## Kingsley Field Jets Take Northern Jaunt

The Kingsley Air Force Base Jets, who only this season began basketball competition on an inter-base level, took off today for a two-day swing through Washington where they will tangle with a pair of powerful Air Force teams on consecutive days.

Thursday, the Jets, sporting a 5-won, 2-lost record to date, tackle Larson Air Force Base at Moses Lake, then clash with Gieger Field near Spokane Friday.

In their most recent action the Kingsley quint split a between-the-holidays series with Shasta Junior College, on the Jets' home court. The first night the Jets eked out a 64-63 win but the second night the Knights warmed considerably and dropped the KF five 70-52 despite a 17-point scoring effort by Jet guard Clarence Peoples.

The big night boosted Peoples into the number two spot among the team high scorers. In the six games in which he has appeared, Peoples has counted 100 points for a 16.7 game average.

The number one spot is still the possession of Sam Bell who has tallied at a 20.8 per game clip for a total of 125 markers.

Wade Gordon is number three with 63 points in seven games for a 9.0 average.

## Oregon OKs Bear Talks With Coach

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The Oakland Tribune Tuesday said the University of Oregon granted the University of California permission to discuss its football coaching vacancy with Len Casanova.

Oregon Athletic Director Leo Harris, in New York with Casanova, the Oregon football coach, for NCAA meetings, granted the permission to California, the newspaper said.

"I'd be surprised if he (Casanova) would leave Oregon," Harris was quoted. Casanova's football team last year at Oregon ended the season with an 8-2 record, which included a win over Cal.

Pete Elliott left California without a head coach when he accepted an offer to go to Illinois.

Casanova, before taking the Oregon job in 1951, coached at the University of Santa Clara and Pittsburgh.

## Continental League Stalls Needed Push

WASHINGTON (AP)—The new Continental League is counting on a congressional push in case it stalls on its drive toward status as a third major baseball league.

In a few weeks, Branch Rickey, president of the Continental, plans to negotiate with Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick on getting recognition and cooperation.

After talking to Frick and other major league leaders, Rickey and other Continental League officials may return to Washington and, as Rickey put it Tuesday, tell Congress "what need there is, if any, for legislation on our behalf."

Congress may listen. A senator and subcommittee spokesmen concerned with baseball showed support for the Continental League Tuesday, when Rickey and William Shea, founder of the league, made a quick visit to Washington.

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-NY) said a third league "is the answer to expansion of this great sport." He volunteered to act as mediator in any disputes that might arise among the leagues over players and franchises.

In New York, Frick said he welcomed Keating's interest in the situation.

"Until the Continental League meets the qualifications we have agreed on for major league status, they don't need a mediator," Frick added.

"The Continental League can have our endorsement, too, as soon as they get certain necessary things settled."

In Washington, sympathy for the Continental League's cause came from spokesmen for the Senate Antimonopoly subcommittee of Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn) and the House Antitrust subcommittee of Rep. Emanuel Celler (D-NY).

The Continental League now has placed seven franchises: New York, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Denver, Houston, Atlanta, Toronto and Dallas-Fort Worth. Rickey and Shea intend to award the eighth franchise within two weeks. It will go to either Buffalo or Montreal.

## No Stopping Mighty Stilt; Hits For 52

NEW YORK (AP) — There's no stopping Wilt Chamberlain. The 7-foot, 1-inch Philadelphia rookie gets better with every game in the National Basketball Assn.

Wilt popped in 52 points against the Minneapolis Lakers in leading his team to a 126-111 victory at Madison Square Garden Tuesday night. He dunked 20 field goals.

Most of his shots were made while surrounded by two or three Lakers. He made them from under the basket, from outside, and from the sides.

The 250-pound Giant also grabbed 20 rebounds, deflected 10 Laker shots, and was a general nuisance around the boards to the Lakers in the doubleheader.

The 52 total was his second high in the NBA. He hit for 55 against Cincinnati.

"He's just fantastic," remarked Joe Lapchick, coach of St. John's and former pilot of the New York Knickerbockers. "He has such wonderful coordination for such a big fellow and does everything well."

Philadelphia's triumph spoiled Jim Pollard's coaching debut with the Lakers. In the second game, Playing Coach Carl Braun sparked his New York Knicks to a 121-110 triumph over the Detroit Pistons. In the only other game of the night, the Syracuse Nationals came from behind to whip the slipping, crippled Boston Celtics, 145-143, in overtime at Providence, R. I.

It was the fourth loss in five games for Boston's Eastern Division leaders. Despite that slump the Celtics still are 5 1/2 games in front of Philadelphia. Syracuse is 8 1/2 games behind the leaders and New York trails by 15.

## Texas Aggies Still Unbeaten, Serve Notice On SW League

The Texas Aggies, sub, have had enough of this also-ran nonsense in Southwest Conference basketball.

Triggered by a smooth-shooting sophomore and a couple of junior college transfers, they're aiming for their first undisputed conference title in 37 years—and building a national reputation while they're at it.

One of the nation's four major college teams still unbeaten, A&M made it nice in a row Tuesday night with a 68-51 cuffing of Baylor that launched the official Southwest race.

With Carroll Broussard the touted sophomore and the Stanley twins—Don and Pat—the junior college newcomers, the Aggies earlier established themselves as the team to beat by sweeping

through the SWC's annual Christmas tournament.

Broussard had 15 points, Don Stanley 18 and Pat Stanley 13 for coach Bobby Rogers' 13th ranked Aggies, who have a right good amount of makin' up to do for previous A&M clubs. A&M hasn't been undisputed champ of the Southwest since 1923.

Third-ranked West Virginia and All-America Jerry West got back on the winning and scoring track, and Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats—trying to avoid the Baron's worst season ever—looked considerably revived in Tuesday night's other features.

West Virginia and West, stopped cold by California's great defenses in the Los Angeles Classic title game last week, returned to familiar surroundings and whipped Furman 95-79 for the Mounties' 53th consecutive Southern Conference victory and their 38th straight home court triumph.

Kentucky, out of the AP's top 20 rankings for the first time in years, built its record to 7-4 with a 76-59 rout of Vanderbilt at Vandy. Only six teams in coach Rupp's 29 years at Kentucky have lost more than five games in a season.

Virginia, with John Haner leading the way with 19 points, beat North Carolina State 53-48 for the first time since the Atlantic Coast Conference was formed six years ago.

## Race Fans On Increase During 1959

NEW YORK (UPI) — Betting and attendance at the nation's Thoroughbred race tracks reached record highs in 1959, a United Press International survey showed today, with 30,922,431 persons betting \$2,392,379,486 during 3,515 racing days.

Complete statistics from the 24 states with legalized gambling easily topped the previous records set in 1958 with 30,378,002 persons bet \$2,274,691,166. There were 3,274 racing days a year ago.

It was the sixth straight year in which betting totals went over two billion dollars and the second in which attendance climbed above 30 million.

Generally, additional racing was responsible for the increases. Nine-race programs became almost universal and there were 241 more racing days in 1959 than in 1958, an increase of 7.3 per cent.
