House Group Organizes For Civil Rights Push

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "Liberals in the House have been long on political speeches and short on political power." Speaking is Rep. Lee Metcalf (D-Mont.). His sentiments are shared by most northern Democratic Congressmen. Now they are finally doing something about it.

"In many cases we haven't had the votes," Metcalf said. "But in other cases we've been handicapped because we haven't been as well organized as the conservatives."

A series of closed-door meetings last week completed establishment of a new organization called "The House Democratic Study Group." Metcalf, temporary chairman, apparently is slated to become the group's permanent leader.

The organization claims a membership of about 125 northern, midwestern and western Democrats. It is planning to push for an eight or nine point legislative program with top priority assigned to civil rights.

A major objective, Metcalf told United Press International, is to weld the membership into an alert, well-disciplined force able to cope with maneuvers of conservatives.

Although it is operating independently, Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) does not regard the liberal group as a challenge to his leadership. Rayburn said last week they were "good boys" who probably would help him in his battles this year. Rayburn's legislative program embraces much of the group's major objectives.

The new liberal organization will operate its own "whip setup" to summon its members to the floor for crucial votes.

"It will be used sparingly—only on regional issues such as civil rights where we feel it would be improper to call on the regular party whip organization, which serves both northern and southern Democrats," Metcalf explained.

Asked why the study group's membership list was being kept secret, Metcalf explained that members' views would vary on certain issues.

Metcalf added, "we don't bind any member to comply with the decision of the group or to vote contrary to his convictions or the wishes of the districts he represents."

Governor Falls In Milk Attempt; Dignity Injured

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—Gov. David Lawrence of Pennsylvania sat down to milk a cow Sunday night during a preview of the state farm show. He promptly fell off the stool.

"I didn't have far to fall," he remarked. Then he got back on the stool and finished milking the cow.

Only his dignity was hurt.

Operator Ready, Shoots Robbers

MARYSVILLE, Ohio (AP)—Country store proprietor Stanley Rhodes, 50, watched two men come into his store, and leave, in nearby Parisburg.

Later, he saw the pair sitting in a car in front of his store—both masked.

He called the sheriff's office. A few minutes later, the two men walked in, one holding a .22-caliber revolver, and demanded money.

Rhodes was ready. He grabbed his own revolver and fatally shot Thomas R. Mayse, 23, and wounded Tildon R. Watts, 26, in the arm. Both were from Marion.

When deputies arrived, all Rhodes had left to do was to tell them about it.

Change Making Snarls Bridges

PORTLAND (AP)— Making change turned out to be the chief problem when collection of tolls began on the Interstate bridges between Portland and Vancouver, Wash., Sunday.

Most of the drivers seemed to need small change to pay the 20-cent toll and headed into Lane 1, leaving the other lanes nearly vacant.

Collectors explained they can make change in lanes 5, 6 and 7 as well as 1 and there is no sense in crowding into one lane.

Any lane can be used by those with the correct change, 20 cents a car. Commuters also can buy 40 tokens for \$6, cutting the rate to 15 cents.
