A highly-charged gang of Pelicans really got off the ground Saturday night and powered to a convincing 64 to 46 victory over the Grizzlies of Ashland on Pelican Court.

Friday night the Pels dumped Central Point 43-36. (See Page 3C)

In other Saturday action the Medford Black Tornado defeated the Grants Pass Cavemen 69-48. The Pels found the Ashland zone defense to their liking and picked it apart for a 14 to 1 first quarter lead as Harley Dickerson converted a free throw for the only Grizzly counter in that first session.

Gary Patzke, 6-3 sophomore, opened the scoring with a two hander from the left court off the first tip and the Pels ran the lead to 11-0 before Dickerson converted his charity toss.

Big Bob Lewis turned in one of his finest games of the season, pumping in 20 points to pace the KU offense, including nine of the Pels 14 counters in the first quarter.

Coach Dean White's charges were sailing out front 32 to 14 at halftime and the only serious challenge to their lead came at the beginning of the fourth quarter when Ashland closed the gap to nine points at 40-31 when the KU second unit took over. The Pels then poured on the coal with Lewis and Fred Biehn sharing the way and fattened the lead beyond question.

Three Pels scored in double figures. Besides Lewis' 20 point effort, Paul Bishop converted 14 and Biehn, pace-maker for the Pels, had 10.

Bob Hardy, big Ashland center, topped Grizzly scoring tries with an even dozen, followed by Jerry Hauck with 10.

Coach White used 12 men in his winning effort and Coach Earl Iba employed his full squad of 10.

The victory was the eighth season triumph for Klamath, and their second conference victory.

There are many more than just the area sports addicts who will benefit should the proposed plan to convert the Old Army (Klamath Auditorium, if you will) into a community activity center become a reality.

The Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Dept. is the prime mover behind this plan, and, although the department's name automatically suggests sports to most folk, its mission actually covers much more ground.

Recreation does not necessarily mean competition to many people. It can mean anything that serves to relax, to take one's mind off his worries and work; it can mean a chance to enjoy the arts and crafts, the company of people who share a common interest; good conversation or any one of a number of diversions.

What we lack is a central place for meetings of this nature, a place where the numerous clubs of our area may convene and grow. The Old Army, currently idle most of the time, provides just such a place.

Certainly it will cost a little money—the maintenance costs at the Armory will naturally rise as the facility gets more use. But, since it already costs us money, and we get such limited use of the building, it makes sense to me that if we were to spend a little more money we could use it to much better advantage."

Utilizing the Armory as a community center will not affect its current uses—they may go right on. What George says makes sense to me, too.

Post Season Grid Games Get Scrutiny

NEW YORK (AP)—The NCAA is going to take a good look at post-season football and basketball all-star games involving college athletes.

The policy-naming council of National Collegiate Athletic Assn. Saturday appointed a special committee to study the feasibility and desirability of certifying such games. Now only bowl games involving teams representing NCAA-member colleges come under certification.

Walt Byers, executive director of the NCAA, said: "The study is being made because of queries from other member colleges regarding the further athletic eligibility of students who play in the all-star games."

Byers added, "It is not a direct result of complaints by officials of the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala."

Malin Deals Alturas Loss

ALTURAS (Special)—The Malin Mustangs got even but good, for a defeat dealt them earlier this season by the Modoc Braves, by topping Alturas 57-40 in a non-league encounter here Saturday night.

Oregon Tech Quintet Blows Big Lead; Loses To PSC '5'

PORTLAND (Special)—Oregon Tech blew an 11 point first half lead and went for a little over 16 minutes without a basket in the second half in dropping a 39-34 Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball decision to Portland State College in Portland Saturday night.

The Owls getting three baskets from forward Gene Branson and six points from guard Dennis McKee, spurred to a 17-6 lead with 10:35 left in the first period, then PSC's Ray Torgerson went on a one-man scoring spree, drilling home four field goals and one foul shot to put the Vikings back in the game.

A pair of field goals just before the half by McKee, who scored 10 points in the first period, left the Owls with a 23-18 advantage at the intermission.

The Owls had trouble finding the range in the second half and before the Techmen could score a point the Viks had assumed the lead at 25-23 on a jump shot by Torgerson. Tech never did regain the lead and fell behind by as much as seven points before the end of the game.

Paul Layher, 6-7 senior center, scored the Owls first basket in the second half 2:21 left to play.

Don Powell, who shared scoring honors for PSC with Torgerson at 12 points each, accounted for 11 of these in the last 13 minutes.

McKee was top scorer for the Owls, who shot 396 from the field, with 12 points. Portland State compiled a .324 from the floor.

The defeat was the second in as many nights for the Owls, leaving them 0-2 for OCC action. The Vikings are currently atop the league with their 2-0 mark.

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
