PTA NEWS

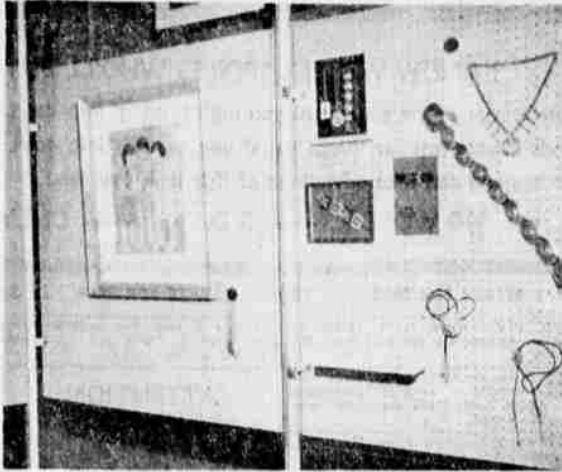
