Lee Directs North Stars To Victory

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Cincinnati's great passer, Jack Lee, tossed for two touchdowns and directed the North to a 26-7 victory over the South All-Stars in the 11th annual Senior Bowl Saturday.

The slender Lee, named the game's Most Valuable Player, broke the game wide open early in the fourth quarter with a 73-yard touchdown pass to Syracuse's Gerhard Schwedes. Moments later he threw a 23-yard touchdown pass to his Cincinnati teammate, Ed Kovac.

The Friday game saw the Kingsley crew tangling with the number three Air Force team of the nation. The Larson team picked up third place honors in the big world-wide Air Force Tournament.

In an earlier game this season the Larson club had dealt the Gonzaga Bulldogs a convincing defeat.

In the persons of Bob Harmon, 6-4, and Jay Brown, 6-5, the Larson quintet boasted two of the Air Forces' top point producers. They were limited to 13 and 15 points respectively by Kingsley's Chauncey Scott and Joe Chessnut.

Again Bell and Peoples led the point-parade; Bell, in spite of a cold first half emerged with 28 while Peoples, who directed the Jet floor game, contributed 23.

NBC Advises Gillette Co. Fights Done

NEW YORK (AP)—Not too long ago there were five boxing shows a week on network television. By September there may be only one, the Wednesday night program.

The Friday night fights, the granddaddy of them all, will be dropped by NBC.

The Gillette Safety Razor Co., which has sponsored the Friday night fights over TV for 15 years, said "We were informally advised by NBC Thursday that they did not want to carry the Friday night fights on their network after next September. We have not had time to give adequate consideration to our future course of action."

Vincent C. Ziegler, president of Gillette, said "We would be most reluctant to see the end of this program."

NBC officials declined comment. The sponsor might shift to another network. Columbia Broadcasting System dropped boxing several years ago. American Broadcasting Co. carries the Wednesday night fights.

Madison Square Garden, promoter of the Friday night fights, deals with Gillette which in turn buys the time from NBC. The Garden collects about \$25,000 a week from the sponsor.

Gillette also has to pay another \$75,000 or more weekly for the time charges and other expenses.

Ned Irish, president of the Garden, doesn't seem disturbed. "I don't anticipate a great change in our boxing schedule, and I do not think it will affect us financially," said Irish. "The people may come back to the arena. That is my thinking now. We intend to continue in the boxing business."

What prompted NBC's decision? The network wouldn't say. Some observers point to continuing investigations of boxing which has cast mud on the game, and secondly a desire by some NBC executives to make fuller use of the time.

Game Commission Posts Trout Season

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Game Commission Saturday set the general trout season tentatively for April 23-Oct. 31 and authorized a number of changes in the regulations.

The April 23-Oct. 31 dates do not cover zones 1, 3 and 4. Those zones—coastal streams, the Rogue and Umpqua—will have a May 28-Oct. 31 season in the tentative regulations.

In authorized changes, the commission extended the winter-steelhead season on all coast streams in zone 1 through March. The commission also authorized the use of cut or dead bait in zone 1, and permitting night angling for warm water game fish.

The commission tentatively extended boat angling on the McKenzie River. The area was extended about five miles upstream from the present deadline of Blue River to the new one of McKenzie Bridge. The bag limits remain the same on the McKenzie.

Big Cultus Lake was added to the list of high lakes opening April 23 to give anglers a chance at Kokanee and lake trout in early season.

The commission also changed the bag limit on shad, setting it at 10 daily. The minimum length on striped bass was changed to 15 inches and the bag limit on both large and small mouth bass was set at 10 a day, only five of which may be over 17 inches long.

In the Rogue the winter deadline on trout longer than 12 inches was moved from Shady Cove to a point below Gold Ray Dam. That action was taken to protect spring run steelhead.
