

Boulder City, Nevada, Is Strange Paradox To Rest Of The State

BOULDER CITY, Nev. (AP)—In this little city that grew up along with Hoover Dam, eight miles away—

You can't buy a lot and it's nearly impossible to rent a house; Gambling and hard liquor, legal elsewhere in Nevada, are against the law; and Unlike nearly all the Far West, this city has no water or power problem.

There's no other place quite like it.

After 29 years of federal administration, Boulder City became a self-governing municipality of 3,500 population by act of Congress last session.

Under its unique charter, the city is now run by a council of five nonpaid residents.

The councilmen, who took office Jan. 4, have complete control of the municipality, which owns every lot in town except sites of a government building, a school and a cemetery.

Residents and businessmen own their buildings but not the land they occupy. Most commercial property is under 10-year lease. Maximum lease for residential property is 53 years.

But, under the new charter, every leaseholder has a two-year option to buy his site at a price fixed by Federal Housing Administration appraisal. If he buys, the money will go to a municipal fund for capital improvements. The total appraisal is about \$2,300,000. Those who don't wish to buy can extend their leases at 5 per cent interest.

The government not only gave Boulder City its square mile of developed property but threw in 32 square (and empty) miles in which to expand. The council has six months to draft an over-all plan for subdivision of this extra land. Thereafter the city can dispose of large parcels to private developers, or it can go into the real estate business and subdivide the area itself.

This gives Boulder City a chance to plot its development, street by street, house by house.

Newly chosen Mayor Robert Broadbent said: "It's going to be around for the next few years."

Broadbent, 33, owns the drugstore at the city's main intersection. His father was mayor of Ely, Nev., for 14 years. Like many other Boulder City residents, he opposes gambling and hard liquor, banned from the beginning under federal administration. Under the new charter the ban is continued for three years. Then the voters can decide by referendum. The city does have two beer parlors.

"We look at it this way," says Broadbent. "We can't compete with Las Vegas (28 miles away, for those who get bored), so we're going to try to be something else. We can offer a clean city, good recreation, opportunity, good schools."

Lake Mead behind Hoover Dam is a noted fishing and boating site.

Boulder City's city manager is Curtis Blyth, also 33, chosen from 60 applicants. He gets \$11,000 a year. Previously Blyth was city manager in Bayside, Wis., and Florence, Colo.

"I think the Southwest is the growngest area in the country," he says. "There's going to be no stopping it for many years to come. I'd like to be a participant in it."

The city's biggest job, he says, is real estate—developing the 32 square miles bestowed by Congress—once the master plan is drawn.

"We want to get the best planners we can to come here and do it right. We have complete control, and we're starting with a community that already has been built by plan."

Power from the dam and water from the lake are part of the federal government's gift. Sale of water alone will yield the city \$200,000 yearly. Tourists will be another source of revenue; 73,000 toured the dam last August, biggest month in its history. Thousands more visited the lake.

Light industry also will be sought, along with residents seeking the clean air and clean, tree-lined streets of this community on a high plateau.

Not quite everybody is certain that life will be more liberal now that the federal government no longer runs the town. Herb Knauss, beer tavern proprietor, is one of those who will wait and see.

"People here drink wet," says Knauss, "but they vote dry."

Walkingest Gal Off On New Trip

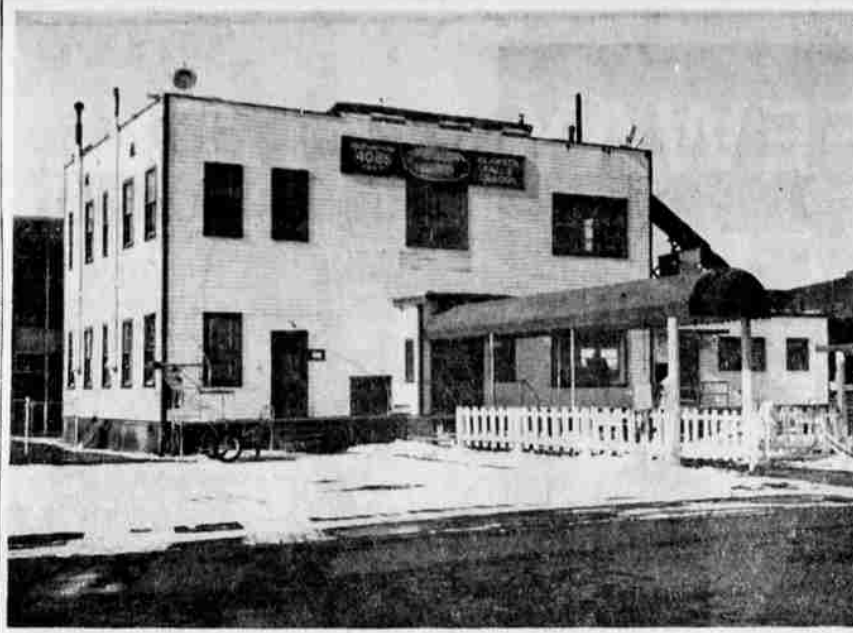
JOHN O'GROATS, Scotland (AP)—Dr. Barbara Moore, Britain's walkingest woman, struck out today on a 1,000-mile trudge from one end of Britain to the other. Two other women and four men, from 19 to 46 years old, already were on the march from John O'Groats, the northernmost tip of the British mainland, to Land's End, at the extreme southwest of England.

It was an unofficial contest with no prizes offered, the biggest challenge so far in the marathon craze that for no known reason has raged in Britain for several months.

Dr. Moore's first big test was a 373-mile march from Edinburgh to London. She made it in just 7½ days, finishing on Christmas Eve.

Body Found

Influenza Outbreaks Upset Community

Outbreaks of mild influenza have upset community routine in various parts of the country, closing schools, dropping production, delaying justice, and perking up the sale of pills.

Secretary of Welfare Arthur S. Flemming said Tuesday that nine states had reported outbreaks. In four, the variety was Asian flu.

Flemming named Texas, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Michigan, California, Nevada, Utah and Hawaii.

There were signs that other states might be added soon. The epidemiologist for Seattle, Wash., was concerned that it might hit his area.

"There has been a moderate spread of flu carried back to Seattle from Los Angeles by people who went to the Rose Bowl football game," Dr. R.T. Ravenholt said.

After Secretary Flemming's announcement, Dr. John Porterfield of the Public Health Service said that Asian flu had been confirmed in Tennessee, Ohio, Michigan and Hawaii.

"We do not think there will be as many cases as in the previous outbreak and they will not be as universal," he said.

Two years ago, a winter epidemic of Asian flu spread over most of the country.

In Los Angeles county, the "Q-flu" kept 20 per cent of city employes, 15 per cent of industrial workers, 10 to 15 per cent of students, and 10 per cent of the teachers at home.

Influenza closed schools in Tennessee's Perry County from Dec. 18 until last Monday.

Columbus, Ohio, druggists reported a thriving pill business as many residents walked about

sneezing and coughing with bad colds or more serious infections.

Dr. Joseph G. Milner, the Detroit health commissioner, said the flu has hit the Detroit area in serious proportions. His department is conducting a series of tests to determine the type, potency, and prevalence of the influenza.

U.S. Jewish Congress Hears Ike Rap

NEW YORK (AP)—President Eisenhower, noting recent anti-Semitic vandalism, says "the virus of bigotry" must not be allowed "to spread one inch."

In a message read Tuesday night at an emergency meeting of the American Jewish Congress, Eisenhower said that when bigotry "becomes rampant it can cause the destruction of freedom and decency everywhere."

"In this age, when so much is expected and required of America, we can ill afford to waste a single day combating bigotry or prejudice at home," the President declared.

The message was addressed to the National Conference of Christians and Jews in reply to a telegram last Thursday from representatives of the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths. They voiced concern to the President over the threat of religious bigotry in politics and the anti-Semitic outbreaks.

In a note read at the meeting, a White House aide, Gerald D. Morgan, said: "Like you, the President has been concerned about the recent outbreak of religious intolerance and views it with deep loathing."

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller wired the American Jewish Congress: "The recent outbreak of vandalism of synagogues and churches is shocking. Every thinking person is indignant at these shameful acts and those responsible for these depredations in various parts of the world."

At the Jewish Congress emergency meeting, Protestant and Catholic leaders deplored the van-

dalism. A message from Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston said: "I know I speak for millions of Catholics when I offer my prayerful sympathy to our Jewish friends and neighbors."

Bishop James A. Pike of the Episcopal diocese of California, said in a message that every effort must be made to stamp out the anti-Semitic acts. He said they constitute a "reflection on the inadequacy of the teaching of Christians and others in regard to brotherhood and the common religious and ethical foundations of Judaism and Christianity."

The Rt. Rev. Horace W. B. Donegan, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of New York, a principal speaker at the meeting noted that the huge Episcopal cathedral of St. John the Divine here recently had been smeared with the Star of David. With the mark was the inscription "An eye for an eye."

"The prankster, neurotic or misguided individual" responsible for the marking would "scarcely have bothered," said Bishop Donegan, had he known that the Star of David appears over 100 times in the cathedral.

An official of the American Jewish Congress said the meeting was the first time that leaders of the major religious faiths in the Western Hemisphere discussed from the same platform the wave of synagogue defacements.

The president of the American Jewish Congress, Dr. Joachi Prinz, warned against underestimating the significance of the swastika daubings.

They should not be dismissed,

he said, "a mere fad like the hula hoop or rock 'n' roll. The cry of 'Death to the Jews' embodied in the swastika is a dangerous lyric for a rock 'n' roll number."

President Eisenhower's message said:

"We deeply regret that the virus of bigotry seems to be ever present in the body politic. We can not ignore it nor can we allow it to spread one inch. For when it becomes rampant it can cause the destruction of freedom and decency everywhere.

"In this age, when so much is expected and required of America, we can ill afford to waste a single day combating bigotry or prejudice at home. United in a common purpose, in free and responsible teamwork between those of all races, of all faiths and of all nationalities, we will continue seeking to advance the general welfare of all our people and our neighbors abroad."

Filmland Pair Gets Divorce

Mrs. De Mille said her husband used vile language and belittled her in the presence of their children and friends.
