## Owls, EOC Schedule Pair Of OCC Games

Appearing on their home court for the first time since December 12, the Oregon Tech Owls play host to the Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers for a two-game Oregon Collegiate Conference series this weekend. The first game starts at 8 o'clock Friday night; the second at the same time Saturday.

Both contests will be preceded by preliminary tests featuring the OTI Intramural All - Stars and Fleet's Sporting Goods of the Victory League. The prelims get underway at 6:30 sharp both evenings.

The Techmen, still in search of the number two for the season, have an 8-2 record for conference activity. They stumbled in the OCC opening games with the Vikings at Portland State College last week.

## KU Pelican Matmen In Weekend Twinbill

Klamath Union High wrestling coaches DeLance Duncan and Jack Peterson guided their charges through the final stages of preparations for a busy weekend; this afternoon, supervising the last of the intrasquad competition for the number two spot on both the varsity and freshmen teams.

Friday afternoon at 3:30 the Pelican varsity matmen tangle with Medford's Black Tornado on Pelican Court and then return to work on Saturday for matches with the Prineville Cowboys beginning at 12:30 p.m. Saturday.

While the Pels are mixing it up with Prineville the freshmen will be in action against North Grants Pass Junior High. There is no Friday competition scheduled for the "Baby" Pelicans.

The varsity got its season off to a good start last weekend when they dumped the Redmond Panthers, the 1959 Oregon Prep champs, on the Panthers' home mat. Although their win was a narrow one, coach Duncan noted that some additional work was all that was needed to give his squad enough strength to leave a definite impression on future opponents.

The freshmen also have a victory to their credit from their only previous start, a 30-20 decision over Hedrick Junior High of Medford.

The usual method of picking Pelican varsity contenders, wrestling among themselves, the top man getting the nod, will be concluded this afternoon.

Owl preparations this week have included pointed work on offensive strategy and special drills against both a man-to-man and zone defense. The EOC five is expected to utilize zone defensive measures quite extensively.

Joining Arritola and Chase in the fast-breaking Mountie lineup are forward Bob Plinger, 6-2; guard Mel Holmes, 6-0; and guard Ron Hunt at 5-9. Arritola is 6-2 and Chase is 6-1. Holmes boasts a 10.2 game average while Hunt and Olinger are shooting 6.2 and 5.4 respectively.

Owl boss Wally Palmberg will name his lineup just prior to game time Friday. His choice will be made from among Dennis McKee, Roy Johnson, Leon and Charlie Wilson, Jack Horton, Norm Oliva, Gene Branson, Buddy Guill, Van Ziek, Paul Layher and returns Troy Koontz and Ardell Hamilton. Koontz, a strong threat off the boards, joined the squad last week after dropping a midway point last year. Hamilton, who started with the Techsters earlier this year, rejoined the club this Wednesday. Hamilton is not expected to see a great deal of action against the Mounties but Koontz will be called upon.

Although he is expected to suit up, speedy guard Jim Ramseyer is ready for only limited, if any, action this weekend, since he is still recuperating from a badly sprained ankle.

In overall height comparisons, the Owls have a slight advantage, Layher's 6-7 comparing with two Mounties, neither of whom are starters, 6-4.

McKee who has tallied at an 11.5 clip is the top Owl point producer.

## NCAA Rule Makers Pass On Compromise

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The college footballers still must learn to play the game both ways—offense and defense.

The rules makers assured this by passing a revised substitution rule labeled as a compromise between unlimited substitution, advocated by most of the coaches, and the stand-pat policy urged by the NCAA.

First comments by coaches over the country were favorable. The concession to the coaches is that they may send in one man at a time at any time, and as often as they please. The concession to the NCAA is that the rule governing substitutes under other circumstances remains unchanged.

That is, when players are sent in numbers from two to 11 their entry is charged against them, and they are permitted only two such entries in a quarter.

On the surface the change seems comparatively minor, but it nevertheless opens a wide field which will challenge the ingenuity of the coaches.

They now, if they so desire, can call the plays themselves by sending a solo sub every play, whether or not the clock is running. They can develop individual kicking and passing and defensive specialists and be able to get them in and out as occasion demands.

But the squad as a whole will have to play the game both ways, a situation which is pleasing even to the two-platoon advocates.

The revised rule was passed by the 13 committee voters unanimously, said Gen. Bob Neyland, of Tennessee, Rules Committee chairman, at the close of the final session Wednesday. Its basic difference, the 1959 rule is that a substitute, going in alone, is not charged with an entry, and he can return whether or not he already has used up his two group entries. Also, the clock may be running. Last year it had to be stopped.

## Whitebirds Journey For Tough SOC Tilts

Although every game on the Southern Oregon Conference schedule can be termed a "crucial" for the Klamath Union High Pelicans who are aiming at a berth in the Oregon A-1 cage tourney in March, the coming weekend has special portent.

Friday night at Grants Pass the Whitebirds close out their first trip around the league loop in a match with the Cavemen then re-

turn to Medford to open the second round against the powerful Black Tornado Saturday night.

For the Grants Passers, who entered the 1959-60 action with five returning lettermen, the game is almost a "must" if they wish to keep any tournament hopes they might have alive. They have won three games while losing six. The Pelicans own an 8-1 mark.

Coach, Gordie Prehm's C A V squad is led by high-pointer Rex Benner, an All-Conference choice as a junior, who has tallied 178 points over the nine-game route for an average of 19.8 points per outing.

Making up the balance of the list of probable starters are Gary Hugoboom, 6-3; Larry Jensen, 6-2; Jim Purkett, 5-11; and Denny Walker, a 5-10 junior. Benner stands 6-2.

Leading the Pelicans is guard Paul Bishop with 138 points for a 15.3 average. The Pels have a decided height advantage, being able to floor combinations that average up to 6-4.

KU coach Dean White will make his starting five known just prior to the game with the Cavemen. He will choose from among Bishop, Bob Lewis, Bruce Brickner,

Yreka, with Bill Wilson in the lineup, and Weed, with Doug Blankenship on deck, are rated the favorites in their respective contests although the Saturday night chore for Weed figures to be close.

The last time out the Miners dumped Eagle Point 70-47 at Yreka, using the entire bench in the process. The Eagles, even on their home floor, are not rated a look-in.

Butte Valley is stinging from a 38-17 lashing dealt them by Etms for the A championship in the recent Fort Jones tournament and is rated the edge over Fort Jones' five.

Tulelake (3-5) figures to have its hands full with the Ettnans who are led by Bert Heile, one of the recent tourney All-Stars.

MOBILE, Ala. (UPI)—Ralph Dupas is looking for "bigger game" among the welterweights while Kenny Lane is "goin' back to the little fellas" among the lightweights.

This sums up the future plans of the two fighters after Dupas (144½) scored a unanimous decision over Lane (141) in Wednesday night's televised 10-round bout at the Fort Whiting Arena.

"I want Luis Rodriguez next," said Dupas, referring to the top-ranking welterweight contender from Cuba, "and then champion Don Jordan."

"I just can't go against these boys," conceded Lane. "I'm too slow at this weight to be at my best and I can't spot good welterweights 10 pounds. So I'll just have to start chasin' lightweight champ Joe Brown."

Dupas of New Orleans sliced up Lane like 50-cent hamburger in the first three rounds and then beat off the late furies of the Muskegon, Mich., battler.

Despite a 21-point effort by Jim Rieger for the losers, the Dick Reeder's crew was more efficient at the foul line and managed to maintain their halftime 32-30 lead for the rest of the ballgame. Frank Dubiel potted 15 for the winners. The lead changed hands numerous times throughout the game.

'Stilt' Grabs Score Lead

Wilt Chamberlain has taken over the scoring lead in a National Basketball Assn. and appears set to stay in front for the remainder of the season.

The phenomenal Philadelphia newcomer went over the 40-point mark for the third time in his last five games as he hit for 42 in the Warriors' 132-131 overtime victory over Syracuse Wednesday night.

He now has 1,457 points to 1,436 for Cincinnati's Jack Twyman. The Royals have also played six more games than the Warriors.

The score was 119-all at the end of regulation play. Ernie Beck nailed down the triumph with a short jump shot with 10 seconds to go in the overtime session to give the Warriors their 10th straight win.

Dolph Schayes, who went over the 15,000-point mark Tuesday, was Syracuse's high man with 25.

The Boston Celtics, with a 41-point spurt in the first and third periods, scored a one-sided, 134-112, victory over the St. Louis Hawks. It was only the third victory in the last nine starts for the Eastern Division pace-setters.

Frank Ramsey, honored along with St. Louis' Cliff Hagan with a "night," led Boston with 27 points. Clyde Lovellette topped the Hawks with 26.

SEATTLE (AP)—Jim Owens, the lanky Oklahoman who led a team of juniors to a football triumph in the Rose Bowl, is Seattle's Man of the Year in Sports for 1959.

Owens, 32, was named at the annual Man of the Year banquet Wednesday night for his achievement in guiding the Washington Huskies through a near-perfect season to a 44-8 victory over Wisconsin at Pasadena.

## Slats Gill Sidelined For Year

SEATTLE (AP)—A heart attack has put Oregon State coach Amory T. Gill out of action for the remainder of the current basketball season, but it's too early to say whether he is through coaching for good.

That was the verdict Wednesday of the doctor who has been attending Gill since the 58-year-old coach was stricken after the OSC-Washington game here Monday night.

The physician said Gill will have to stay in the hospital for two to three weeks and then take it easy at home for a like period. He said a blood test and an electrocardiogram showed the veteran mentor had a heart attack brought on by narrowing of coronary arteries.

He has been making a good recovery and there have been no complications, the doctor said. But he added: "There is no way to make any statement now as to whether this means the end of his coaching career."

Oregon State Athletic Director Roy Keene announced in Corvallis that Gill's assistant, Lual Valenti, will take charge of the basketball team during the coach's absence. Gill has been head coach at OSC for 32 years.

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Coach Len Casanova of the University of Oregon said Wednesday night he rejected an offer to coach at California.

"I just told them I wouldn't go down," Casanova said. He said the job at the Berkeley, Calif., school had been offered him in talks with California officials.

"I am very happy at Oregon and am going to stay," said Casanova at his Eugene home. He said his decision came after long thought and talks with his family.

"Cal is a great school," he said, "and I honestly believe if I had been at any other school than Oregon I would have been tempted to jump at the offer given me by the Bear officials."

Casanova, who came to Oregon in 1950, said in a statement: "From the very beginning I have enjoyed myself at the University of Oregon and I am deeply appreciative of the support always given me by the school's administration, other members of the athletic department, the alumni, players and friends of the university."

"After long consideration, I felt that at Oregon I would be in a better position to keep collegiate football on a sound but proper level.

"I hope my decision meets with the approval of all those who have written urging me to stay."

PROPOSES LISTON BOUT  
DENVER (UPI)—Boxing promoter Milt Willner said Wednesday he would guarantee \$25,000 to the winner of next Monday night's Zora Folley-Eddie Machen fight to meet Sonny Liston in Denver. Willner also offered an alternative of 25 per cent of the gate if either Folley or Machen would agree to oppose Liston.

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
