Pilots Press Aerial Hunt

HAMILTON AFB, Calif. (UPI) — Pilots were to search again in the Sierra Nevada today for two missing planes carrying five persons.

A third plane carrying California fliers was discovered Saturday in Utah.

Still missing was a private plane from Seattle last Dec. 27 while on a flight between Orville, Calif., and Reno. Aboard were Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Gardner and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Forrester, all from Seattle.

Also unaccounted for was a Cordelia, Calif., rancher, D. R. Mangles, who was last reported over Lovelock, Nev., in a storm Friday while en route to Elko, Nev., from Napa, Calif.

Nineteen Civil Air Patrol pilots and one Army pilot fruitlessly searched the area Sunday and were expected to resume hunting today if predicted clear weather occurred. The massive hunt is being coordinated at this base.

Two young Californians were discovered Saturday after crashing their small plane on New Year's Eve near the Wyoming-Utah border. R. E. Anderson, 26, Sunnyvale, and Delbert L. Gheem, 22, of San Jose, were uninjured. They had been en route from Rock Springs, Wyo., to Elko.

Meet Studies Berry Surplus

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 13-man congressional steering committee meets this week to map a program to solve the surplus cranberry problem.

A sharp drop in cranberry sales, affecting some 4,000 growers in five states, followed a pre-Thanksgiving announcement by Secretary of Welfare Arthur S. Flemming that part of the crop was contaminated by a weed-killing chemical. Laboratory tests cleared much of the product put on the market, but uncertainties caused many potential purchasers to pass up cranberries.

Rep. Russell V. Mack (R-Wash) said the group has asked Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson to make a survey of the financial damage done to the cranberry industry.

The congressmen from cranberry growing states also asked Benson for suggestions on a program to relieve the surplus.

Daily Tidings Sold By Dean

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Ashland Daily Tidings was sold Saturday to Edd E. Roundtree, formerly of Palo Alto, Calif., Publisher Graham M. Dean announced. The price was not disclosed.

Dean said he and his wife were retaining ownership of their two other newspapers, the Siskiyou Daily News at Yreka, Calif., and the Daily Press of Astoria, N. M. Dean bought the Tidings in 1951. Roundtree came to Oregon last June. He formerly was a newspaper broker in San Francisco. He also previously published newspapers in Sunnyvale, Healdsburg and Los Altos, Calif.

Kennedy Plans Oregon Fight

PORTLAND (AP) — Sen. John Kennedy (D-Mass) will wage a vigorous campaign in Oregon's presidential primary his supporters here declared Saturday.

This announcement came in the wake of Kennedy's official declaration that he is a candidate for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination.

A spokesman said Kennedy will speak in Oregon Feb. 10, will go to Washington state for a day, then will return Feb. 12 for another day of campaigning.

Kennedy, his spokesman added, will spend at least 10 days in Oregon between now and the May 20 presidential preference primary. He already has made several trips into Oregon.

Invaders Flee In Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Patrols of the Nicaraguan National Guard are reported pursuing a new band of invaders from neighboring Honduras.

The Nicaraguan government indicated the band was small, calling it "a limited number of rogues who will fall into the hands of the National Guard from one minute to the other."

The communique added the invasion "need not cause unrest or provoke alarm."

Nicaragua protested to Honduras. Recent reports said a number of exiled Nicaraguans opposed to the government of President Luis Somoza were meeting in Tegucigalpa, the capital of Honduras.

The government said the invaders crossed the frontier Saturday night in the neighborhood of Santa Clara. Unofficial sources reported they killed two civilians.

HOW TO STUDY STUDIED ITHACA, N.Y. (UPI) — A Cornell University professor is compiling a handbook on how to study. The work, to be published next spring by associate professor Walter Pauk, is based on a six-year investigation of the study habits of about 2,500 students.

Chemistry Of Housefly Just Reverse Of Humans

NEW YORK (UPI) — Human beings may have to diet to lose excess cholesterol but the house fly would become extinct if there were no cholesterol.

Complete lack of the chemical might affect humans the same way, but that can't be shown in the neat and conclusive way it has been shown for the most pesty of all insects, musca domestica, by Ronald E. Monroe, insect scientist employed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in its Beltsville, Md., laboratories.

House flies are never bothered by cholesterol because their body chemistry is incapable of making it (or any of the related compounds.) This is the reverse of human body chemistry, which makes it readily whether or not it is contained in the diet. But whatever cholesterol the fly gets, it eats.

Monroe investigated to see if this could be a weakness in the house fly — a weakness that people could use against it.

Despite the efforts of many decades, science has yet to find a weakness in the animal which could be exploited for long as an anti-fly weapon.

He put newly emerged adult flies into screen cages and fed them synthetic foods in order to know the precise chemical nature of everything they ate. Some flies had cholesterol added to this richly nutritional diet, others did not.

When the flies began laying eggs, the eggs were collected and put on moist paper in dishes. Both the eggs which hatched into new flies and those which turned out to be sterile were counted.

The eggs of the flies which had had cholesterol in their diet turned out to be 82 to 96 per cent fertile. The eggs of the flies which ate no cholesterol were only five per cent fertile. These fly-babies were reared into egg-laying adulthood, and only about half their eggs were fertile.

When flies which had been getting cholesterol were deprived of it, the hatching percentage dropped at once, and it kept dropping sharply as the cholesterol-deprivation of the egg-laying flies continued. When cholesterol was restored to their diet, the percentage started going up again and soon reached 83 per cent.

Lack of cholesterol had no effect on egg-laying itself — the flies who got it and who didn't get it, laid approximately the same number of eggs. Monroe was impressed that the harmful effect was to the fertility of the egg. He noted that even when the eggs were put in a medium containing cholesterol and its related compounds, hatching still was inhibited.

How this can be used against house flies is not yet apparent. Depriving the house fly of cholesterol in its natural environments, such as kitchens and cow barns, would be rather complicated. However, Monroe is continuing his investigation.

"The high prevalence of potentially serious disease in members of the 'executive' category who are of favorable socio-economic and educational status makes it reasonable to expect an even higher prevalence of serious latent disease in the population at large," the doctors said.

Former Slave Marks Birth

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — Eliza Miller, born a slave on a plantation in Georgia, celebrated her 111th birthday Sunday with greetings from President Eisenhower and Gov. G. Mennen Williams.

"Sometimes it's awful to be 111 years old," said Mrs. Miller. She takes two daily walks during the summer months and sweeps out her house. Her only surrender to old age is a touch of arthritis in her arms and legs.

Mrs. Miller was born in 1849 in Griffin, Ga. She says she has vivid memories of Confederate and Union soldiers passing the plantation during the Civil War.

Only one of her 11 children survives. He is the Rev. F.A. Miller of Peoria, Ill.

Flames Destroy Grain Elevator
