Weed Control Meeting Set

TULELAKE—Leading weed authorities of the state will discuss various phases of weed control at the annual California Weed Conference. This is scheduled to begin in the Sacramento Memorial Auditorium the afternoon of January 19 and extend through January 21, reports Ken Baggett, Tulelake farm adviser.

The conference will open with a welcome by President C. Bruce Wade of Redding, followed by a report of the activities of the Weed Control Committee of the State Chamber of Commerce.

Weed control experts also will discuss new developments in herbicides, weeds in forest plantings, field observation with wetting agents, and secondary weed invasions.

The following day, regulatory considerations in weed control will be presented by a panel. Registration requirements for herbicides will be discussed by representatives of the California Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

A highlight of the meeting will be the report of the research section. Another high point will be the Wednesday evening session on "What's New in Weed Control."

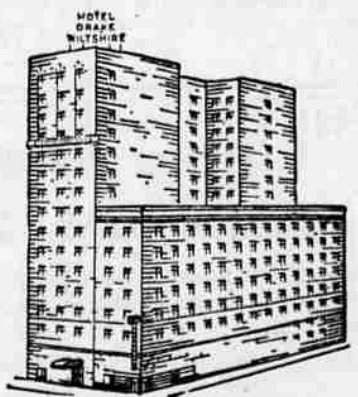
