Ring Champ Curious As To What Goes On

NEW YORK (AP) — Ingemar Johansson the world heavyweight champion, wants to know exactly what is going on. He is not alone.

The New York State attorney general's office is interested. So is the New York State Athletic Commission. Also Frank Hogan, the New York County district attorney.

Depending on the outcome of the conversations with these three authorities he will or will not give Floyd Patterson a chance to win back the title in New York in June.

Johansson arrived Sunday night from Sweden with his adviser, Edwin Ahlquist. He appeared Monday at a luncheon to accept the 1959 "Sportsman of the Year" award from Sports Illustrated magazine. He will be appearing before various authorities the rest of the week.

The champ said he had no appointments with Roy Cohn's new eight-man promotional group that bought the rematch agreement originally held by Rosensohn Enterprises. Cohn's group recently visited Johansson in Sweden and reported everybody was real chummy. Some were at the press luncheon.

"I shook hands with some of them at the airport," said Johansson. "I would like to speak to the boxing commission and the authorities before I meet with them again. I would like to know exactly what is going on."

One very important factor to be considered in all negotiations about a rematch is the fact that Johansson's entire purse for the first fight still is held in escrow by the New York commission. Naturally the champ is anxious to get his hands on it.

The Cohn group has applied for a promoter's license but the commission has taken no action as yet. No rematch contract is on file with the commission.

The matter of the ancillary rights — held by Floyd Patterson Enterprises and turned over to a closed circuit TV company in the first fight — is a stumbling block. If the same deal is in effect in a rematch contract, the promoters may have trouble getting commission approval.

Cincinnati, California Stay 1-2 On College Maple Polls

Cincinnati's unbeaten Bears and California's once-beaten Bears remain 1-2 in the weekly Associated Press recording of the nation's college basketball teams.

Texas A&M and Villanova moved up into the top ten for the first time as they carried their perfect records well into January, and Illinois and Wake Forest dropped out in the major changes in the new weekly accounting.

The Texas Aggies overcame Baylor and Texas Christian last week for a 10-0 record and gained eighth place, formerly held by

Wake Forest, and Villanova (9-0) took ninth from Illinois.

The only other change in The Associated Press poll rankings, based on the votes of 174 sports writers and broadcasters, was Ohio State switching places with Utah, the Buckeyes moving up to fifth and the Utes dropping to seventh.

The voting for the first four places almost duplicated that of a week ago. Cincinnati, drawing first place votes from 147 of the 174 experts, polled a total of 1,716 points to California's 1,455. West Virginia, runner-up to California in the NCAA championship last spring, continued in third with 1,356 and Bradley was fourth with 1,035.

as a stick during the delivery. The ball actually bounces when it contacts the lane, so it skids instead of rolls."

He passed along a tip that he incorporated into my delivery and have used ever since.

He asked me to relax, bend over slightly to the right and make certain that my left leg was bent as I released the ball. I know that this crouching delivery has made me a better bowler.

The quicker you can get the ball rolling, not skidding, down the lane, the more effective it will be when it enters the pin area.

Should the ball skid most of the way, the working hook will have been spent by the time the ball hits the pins. You'll have what is known as a flat apple. You'll have quite a few pins left standing.

By carrying the ball low during my delivery, there is no temptation to drop the ball when I let it fly.

I can ease the ball down onto the boards just as a pilot sets a plane down on a landing strip.

Chiloquin JC Making Plans For Tourney

CHILOQUIN — Preliminary plans were set for the Seventh Annual National Invitational All-Indian Basketball Tournament March 16-19 at the January meeting of the Klamath Reservation Jaycees at Chiloquin.

Noble Sanderville of Klamath Agency has accepted the general chairmanship for the seventh year in a row. Twelve all-Indian basketball teams from South Dakota to Arizona will again compete for national honors. Lapwai, Idaho, and Lodge Grass, Montana, each of whom has won two of these classics, will be back to try for their third win and permanent possession of the traveling trophy.

It is expected that all the teams which finished in the top six places last year will return.

An elimination tourney will be held in late February on the Chiloquin High School maple to select the host team and the state of Oregon entry to the main tournament. This will be an eight-team affair with four Oregon teams in one bracket and four local reservation teams in the other bracket. The winner of each respective bracket will fill a berth in the March tournament.

The All-Indian tourney in March will be held in its entirety in the high school gymnasium in Chiloquin. There will be no move of any part of the tournament to Klamath Falls as there was in 1959. Therefore, the Jaycees urge all local basketball fans to give their strong support to this great community affair to assure financial feasibility.

All local all-Indian basketball teams are asked to contact Mr. Noble Sanderville if they desire a berth in the February elimination tournament.
