

Police Probe New Report Of Bad Checks

Three non-sufficient-fund checks passed in Klamath Falls late last year came to the attention of city police Tuesday.

Two checks were reported by Pauline Laubach, manager of the Pines Tavern, 121 South Fourth Street, passed October 25 and October 30. Both were drawn on First National Bank, Klamath Falls Branch, blanks. The checks were for \$15 and \$20.

Another worthless check, for \$10, was reported by Bob Poteet of the Twin Girls Grocery, 601 East Main Street. He said the check, written on a First Western Bank and Trust of Butte Valley blank, was passed December 24.

Other thefts were reported by Mrs. Minnie Robinson, 421 Washington Street, and by Ivan Horton, 628 Oak Avenue.

Mrs. Robinson said she is missing several towels, pillow cases, doilies and scarves and two tapestries from her home. The theft occurred January 10 or after, she said.

Horton said someone took a clock radio and a sportcoat from his unlocked apartment sometime Monday.

Police also investigated an accident at the corner of Main and Eleventh streets Tuesday afternoon. They charged William Franklin Metcalf, 3824 Clinton Avenue, with running a red light.

Officers said Metcalf's car struck one driven by Clarence Frederick Gansberg, Route 2, Klamath Falls, at 3:38 p.m. Both cars received minor damage.

Dividend Set For Vets

An estimated 57,582 Oregon veterans who hold participating GI life insurance will receive a total of \$2,893,800 in regular annual policy dividends during 1960, S. T. Brannock, contact representative, Camp White, announced today.

Brannock said this represents Oregon policyholders' proportionate share in a national 1960 dividend total of \$253,500,000 declared recently for participating veterans.

Brannock explained the dividends are a refund to policyholders of part of premium payments, and are possible because the death rate among policyholders continues lower than estimated in tables through which the premiums were established by law.

Policyholders are requested not to make dividend inquiries in advance, since that would delay processing.

Dividends will be paid as soon as possible after the anniversary date of each policy during 1960. For example, if a policy was issued on any September 1, the anniversary date will be September 1, 1960.

Dividends will be paid to holders of both term and permanent plan NSLI and USGLI policies.

Eleanor Won't Attend Meeting

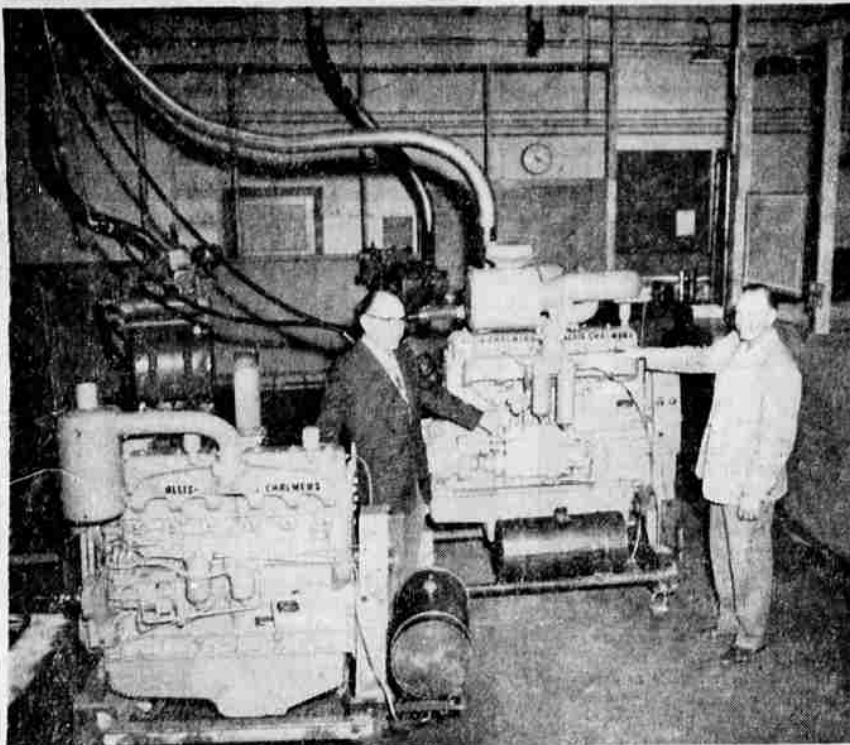
LOS ANGELES (AP)—Eleanor Roosevelt says she won't attend the National Democratic Convention in Los Angeles if she can possibly help it.

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OTI Shop Receives Machinery

Equipment worth \$10,000 was moved into Auto-Diesel Division shops at Oregon Technical Institute recently.

Diesel students are able to work with six turbo-chargers, a 340-horsepower diesel engine, and a 122 horsepower unit.

The equipment was rented from the Allis Chalmers Company "under a unique and attractive contract." Arrangements were made through Hamilton Engine Sales, Portland, West Coast Allis Chalmers representatives.

Diesel students now are able to work with engines of latest vintage, said Harold C. Rotrock, division head.

Negotiations for the gear began in February last year. Seven AC and Hamilton representatives presented a three-day seminar for all OTI diesel students at that time. Another such seminar is scheduled next month.

Homes For Children Found Through Classified Ads

TORONTO (AP)—To get homes for children the province of Ontario uses classified advertising. Thirty hard-to-place children were adopted last year through newspaper advertising. The Department of Public Welfare estimates Ontario has 2,000 of these "unwanted" children. They may be of mixed racial origin, have physical handicaps, or be more than about 4 years old.

The department has set aside \$10,000 for ads in Ontario daily newspapers in 1960. Last year \$5,000 was spent seeking homes for 77 children.

"The ads have created a great deal of public interest in the whole field of adoptions," the department says.

Deputy Minister James S. Band, who conceived the program, observes: "We're not merchandising children, we're merchandising their happiness."

The 1959 campaign brought more than 2,300 responses for specific children—more than half from outside Canada.

One advertisement said: "Sue is a healthy 2-year-old of French-Indian-Japanese background. An alert, contented little girl with dark hair and eyes, and delicate Japanese features."

"Diane, a bright 2-year-old, is of French-Canadian, Roman Catholic origin. Has curly fair hair, is a friendly rosy-cheeked youngster, slightly handicapped by mild cerebral palsy," another ad said.

Both were adopted. Others adopted included seven Indians, three Negroes and four physically handicapped children.

The department tries to discourage inquiring American couples because of the legal entanglements of international adoptions.

Disguised Lad Nabbed By Police

REEDSPORT, Ore. (AP)—Hot in pursuit, police nabbed a girl who climbed unharmed from a car that overturned while being pursued by police, took a closer look and decided that she was a he.

Police said the unnamed escapee from the McLaren School for Boys had gotten the car and the girl's clothing in Eugene.

That was Monday night, and police said the 15-year-old Tuesday asked for — and got — a pair of trousers.
