West Sets New Campaign To Snap Secrecy Screen

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Western powers expect to mount a new campaign this spring to break down Soviet secrecy barriers as an essential step toward an arms control agreement.

The importance of an international inspection system which would operate throughout the Soviet Union and keep check on its armed forces was heavily emphasized anew Thursday in a statement here on the projected Soviet military manpower cut.

The Soviet Union and the Western powers will resume disarmament negotiations at Geneva on March 15, meeting as members of a 10-nation committee equally divided between Communists and the Western Allies.

Within two weeks the United States is expected to begin consultations with Britain, France and other Western members of the group on what Allied policy should be. The chief element is sure to be a requirement for a vast system of international inspectors operating behind the Iron Curtain as well as within the borders of Free nations.

This essential condition laid down by the Western nations in the past has been the chief obstacle to reaching a disarmament agreement with the Soviet Union. But the Western governments have insisted that an agreement which was not safeguarded by a thoroughgoing control operation would be worse than useless, since it would create a serious danger of cheating.

Film Studio Pacifies All

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — If Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer wants to make everybody happy, the actors in a proposed movie about Chief Joseph will see a big chunk of the Pacific Northwest.

To meet its own announced plans and the objections of various governors and such, MGM will have to shoot scenes in four states.

The company announced recently it planned to film the life of the famed Nez Perce leader in Washington.

Hold it, said Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon, Joseph was an Oregonian and the movie ought to be made down Oregon way. And, said Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho, Joseph spent a lot of time in the Gem State, also. Washington, indeed!

Thursday, Montana got into the act. Joseph's most famous exploit, said the State Board of Examiners, was his 2,000-mile flight from the U. S. Army . . . across Montana.

is now adequately safeguarded by its huge arsenal of nuclear and rocket weapons. It no longer needs so many men under arms to serve its military objectives. Indeed experts here are certain that the Soviet Union needs the men more urgently in industry and agriculture to produce food, civilian machines and consumer goods, and more modern munitions.

The cut, assuming it is carried through, will reduce Khrushchev's force in about two years to the present level of the United States force—about 2½ million men.

In a statement issued through the State Department, the United States said it could take Khrushchev's announcement of a cutback only as a declaration of intent "since there will be no verifiable means of checking any actual reductions."

This is the same reaction that came from the United States in 1955 when the Soviets announced a cut of 640,000 men; 1956, when they proclaimed a reduction of 1,200,000, and 1958 when they tossed in another 300,000-man cut. The much advertised "Spirit of Camp David" obviously has not changed American skepticism about Soviet behavior in the arms field.

The United States said the negotiations beginning in March will offer an opportunity "to achieve controlled international measures of disarmament." It declared readiness to go as far as any other nation would in agreeing to "safeguarded disarmament." And it put the challenge up to the Soviet Union directly by expressing hope that the newly proclaimed manpower cut "is an indication of its willingness" to come to terms with the West on an arms reduction and control system with a built-in enforcement plan that would substitute confidence for suspicion in East-West relations.
