

# Lakeview Five Hosts Burns For Twinbill

Prep basketball action outside the immediate Klamath Falls area tonight finds the Lakeview Honkers hosting Burns in a Greater Oregon Conference game, the Alturas Modoc Braves (A, B and C teams) traveling to Enterprise, and Butte Valley joining Fort Jones, Happy Camp and Etna in the Siskiyou B Tournament slated for the Fort Jones court.

Coach Bert Borrevik's Lakeview, 4-4 in pre season action, was the number two team in the conference last year. The other schools in the league are Madras, John Day and Burns.

Saturday night each of the clubs go at it again, Burns and Lakeview finishing up a doubleheader, the Fort Jones tourney wrapping

up the finals, while Alturas returns home to tangle with the Malin Mustangs.

The Honkers are led by Frank Egenoff, a 6-4 sharpshooter who has pumped 129 points through the twine in the eight outings. Entering the Honkers' last game, a match with the Henley Hornets, Egenhoff was sporting a commendable 14.7 average. Against the Hornets, however, Egenhoff had a real field day, collecting 26 points to kick his mark up to a 16.1 per cent.

His closest rival on the Lakeview roster is Jerry Parkinson who picked off nine points against Henley to bring his total to 66.

Borrevik will probably start Egenhoff, Parkinson, Doug Maxwell, Troy McCoy and Jerry Sawyer against Burns.

The Burns lineup was not available.

The Modoc Braves, who have won three and lost only to the strong Lakeview five and Trinity of Weaverville, will meet another unknown quantity in Surprise Valley.

Definitely a defense-minded team, the Braves have contained each team they met, including the losses with the 32 point mark. Their own highest total is 34 points.

They were edged 32-31 by Lakeview and 26-23 by Trinity. Their victories included 31-29 win over Malin, a 34-30 mark over Big Valley, and a 30-28 win from Surprise in a previous game.

Ted Bell leads the Alturas point-producers with a total of 41. The number two man is Bill Saucedo with 35. The remainder of the Modoc lineup includes Allan Hess, Warren Weber and Hal Looper, who have contributed 25, 24, and 13 respectively.

Butte Valley (0-1) Fort Jones (0-2), Happy Camp (1-1) and Etna (1-2) will each send a pair of teams to the Fort Jones tourney. Afternoon and evening games are scheduled both tonight and Saturday.

# NFL Poser Gets Hotter, Fuel Added

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The question of expanding the National Football League grows hotter by the day as time nears for league directors to meet here Jan. 20.

Two titans of pro ball — George Preston Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins, and George Halas, owner and coach of the Chicago Bears — added fuel to the fire Thursday.

At Miami Beach, Marshall indicated that if NFL league magnates win their fight for immediate expansion, the battle will be continued in court.

Marshall, who has warned that expansion now would open the league to antitrust charges, said "I will go into the meeting with plenty of legal counsel."

In Chicago, Halas said: "I think we would violate the antitrust law by not expanding. Marshall should realize that it is monopolistic to require a unanimous, or even a 10-out-of-12 vote, for expansion. That rule is monopolistic in itself."

Marshall repeated his opposition to expansion. Halas called expansion plans "a culmination of five years of planning."

In New York, meanwhile, the head of the American Football League threatened to go to Congress if necessary to protect the right of the infant league.

Joe Foss, AFL commissioner, accused the NFL of "hostile action" and "harassing tactics."

# Celts Lose, Philadelphia Making Hay

The Philadelphia Warriors are making hay while the Boston Celtics suffer from a victory drought in the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Assn.

While the pace-setting Celtics have lost four of their five starts since matching the league record of 17 straight victories, the Warriors have been slowly closing in on the leaders.

The Philadelphiaans won their sixth straight Thursday night with a 120-105 victory over Detroit in a doubleheader at Syracuse and cut the Celtics' lead to 4½ games. Third-place Syracuse, eight games back, turned back the Cincinnati Royals 132-114 for the Nat's fifth success in their last six outings.

Once again Wilt Chamberlain was the big man in the Warriors' attack, scoring 44 points. He joined Paul Arizin in a fourth-period rally that broke the game open after the Warriors had led by only 86-94 at the three-quarter mark. Arizin scored 28 points.

# Oakland Franchised

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Oakland has been granted a franchise in the American Football League, the Los Angeles Times said today. Ernie Nevers, former Stanford University football star, will run the front office of the new franchise, the Times said. Other franchises have been awarded Denver, Dallas, Houston, New York, Boston, Buffalo and Los Angeles.

# California NBA Secession Hint Of Alliance With NY

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California's boiling of the National Boxing Assn. today brought a strong hint this state may seek closer cooperation with New York or possibly recommend federal control of the sport.

"If federal control is constructive, we would be all for it," declared Jack W. Urch, executive officer of the California Athletic Commission.

He added the state is willing to join with any group dedicated to restoring boxing to "the high pinnacle of public esteem that it deserves." New York and Massachusetts are the only other states outside the NBA. The former, in recent months, has conducted several investigations of boxing.

Urch said he urged the NBA last September to take steps to clean up the sport and warned that federal intervention was likely. A committee headed by Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn) is reported ready to start a nationwide investigation.

Last Aug. 25, California's Gov. Edmund G. Brown suggested at a news conference that some national boxing laws were needed "because this boxing business is apparently infiltrated with racketeers and gangsters." Brown said he may recommend banning the sport if Congress doesn't act on the matter this session.

The state commission did not appear in any mood to reconsider.

# LA Chargers Ink Gillman, Jop Open

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Even in this town where coaches last about as long as a blind man on the freeway during rush hour, the Los Angeles Chargers are something of an oddity.

The fledgling entry of the new American Football League has had two head coaches — and has yet to field a team.

The latest is long-suffering Sid Gillman, who signed a three-year contract Thursday.

Gillman was fired by the rival Los Angeles Rams after a miserable 2-10 record last season. He had coached the Rams five seasons, and was their fifth mentor in 10 years.

The Chargers' other coach lasted just one day. He was Bob McBride, one-time assistant at Notre Dame to Frank Leahy, now the Chargers' general manager. A few weeks ago Leahy announced McBride's appointment. A day later McBride, who had been out of football for several years, announced his resignation.

Gillman's salary terms were not disclosed. But his pay is believed to be comparable to the annual \$25,000 he got from the Rams.

# Ingo Arrives For Confabs

NEW YORK (UPI) — Heavyweight champion Ingemar Johanson, who arrives from Sweden Sunday night, goes into closed-door huddles with the N.Y. State Athletic Commission Monday and with the district attorney and state attorney general on Tuesday.

Ingemar requested the commission conference but whether he asked for the confabs with Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan and state Atty. Gen. Louis J. Lefkowitz could not be learned immediately.

Attorney Roy M. Cohn's new promoting group—Feature Sports, Inc.—hopes that Ingemar will sign within the next two weeks for the return defense of his crown against Floyd Patterson at the Polo Grounds, probably June 22.

# Tigers Go Inside

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — A complete indoor training center for the Detroit Tigers will be in operation when spring baseball training opens this year.

James A. Campbell, in charge of minor league operations and scouting, said Thursday a 100 x 120-foot airplane hangar will be used for the center through an agreement with the city of Lakeland.

"We can now use every day of training regardless of weather," Campbell said.

The center will have a dirt floor, two batting cages with pitching machines, eight catching and pitching areas and space for running.

Something is bound to give tonight when all four of the league leading County B basketball teams square off in struggles for clear-cut possession of their positions.

At Merrill the Huskies host the ever-threatening Malin Mustangs in a battle for the top spot while at Chiloquin the Panthers have to stand off the attack of the improving Bonanza Antlers.

The other conference game finds last place Bly seeking to crack the league win column with a trip to Gilchrist for a tussle with the Grizzlies who own a 1-win, 2-loss mark.

The Henley Hornets, the County's "loner," tangle with Sacred Heart in the Trojans' home gym in the only other action on the county front tonight.

The Hornets, led by coach Fred Hess in his freshman year at the helm, got away to a stormy start this year. In the win-loss column, the Henleyites have a 2-5 mark.

They dropped their opener to Malin 52-30, fell to Bonanza 50-37, then returned to deal Malin a 49-42 setback. The Trojans have worked since the Hornets, dropping one to the KU Wildcats Tuesday night.

Probably the highlight of the games this weekend will be the struggle between Merrill and Malin.

In the last meeting of the two, during the post-season tourney, the well-balanced Mustang five topped the Huskies 43-37. At that time Merrill had the services of big Bruce Brickner, the 6-6 junior who transferred to Klamath Union when his parents moved to Klamath Falls.

Malin holds a 5-3 mark with wins over Henley, Merrill, Chiloquin, Sacred Heart, and most recently, Tulelake.

The Huskies have won 6 and lost only to Malin. They have topped Bonanza twice, Sacred Heart, Tulelake, Henley and the KU JVs.

The Bonanza-Chiloquin test will decide who takes over the number three position on the ladder. The Bonanza quintet has one advantage over the Panthers. They have played more recently, having dealt Gilchrist a loss Tuesday night.

The setting is the Rancho Municipal Golf Club, a 7,000-yard course with a par of 35-36-71. Ken Venturi toured it a year ago in four rounds with 278 strokes, 6 under par, and took the winner's purse.

Venturi is back, and so are most of the top professionals in the nation.
