Etna Cagers Win Crown At Ft. Jones

FORT JONES (Special) — Etna and Butte Valley High basketball players dominated the All-Tourney teams picked at the close of the Siskiyou B. Basketball Tournament here Saturday night.

Selected to the "A" squad were Bert Heile and Russ Smith, both from Etna; Gary Longmore of Butte Valley; Jim Wostenberg of Happy Camp and Jim Klump of the host Fort Jones team.

Named by the participating coaches to the "B" squad were Butte Valley's Don Smith and Don Walton; Happy Camp's Leroy Wilder; and Jerry Mulloy and Ernest Burton, both of Fort Jones.

The Etna "A" quintet won the tourney championship with a convincing 37-17 victory over the Butte Valley Bulldogs and Happy Camp collected the "B" crown, coasting to a 35-22 victory over the Bulldogs "B" quintet.

Paced by a 14 point effort from Heile, the Etnans had quarter leads of 8-3, 14-6 and 25-14. Russ Smith counted 10 for Etna for number two game honors while Mickey Copeland led the BV five with seven points.

Leroy Wilder pumped in 17 points for Happy Camp to top the scorers in the "B" battle. Don Smith, with 10, was high for Butte Valley. The Happy Campers had a 4-1 first quarter lead, an 18-11 bulge at the half and moved on to 23-17 at the close of the third.

Fort Jones won the consolation "A" honors in a thrilling ding-dong scrap 32-30 with Happy Camp. Tom Wostenberg popped in 13 points to lead the HC crew while Dave Fraser with 11 was high for Fort Jones. The lead changed hands numerous times throughout the test, neither side having more than a three-point lead at a time.

The Fort Jones "B" squad sailed away with an easy 43-18 win over the Etna "Bs" in the "B" consolation tiff.

Herb Elliott Apt To Race In U.S. Meets MELBOURNE (UPI) — There was a strong likelihood today that Herb Elliott, world record mile holder, will go to the United States to compete in two track meets with or without the approval of local athletic authorities.

Elliott has been invited to compete in meets at California and New York by the American Amateur Athletic Union, but an Australian ban imposed because of technicality cropped up during the weekend to cloud the issue somewhat.

Australian authorities disappeared Elliott's going to the U.S. because Elliott had not replied to the invitations and they assumed he did not want to go. Alf Robinson, secretary of the Victorian Amateur Athletic Union, though, came closer to the generally accepted local view when he revealed that the invitations were for this month or June. The latter month is frowned upon because it comes too close to the Olympic Games.

Elliott, in defense, said he did not reply to the invitations immediately because they had slipped his mind. He also indicated he probably will go to the U. S. anyway.

"I feel competition in America can help bring me to the top for the Olympic Games," he said. "That is the main reason I want to go."

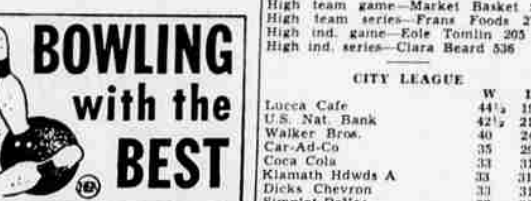

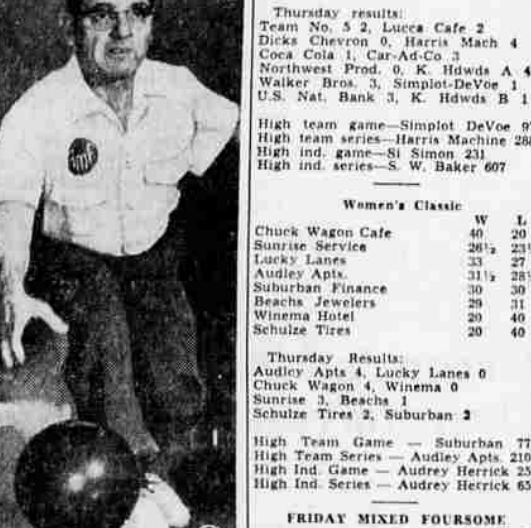

Although I'll always teach a beginner to finish the delivery on his left foot (for a right-hander), I doubt if I'd be able to average 150 without my "wrong-foot" style. For the average bowler, I suppose having the left foot in front provides better balance as he releases the ball at the foul line with his right hand.

I began bowling almost 40 years ago in Italy. We called the game "bocci." It's similar to lawn bowling. Since there are no pins to knock down in "bocci" (you try to roll your ball as close as possible to a given spot), the emphasis is entirely on accuracy—not speed.

I found this early training a great help when I started to bowl tennis. The technique calls for a right-handed "bocci" player to end his delivery on the right foot. You simply can't roll the ball excessively fast when you do that.

I might have other problems, but with my "wrong-foot" delivery, I find that I seldom commit the common fault of many, overpowering the ball, trying to "blow out the back end of the building."

Ernie Banks Spurs Cash For The Kids

By JOE MOOSHIL CHICAGO (AP) — When a star athlete begins getting awards as "the most this and the most that" it usually means extra cash in various ventures and appearances.

Such, however, is not the case with Ernie Banks, the slugging Chicago Cub shortstop, who became the first National Leaguer to be named most valuable player twice in succession.

"If something comes my way, that's fine," said Banks. "But I like working with kids. They need help and when I appear in behalf of the Little Leagues or something like that, naturally, there's no fee."

Banks has a genuine affection for children. He thinks nothing of hanging around the ball park an hour or so after a game signing autographs.

"You can see a gleam in their eyes when they get an autograph," says Banks, "and to me that's something. Some kids get my autograph a hundred times. I know them by sight. But the minute they get it again, they're off running and jumping with joy. Just like it was the greatest thing that ever happened to them. It's just their way of having fun."

"Kids look up to athletes, I know," continued Banks. "They all have their idols and favorites. Mine was Stan Musial. Although I never saw him play outside of exhibitions in Dallas, I wanted to become just like him. I'm glad I picked Stan because when I got to the majors I really found out what a great guy he is."

Banks, who will be 29 Jan. 31, had a great season last year and is looking forward to a better one in 1960.

The slender wrist hitter slammed 45 home runs and drove in 143 runs. In addition, he set two major league fielding records when he finished with 12 errors and a .985 fielding average.
