Jet Airlines Post Records

Jet airlines, helped along by tail winds of up to 120 miles per hour set four east-bound transcontinental speed records Sunday.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon was aboard an American Airlines Boeing 707 Sunday that raced 2,300 miles from Los Angeles to Washington-Baltimore Friendship Airport in three hours 39 minutes.

Nixon's flight with a capacity load of 112 passengers broke a previous American Airlines mark of four hours flat for the run.

Another American 707 jet set a Los Angeles-Boston record of four hours, 24 minutes, carrying 114 passengers and a crew of eight. The plane made the 2,799-mile flight at an average speed of 635 miles per hour, eclipsing a one-day-old record of four hours, 39 minutes also held by American.

A Trans World Airlines 707 carrying 114 passengers averaged 600 miles an hour for a 2,451-mile Los Angeles-New York run. The three hours, 57 minutes flight trimmed six minutes from a mark that TWA set Saturday.

An Eastern Airlines Douglas DC8B flew 2,339 miles from Long Beach, Calif., to Miami in three hours, 58 minutes and 55 seconds.

Police Patrol Big Oil Port

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — Reinforced police patrolled the streets of Caracas and the big oil port of Maracaibo today, alert for any repetition of the weekend's terror bombings.

Five bombs were planted or set off here during the pre-dawn hours Sunday, causing some damage to factories and homes of officials but no reported casualties. About 20 persons were reported under arrest.

No bombings were reported in Maracaibo, but authorities there turned out about 1,000 police Sunday night as a precaution against trouble.

Governor Of Oklahoma Honored By U.S. Chamber

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma Gov. J. Howard Edmondson, who at 33 became the nation's youngest governor, was named today by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of its 10 outstanding young men of 1959.

Others on the list included prominent educators, political figures, space scientists and a magazine editor from seven states and Washington, D.C. They will be honored at an awards congress Jan. 15-16 in Hartford, Conn.

Edmondson was cited by the Jaycees as a reform candidate for governor who "swept by competition from many seasoned politicians... by record margins."

The Jaycees named and described the other nine outstanding young men:

Rep. Daniel K. Inouye, 35, Honolulu, who "became the first American of Japanese descent to be a member" of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Rep. Robert P. Griffin, 36, Traverse City, Mich., who "bolstered national prominence as co-sponsor of the Landrum-Griffin Act, the first major labor-management relations law enacted by Congress in more than 12 years."

Peter A. Castruccio, 33, Glen Burnie, Md., a World War II agent in Italy for British Intelligence, now an authority on space technology with the Aerospace Division of Aeronca Corp.

Dr. S. Fred Singer, 35, Greenbelt, Md., professor of physics at the University of Maryland, "one of the world's foremost astrophysicists" who "made significant contributions, through research and pioneer investigations, to rocketry and space travel."

Dr. Homer D. Babbidge Jr., 34, Washington, assistant U.S. commissioner of education, a "prime mover of what has been called the most significant educational legislation since the Land-Grant Act of 1862."

Lt. Col. Wesley W. Posvar, professor and head of the political science department at the U.S.

Air Force Academy, Colo., "at 32... the youngest full professor ever assigned to a service academy."

Carlisle Sessions Floyd, 33, Tallahassee, Fla., a composer-teacher who has "already made memorable contributions through one of the most rigorous of all art forms to the future of American music."

Dr. Harry Pryostowsky, 34, Gainesville, head professor of obstetrics-gynecology at the University of Florida, whose "pioneer achievements... have stamped him as a leading authority in his field."

Osborn Elliott, 34, New York City, managing editor of Newsweek, "with speed and intensity" his journalistic career "has logged achievements earning him recognition."

The selections mark the 22nd consecutive year they have been made. Awards are made to persons between 21 and 36.

Judges for the 1959 awards included news commentator Chet Huntley, publisher Bennett Cerf, conductor Arthur Fiedler, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, musician Mitch Miller and Princeton University President Dr. Robert F. Goheen.

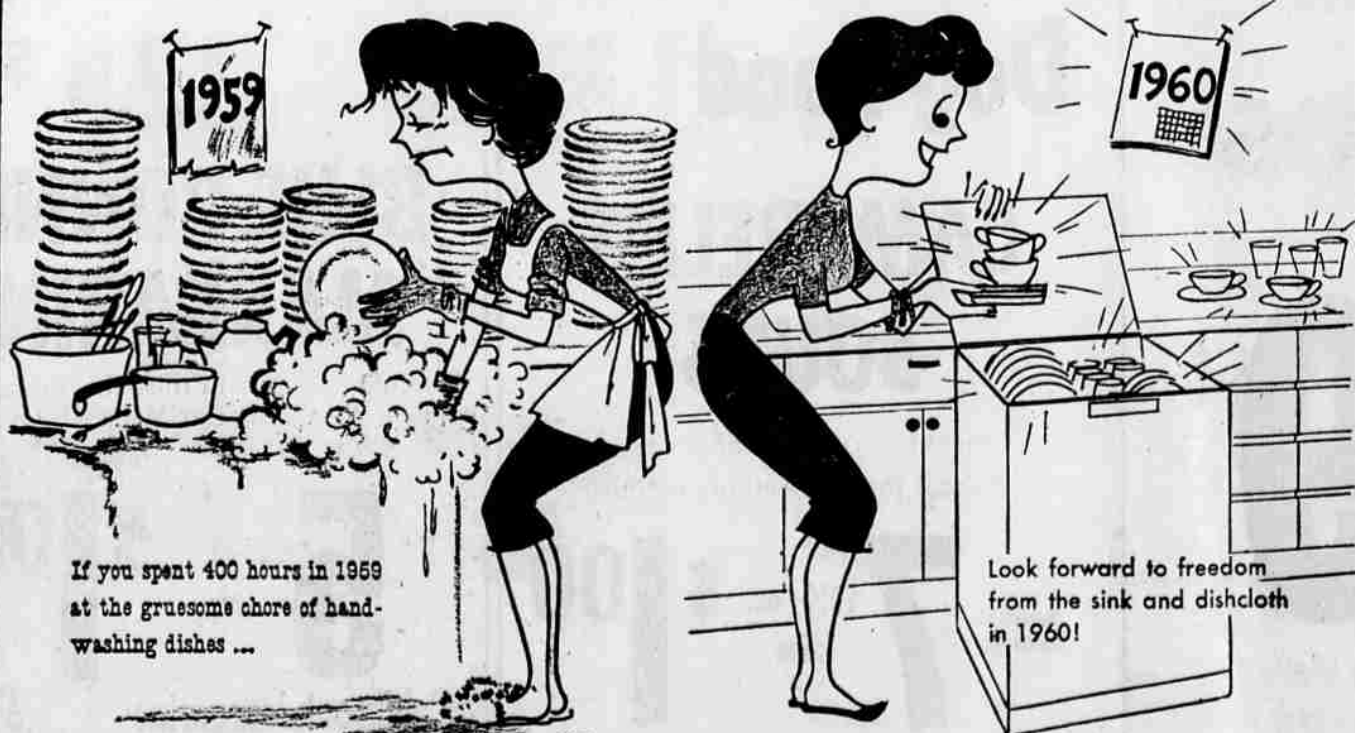
