched Oregon State gain its 9th victory against a lone defeat, Washington State now is 7-5.

West 21-14 Victor On Late TD Pass

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Southern Methodist quarterback Don Meredith threw a flat pass to halfback Dick Bass of College of the Pacific on a 9 yard touchdown play with just 5 seconds remaining Saturday and gave the underdog West a 21-14 victory over the East.

The crowd of 60,000 in Kezar Stadium probably felt this 35th annual Shrine game would end in a tie when Rice halfback Bill Bueck missed a field goal attempt for the West with less than two minutes left.

But getting control on a fumble recovery on the East 43, Meredith passed to Washington State's Gail Cogdill to reach the 25. Meredith then ran to the 15 and lateraled to his SMU teammate Jim Welch who reached the 9. On the next play Bass took Meredith's pass wide to the right and fought his way into the end zone.

Bueck booted his third conversion amid cheers of the partisan West crowd.

Play was suspended for several minutes after Bueck's missed field goal when a spectator stole the ball and a mob of fans attempted to demolish the East goal post.

Much of the credit for the West victory went to an alert defense, particularly to Oregon tackle John Wilcox. He intercepted one pass and recovered two fumbles that led to the first two West scores.

Meredith, cool and elusive despite the pressure of the heavy East line, threw a 22 yard pass to Chris Burford of Stanford that tied the count with only three minutes remaining. He then directed the amazing drive that brought victory.

Meredith was voted the game's outstanding player with lineman honors going to giant Lou Cordileone of Clemson, tackle for the East.

Cotton Bowl Hot Tempers Now Cooled

DALLAS (AP)—Tempers that flared in the Cotton Bowl and brought on a players' brawl had cooled Saturday and Cotton Bowl President Jack Lowe said he anticipated no aftermath.

Still being discussed was the fight just before the first half closed that had Texas and Syracuse players punching at each other and charging dirty play.

Also, Umpire Judy Truelson of Fort Worth was answering attacks on his officiating from Syracuse coaches.

But a feeling of good will appeared to prevail between the two schools.

"The trouble came in the heat of an important game for Syracuse and Texas," said Lowe.

"Tempers flared and the unfortunate fight occurred. But I saw no resentment among either faction at the awards dinner last night."

Lowe declared that he anticipated no further ill feelings on either side.

John Brown, Syracuse Negro tackle, who was one of the principal figures in the brawl, said Larry Stephens, Texas tackle with whom he had scuffled came up to him at the awards dinner and apologized.

Al Gerlick, another Syracuse tackle, against whom a holding penalty had been called, touching off the explosion, said a Texas player had called Brown "a dirty Nigger."

Coach Ben Schwartzwalder and assistant Rocco Pirro of Syracuse and Gerlick had some pungent comment to make about Truelson's umpiring.

The main point was Truelson's ruling on illegal use of the hands on defense. Schwartzwalder said his players were merely using their forearms to fend off blockers. "On defense, you can throw an arm if you don't club with it and use it as a weapon," he said.

UO's Rask Scores Late For Victory

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Chuck Rask's two free throws nudged Oregon just beyond reach and the Ducks defeated the Stanford Indians 56-55 in an overtime basketball game here Saturday night.

It was only the second time in the last 19 meetings between the two schools that Oregon had been able to beat Stanford's basketball team.

The score was knotted 49-49 at the beginning of the overtime period but a one free throw by Rask quickly put Oregon ahead.

Stanford's Jerry Thuesen countered with a field goal from the corner, but Oregon rolled ahead 54-51 as Denny Strickland and Dale Herron each got a basket.

With two minutes remaining in the overtime period, John Arrilaga of Stanford swished two free throws, again trimming Oregon's lead to a single point.

But it was then that Rask was fouled, and he put in the two free throws that put the Ducks just out of reach.

Only 15 seconds were left when Neal Brockmeyer whirled in a pivot shot. Those were Stanford's last points, as Oregon managed to keep possession in the waning moments.

Big O Rated Tops On Offense But Defensively Needs Work

NEW YORK (AP)—Just how good a basketball player is Oscar Robertson? Is Cincinnati's "Big O" as great as virtually everybody who has seen believe him to be?

For answers to these questions, a report went to Howard Hobson, former president of the National Assn. of Basketball Coaches and chairman of the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee.

Hobson attended the Cincinnati game at Madison Square Garden last Wednesday and charted every move made by the fabulous two-time All-American.

The 6-5 Robertson scored a Holiday Festival record-breaking 50 points to lead the undefeated Bearcats to a 96-83 victory.

Here is Hobson's analysis: "A coach usually looks for things that the average fan might not be aware of," said Hobson, who also was basketball coach at Yale and Oregon.

"First off, how many points were made by Robertson's opponents? Well, Robertson held his opponents to 13 points. By his opponents, I mean not just the players he was assigned to, but those he had to guard on switch-offs.

"But he is lackadaisical on defense. He can be faked. In the final analysis, he is a tremendous pro prospect, but defensively, he's got some work to do."

Techmen Lose Lead, Wildcats Win 56-47

CHICO, California (Special)—The invading Oregon Tech Owls gave the Chico State Wildcats the scare of their lives before finally running out of gas to lose 56-47 here Saturday night.

For the Owl cagers the game was the last non-counting game of the season—next Friday night they open Oregon Collegiate Conference action when they travel to Port-
