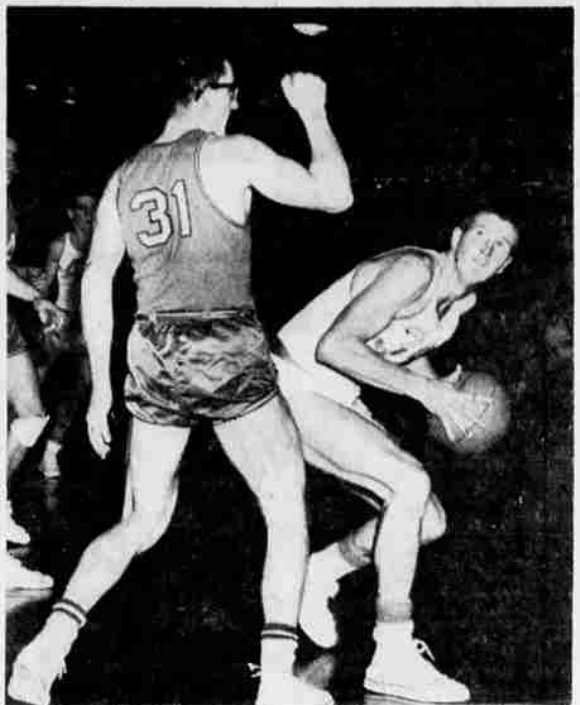




OWLS CRACK WIN COLUMN — The Oregon Tech Owls eked out a 64-63 victory over the Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers on the Mile High court Friday night to make their first dent in the Oregon Collegiate Conference win column. At one point in the game the Techmen boasted a

Pelicans Conquer Cavemen

GRANTS PASS (Special) — The KU Pelicans parlayed a third-quarter scoring spree into an easy 58 to 50 victory over the Grants Pass Cavemen Friday night at Grants Pass.

An 18-point spurge in the third stanza for KU while Grants Pass was scoring only eight pushed Klamath into a 16-point lead at 47 to 31 and broke an otherwise close game wide open.

Rex Benner, top scorer in the Southern Oregon Conference, lived up to advance billing with a 23-point effort for game honors. He kept the Cavemen in the game during the first half, netting 17 of his club's 23 first half counters.

A tightened Pel defense held him to only two field goals and two charity tosses in the second half.

Paul Bishop paced the Pel offense with 15 points, followed by Dean Dunson with 10. Also in double figures was Larry Janssen of Grants Pass with 11.

"The game opened slowly with Klamath moving into a slight lead at 6-4 only to have Benner connect on two from outside, plus a free throw, to give the home-standers a nine to six lead. Two free throws and a field goal by Bishop pulled the Pels into a 10 to nine lead at the end of the quarter. It was a lead they never relinquished, holding edges of 29 to 23 at the midway point and 47 to 31 after three quarters.

The rebounding of Brickner and Lewis was a big factor in the victory for coach Dean White's charges. Brickner cleared 18 and Lewis 11, representing half of the

Whitebirds' 58 rebounds.

Gordon Prehm's Cavemen topped the Pels in shooting average, netting 19 of 53 for a 328 percentage while KU converted 19 of 61 efforts for a shooting percentage of 311.

Each club tallied 19 field goals with the Pels gaining their victory margin from the free throw line where they scored 29 of 29 chances against 12 of 26 for the Cavemen.

Wally Palmberg had a perfect night at the charity stripe, sinking six for six, all in the fourth quarter.

White gave his six starters additional rest in preparation for the Saturday night game at Medford by pulling them in the closing moments of the third quarter. Klamath used 11 in its victorious effort and the Cavemen put 13 men on the floor.

The win gave Klamath a 3-1 record in conference play and a seasonal standing of 9-1.

SL Kegler Gets Rich With All-Star Win

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Sandy-haired Harry Smith of St. Louis, who has had his share of bowling riches, today was \$10,000 wealthier after winning the National All-Star Bowling Championship.

Smith emerged as the best bowler after 100 gruelling lines in the classic which is most properly called the Bowling Proprietors Assn. of American National Individual Match Game Championship.

During the 64-game finals, the 145-pound fireball exponent knocked down 13,599 pins, an average of 12, while winning 40,

losing 23 and tying one game.

The end result of these statistics was a Petersen point total of 312.24, the standard by which Smith and his feminine counterpart, Sylvia Wene, were finally crowned champions. A bowler gains one point for every 50 pins scored and one point for every game won.

Smith routed his final opponent in the televised finals of the position round last night, blasting 267, 234, 247, 204—952 as Bob Chase of Kansas City, who entered the finals only nine pins behind, shot 220, 199, 195, 235—849.

'Showboat' Hall, Globetrotters Schedule Friday Appearance

A good deed by Abe Saperstein and his Harlem Globetrotters basketball team turned into a good break for them, as the appearance of Bob "Showboat" Hall, in the role of rollicking comedian and outstanding pivotman for them against the San Francisco All-Nations at 7:30 p.m. Friday, January 22, on Pelican Court attests.

It all happened on Thanksgiving Day in 1944. The Trotters played a benefit game at Brewster Center in Detroit, east side Negro community center which spawned such great athletes as Joe Louis,

Sugar Ray Robinson, Eddie Tolan and others. Leon Wheeler, director of the center, had sent the Globetrotters several outstanding basketball prospects in the past and the game for the center's needy coffers was Saperstein's way of showing appreciation.

In the audience watching the game in rapt fascination was young Hall, then just turned 17. That was the day Bob decided that someday he would play for the great team as Harry Russan, Larry Bleach, Gus Finney and others of the center had done before. Moreover, he would be as slick as the rest of them in comedy and magical ball-handling. From that day, he practiced hard and prepared for the time when the big chance would come.

It came to pass just four years later. Sammy Gee, first All-American high school player at Detroit's Miller High, had landed with the Trotters the season before. Through his intervention, Bob — christened Robert Alfred Hall on his birth in Detroit September 30, 1927 — received a tryout in 1948. He got a leave of absence from the Briggs Auto parts works where he worked as a welder, and never returned.

The young fellow, who hadn't played basketball at Miller High but became a standout at Brewster Center under Leon Wheeler's coaching, fast made the grade in Globetrotter ranks. Several years of tutelage in the Globetrotters' farm system developed him and the last few years has seen the six foot two inch 190-pounder attain real stardom. He has become one of the finest comedians in Globetrotter history.

P. S. — Now it can be told. He sneaked in to see that 1944 game at Brewster Center.
